Judgment Goes To Defendant

Steward Wins in Suit and Partnership Dissolved by Court's Order

The Marion county grand jury continued in session at the courthouse yesterday, with a report not expected earlier than late today or early tomorrow.

In the circuit court, Judge L. G. Jewell granted a judgment for the defendant personally in the case of C. O. Horning vs. Floyd Steward and Samuel A. McAllister, trustee in bankruptcy for Steward.

The decree awards \$87.50 to Steward, requires plaintiff to pay costs of suit and costs to county, and contains stipulations to the advantage of the bankruptcy trustee. Dissolution of partnership, at issue in the case, was allowed.

243,518 Attend City Playgrounds This Season, Set New High Mark; Swimming, New Activities Cited

As they have yearly, Salem's playgrounds this season have already set a new attendance record, announces Director Vern Gilmore.

Although there remained 20 days until the August 30 closing date of the playgrounds when the August 10 check was made, it revealed a total attendance of 243,518—exceeding the 1939 total of 230,970 by 12,548.

Olinger, for the June 10 to August 10 period, numbered an attendance of 161,402. Leslie counted 78,243 and Highland 3873.

While general swimming at both pools produced the major part of the attendance, swimming attendance has not increased as much over last year as has general activities. However, the one-day Olinger pool record was broken on August 7, when 3320 swimmers made use of the pool. Gilmore's records show yearly attendance increases but no year has shown a greater increase over the year preceding than has this season. Part of this is due, Gilmore notes, to activities which have been added to the programs.

Sailboat Racing Slated, Olinger

Sailboat racing is to be introduced at Salem at 2 o'clock this afternoon in the Olinger swimming pool.

Under direction of Tommy Drynan, Olinger playgrounds director, who conceived the idea, youngsters will enter their boats in a sailing craft in races and in a construction contest. The boats will be judged for workmanship and construction as well as speed and awards made to the winners. A number of youngsters have been working on new craft this week in the woodworking unit of the playgrounds.

Olinger playgrounds' annual exhibit of handicrafts constructed during the summer here, will be for 2:30 this afternoon under the direction of instructors Bernice Shepherd, Flora Short, Greta Parent and Erwin Ensley. The exhibits include those from all handicraft projects—woodworking, basketry and kindergarten classes. Parents and friends of youngsters who have worked in the projects are extended special invitations to view the exhibits.

Hambro Address Here Possibility

The possibility of bringing C. J. Hambro, Norwegian statesman, who escaped from that country in a small boat after the German occupation, to Salem for an address was discussed at a joint meeting of the Sons of Norway and the local Norwegian relief committee Thursday night.

Mr. Hambro was president of the Storting, or parliament, prior to the occupation and was at one time president of the League of Nations council. He is now touring the United States.

PUC Approves Bus Use, New Highway

Pacific Greyhound, California corporation, yesterday received approval of State Utilities Commissioner Ormond R. Bean to operate its buses over the new Willamette highway between Goshen and Klamath Falls.

The application previously received approval of the interstate commerce commission. The new service will reduce the bus distance between Portland and Klamath Falls by 38 miles and save the traveling public at least an hour in time schedules.

90-Day Sentence Meted, Silverton

George Robinson, 34, was sentenced to serve 90 days in the Marion county jail and pay a \$50 fine yesterday when he pleaded guilty before Silverton Justice of the Peace Alf O. Nelson to a charge of disorderly conduct while drunk. His conviction was the second of the summer, Robinson having pleaded guilty to a similar charge before Justice of the Peace L. Steyer in June. At that time a 30-day sentence was suspended on condition the defendant pay a \$25 fine and abstain from liquor for a year.

The Marion county sheriff's office also reported arrest of George L. Steyer, Idahoan, on a Benton county warrant charging non-support. He was returned yesterday to Corvallis authorities.

British Claim 26

LONDON, Aug. 15—(Thursday) (AP)—The air ministry announced early today that 26 German aircraft were shot down yesterday as against a loss of four British pilots.

Budget Requests Show No Increase

There will be no material increase in budget requests by state departments, boards and institutions for the 1941-42 biennium, compared with the appropriations for the current two year period, State Budget Director David Eccles announced yesterday.

In a few cases state institutions have requested additional funds for housing facilities but it is probable that most of these will be denied. The state hospital request for additional buildings may be approved, Eccles declared. Thursday was the deadline for submitting budgets to the state budget division.
