CHICAGO, Aug. 2-(AP)-Corn prices, which tumbled almost two Am Water Wrks 91/4 General Electric 33 1/4 Sears Roebuck 76 1/4 cents a bushel, led a general decline of grain values today in a reaction apparently based on improved moisture conditions in the north central states and Canada as well as lagging domestic and international trade.

With commercial and speculative activity restricted by uncertainty as to the war situation, values were permitted to drift lower under the pressure of comparatively small selling orders. Some hedging of wheat was in evidence and corn belt rains, with forecast of continued showery conditions, attracted attention, but traders also watched price movements of other commodities, particularly the lows registered by sugar and coffee futures.
