

# Grain Prices Rally, Retreat

## Selling Turns Gain Into Rout; Famine Talked in Europe

CHICAGO, Aug. 6 (AP)—Grain prices staged a strong rally in early dealings today and stubbornly resisted pressure through most of the session, but concentrated selling by eastern houses just before the close turned the wheat gains into a rout and hammered down corn to minor fractional advances.

September wheat led the retreat. After reaching a high of 76 1/2¢, a gain of 1 1/2¢ over Monday's closing quotation, the delivery finished at 74 1/2¢, a net loss of 2 1/2¢ cents. Wheat closed the session unchanged to 1/4¢ lower, December 75 1/4¢, May 75 1/4¢.

The market was inclined to sag after early firmness on scattered selling. Trade was light and appeared to be mostly in the form of spreading operations. Other domestic markets showed activity in line with Chicago. Buenos Aires remained unchanged.

Talk of possible famine in European nations was being expanded and France was reported to be seeking pressure from the United States on Britain to ease the blockade, which suggests possible movement of grain to Europe for relief purposes.

Corn futures showed early firmness in a market described by traders as technically oversold. Oats followed corn, ending with gains of 3/4¢ cents also.

# Decline in Stock Largest in Month

## Steels, Aircraft, Motors Lead Drop; Business News Optimistic

NEW YORK, Aug. 6 (AP)—Steels, aircraft, motors and specialties led a decline in today's stock market of fractions to around 2 points. The list was shaky from the start and dealings picked up a little momentum near the end of the first hour. While offerings dwindled substantially from then on, few recoveries were in evidence at the close.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks was off 4 of a point at 42.5, largest drop for any session since July 1. Transfers of 288,850 shares compared with 233,950 yesterday.

Brokers attributed the set-back mainly to European dispatches which hinted the long-threatened Hitler invasion of England might be near.

Business news, on the whole, seemed more optimistic than otherwise, and the heavy flow of corporate earnings statements showed a highly favorable comparison with a year ago. All of this, though, apparently counted for little as a market stimulant.

General Motors slipped despite declaration of the \$1 dividend after Monday's close. Non-ferrous metal shares had to contend with further cuts in the quotations for copper and lead.

Bonds were narrowly mixed, as were commodities.

# Heat, Pests Cause Loss, Onion Crop

LABISH CENTER—A shortage in the local onion crop of from 10 to 25 per cent has been estimated by growers and buyers, as the extreme heat and pests have noticeably affected the new crop. Maggoty onions in the season caused a great loss to many growers and the thrip which has been especially noticeable during the last two weeks has sapped the strength of the onions, turning the tops light green in color and shortening the growing period.

Prospects of a better price than last year has been offered growers as the intermediate crop in other localities has been placed on the market as soon as possible as a shortage was noticeable and the price much improved from former years.

In the Labish Center district some growers sold early in the season for as low as 60 cents a hundred but the price has gradually increased to 71 a hundred being paid for some. However, the market is not very strong at the \$1 quotation.
