## Redwood Highway Is Most Popular

GRANTS PASS, Aug. 12.—(AP)—The Redwood highway brought more tourists to Oregon than any other route in July, car registration figures indicated today.

Cave Junction, on an 89-mile stretch from Crescent City to Grants Pass, noted 4995 cars during the month, and Ashland, first station north of the California line, registered 4483. Brookings, on the Oregon coast highway, which leads also from the Redwood highway at Crescent City, registered 2814. Umatilla was fourth with 1814 and Grants Pass fifth with 1250.

## \$50,000 Goal Set for Chest

### Changes in Organization of Campaign, Publicity Are Discussed

A goal of \$50,000, the same as last year, was set yesterday by the Salem Community Chest board, meeting in luncheon session with its budget committee.

The decision was made following a request by William L. Phillips, budget committee chairman, asking that the board indicate a proposed total for the budgets of the seven organizations participating in the chest.

The budget committee, Phillips explained, has already conducted extensive researches into the budgetary items of the groups sharing the chest proceeds, but has delayed making final recommendations until an agreement could be reached on the total amount of money to be distributed.

Chairman Douglas McKay answered Phillips' request with the proposal that the figure adopted in 1939 be set as a goal for the present year's drive.

He expressed the opinion that the \$50,000 figure could readily have been reached last year, instead of slightly over \$46,000 actually collected, had organization of the chest's campaign been conducted along more suitable lines.

Such weaknesses as existed last year have been corrected, he indicated, with the result that the chest should expect to raise the full \$50,000 amount without unusual difficulty.

Supplemental report by the publicity committee, of which City School Superintendent Frank B. Bennett is chairman, outlined a plan for community chest programs to be put on by civic and social organizations out of their own membership.

Chairman Bennett explained that his committee wished to avoid perfunctory treatment of the chest by groups concerned with full luncheon programs and that they preferred instead to ask that full attention be devoted to the chest program by interested groups.

The chest board discussed, but continued for further consideration, a proposal that names of donors over a certain sum be given newspaper publicity.

## Lumber Has Huge Role in Defense

PORTLAND, Aug. 12.—(AP)—National defense needs will take nearly five billion board feet of lumber as soon as congress opens the purse strings, Dr. Wilson M. Compton predicted today.

The total is 20 per cent of the nation's annual lumber output and more than Oregon mills cut in a year, the secretary-manager of the National Lumber Manufacturer's association said.

"There is plenty of timber in the United States, with Oregon and Washington leading in the largest of stands, for any and all purposes of the nation in defense, come what will," he said. "The producers have ample milling facilities to produce, so there will be no 'bottle-neck' so far as that end of the huge program for Uncle Sam is concerned."
