Minister Dies In Portland, 95

Johnson, for Whom Local Church Is Named, Active 50 Years

Christopher Johnson, 95, Seventh Day Adventist minister who died in the Portland Sanitarium August 4, was for 50 years active in the growth of the church in this district.

Rev. Johnson was born in Copenhagen, Denmark, October 13, 1845, and came to the United States at the age of 21 years.

He married Ellen Olsen in Chicago and they had seven children. All of whom are deceased. The couple settled in Minnesota, coming to Monitor, Oregon, in 1890.

Seventh Day Adventist church and McMinnville Seventh Day Adventist churches soon after, retiring from active work in 1930.

In 1927 he married Fannie Collier.

Mr. Johnson leaves two grandchildren, Gilbert Johnson of Salem and Ellen Johnson of Laurewood. His great grandchildren are Elvira Henry, Imer Henry and Carmen Henry, Jr., all of Silverton.

He built the Johnson Music conservatory of Walla Walla college, assisted in building the Portland Sanitarium and contributed money for the Salem Seventh Day Adventist church, which is named for him.

Hop Children's Care Planned

Church Women to Instruct, Aid Boys and Girls in Independence Camps

Care and instruction of migrant workers' children in hop yards near Independence, similar to that accorded in 1939, has been nearly assured as the result of a campaign by the Interdenominational Council of Church Women. Two buildings will be constructed for the classes and housing of instructors.

Enthusiastic support was given the project, started at the request of the federal government, by yard managers, who reported highly increased morale of workers and better conduct of the children. Last year 35 children were cared for.

Under the plan, children under working age, many of whom have never attended school, will be given training in hygiene, making of scrapbooks, games and kindergarten work. Sunday school will be conducted.

The children will meet in two buildings, one farm according to area. Hours will be approximately from 8 a. m. to 6:30 p. m. Two lunches, provided by the council, will be given them each day, as well as rest periods.

The most extensive project is being carried out in a yard employing about 300 workers, where the two 16 by 30 foot heated buildings will be constructed on skids. Here Mrs. G. E. Ross, who was in charge last year, will be the instructor, with a young woman assistant.

In another yard, the management has provided a building and a worker will be placed by the council.

The national council of the Woman's Home Missionary society is aiding, but most of the funds come from local sources. Donations to the work are to be sent to Mrs. W. L. Meeker, secretary, at 535 Leslie street.

Calls for Bean Pickers Send Salem Job Office Placements to State Top

With the bean picking season getting under full steam, Salem led all 21 offices of the state employment service in placements for the past week, Director L. C. Stoll announced yesterday. In supplementary jobs which includes mainly seasonal farm work, the Salem office had 830 placements, more than half of the state's total of 1657.

Second to Salem was another bean picking center, Eugene, with 188 casual jobs and 175 with private industry. Medford's entry into bean picking brought 185 casual placements, while Ontario's potato and sugar beet crops accounted for 148 seasonal workers.

Placements by other offices during the week included the following: Portland 175 private and 90 casuals; Albany 90 private and 10 casuals; Corvallis 50 private and 23 casuals; Newport 53 private and 66 casuals; Klamath Falls 100 private and 31 casuals.

More than 1400 persons are registered at the farm security administration's mobile labor camp in the West Station bean fields, while several thousand others are in camps provided by big growers.

Paramount Market To Relocate Soon

Crown Drug Firm Moving to South Commercial to Make Way for Bank

Two impending relocations of downtown businesses were disclosed yesterday.

The Paramount market, now at Court and Liberty street, will move on September 1 into re-decorated quarters in the concrete building at 260 North Liberty street formerly occupied by the Columbia market. The new location, making more store space available, will enable the Paramount company, which deals in both meats and groceries, to add new lines to its stocks. A Wayne Hammett, one of the proprietors, said yesterday.

The other move is to be made by the Crown Drug company, from its long-established location at 332 State street to 150 South Commercial. The change was made necessary by the projected construction of an addition to the Ladd & R. U. S. National bank building. A building permit for \$600 worth of alterations to the drug firm's new site was issued at the city hall yesterday.

Recruits may choose any army post in the eight western states, Alaska or the Philippine Islands, for service.

Mayor Signs Fire Charge Ordinance

Mayor W. W. Chadwick yesterday afternoon signed the ordinance passed by the city council Monday night setting up a schedule of charges to be made by the Salem fire department for service outside the city limits. The bill will go into effect in 10 days.

The measure provides a minimum fee of \$25, a fee of \$50 for the first hour on fire duty and \$25 for each additional hour.
