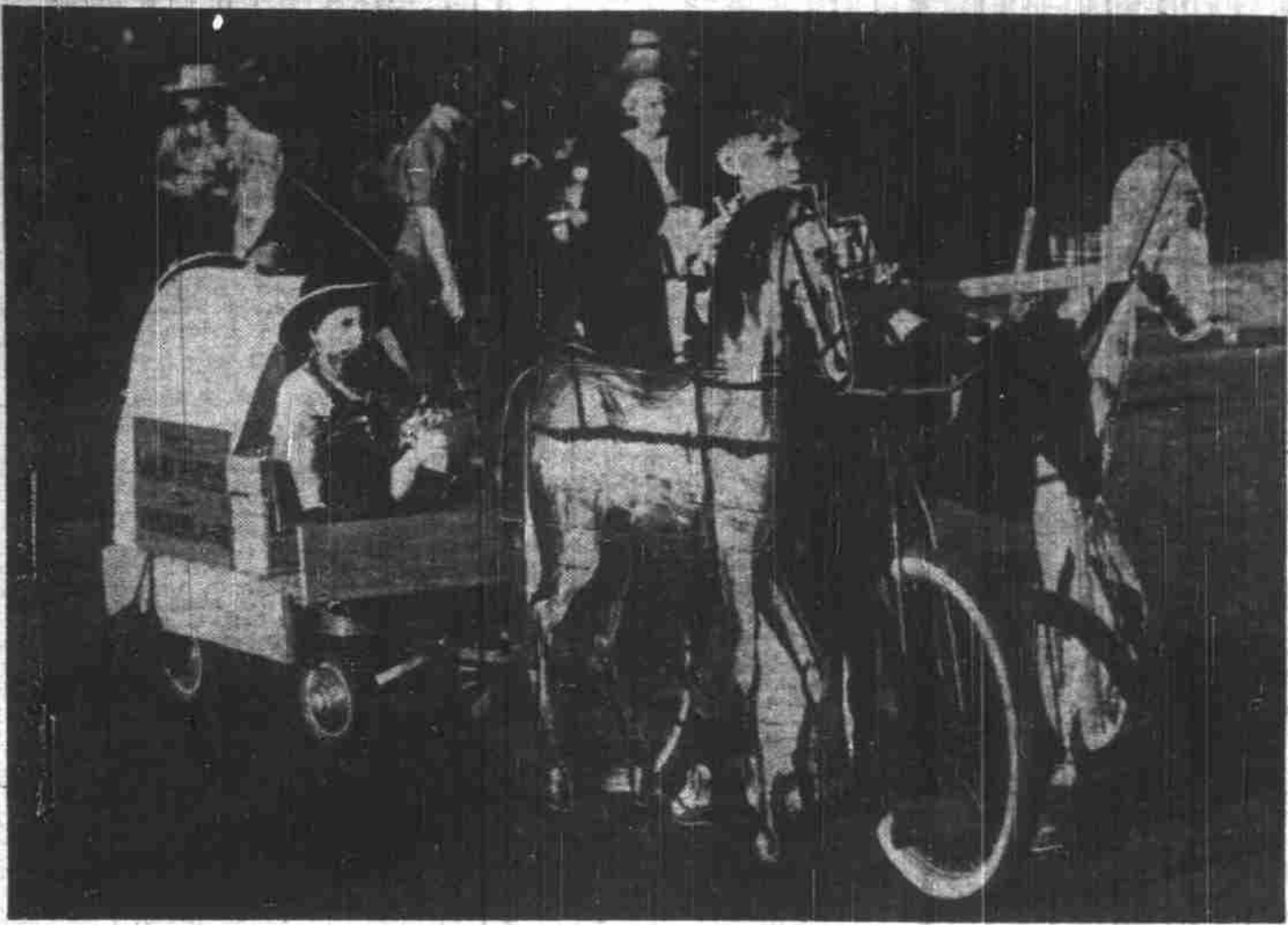

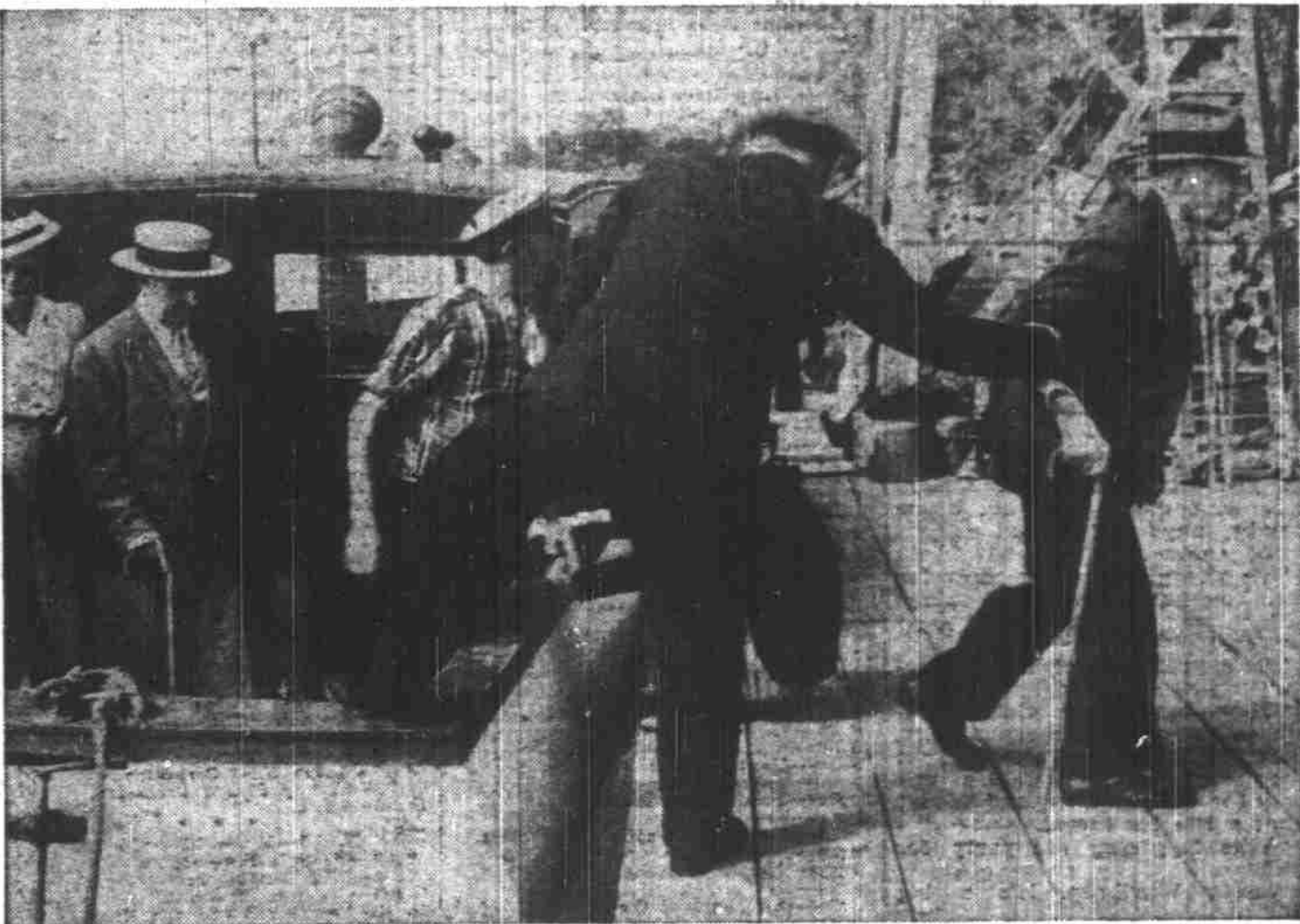

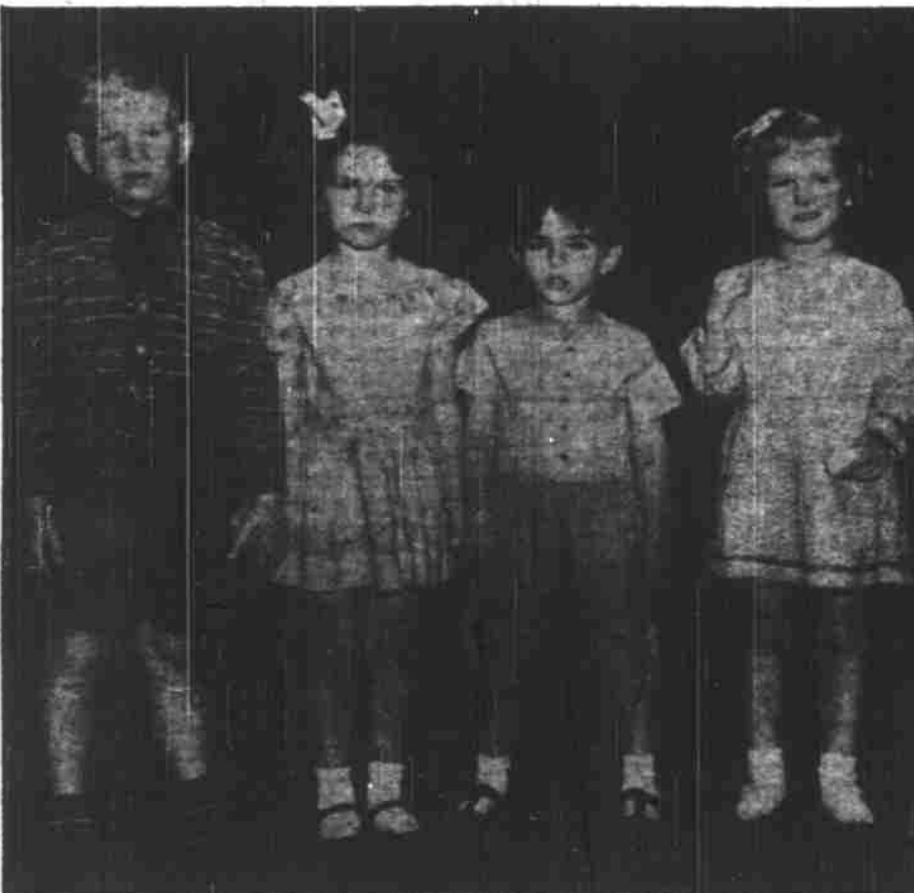

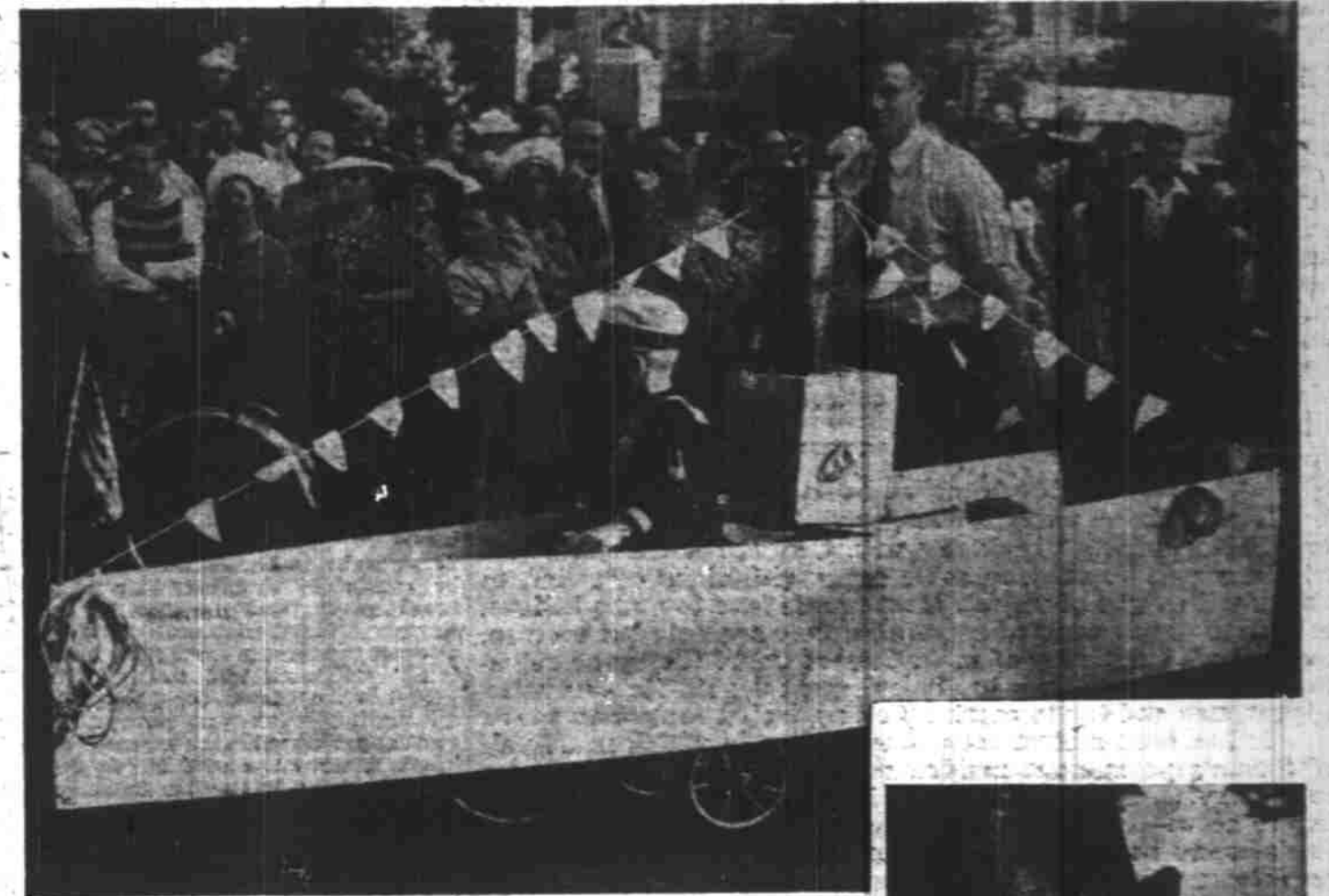

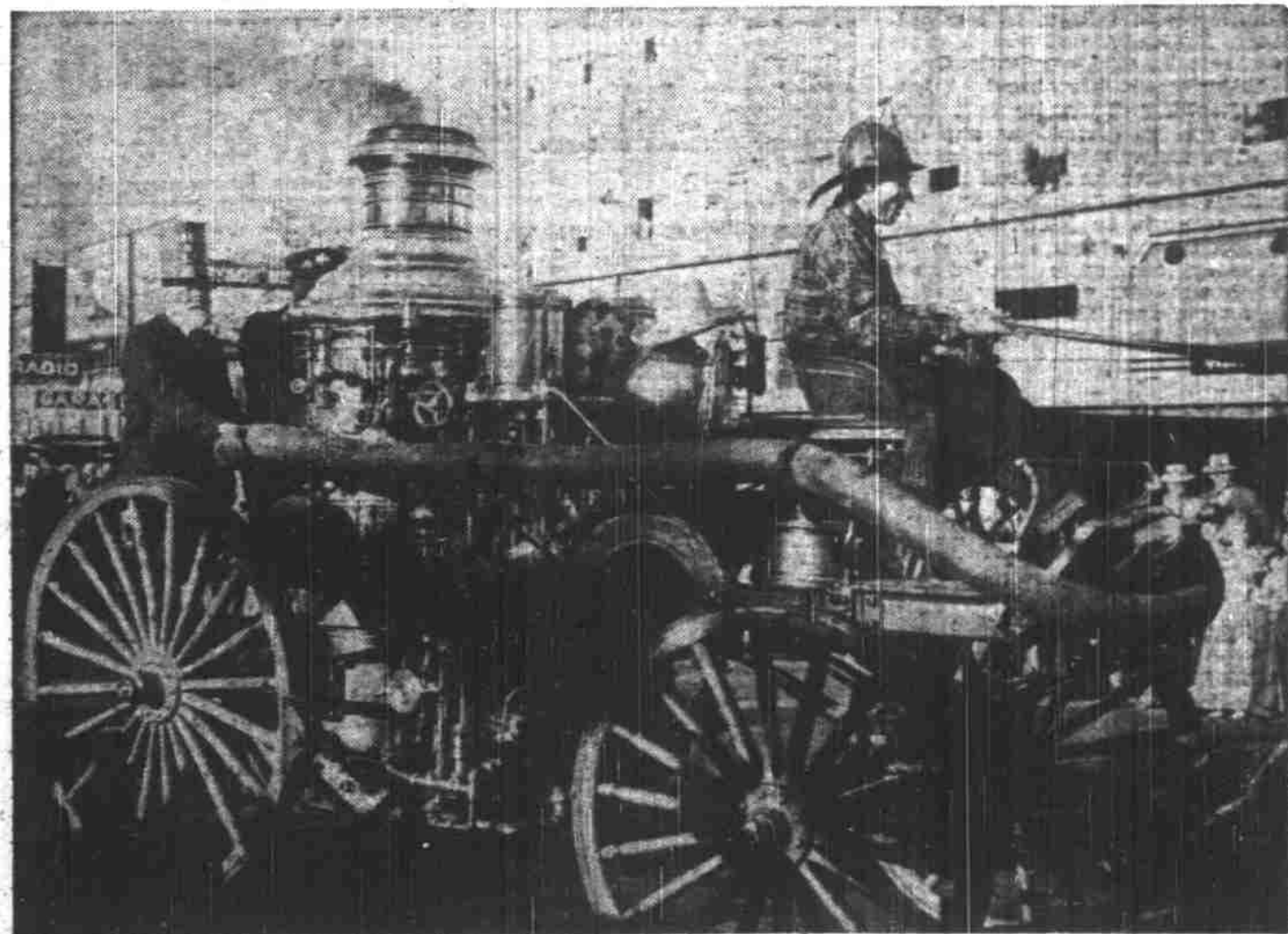
Centennial opened with landing of pioneers on shores of Willamette river, shown here. Jason Lea had no such power boat, however.—Statesman photo.

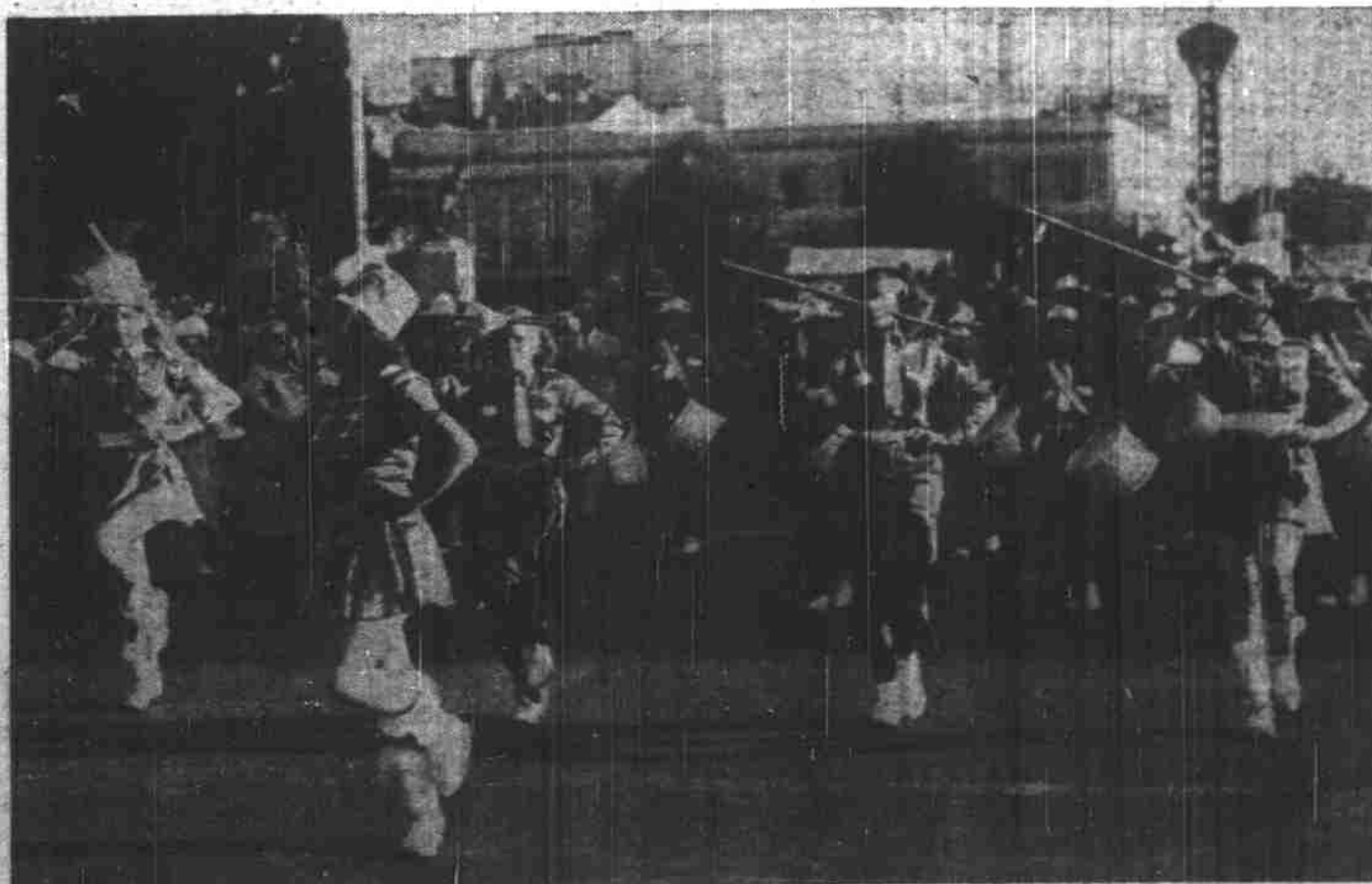
