Council Receives Report on Power Garbage Disposal Solution Proposed; Seek Repeal of Stadium Issue

garbage would remove the necessity of the city's buying more land for the incinerator site. Unannounced, an ordinance was presented to the council by Alderman David O'Hara and given preliminary reading, to put up to the electorate in November the repeal of the \$50,000 stadium bond charter amendment adopted two years ago. He explained later that the demand for a municipal stadium appeared to have waned.

A motorized street sweeping machine, provided for in the 1940 budget, was ordered purchased for \$4267.50 from the Columbia Equipment company, Portland, after the aldermen had decided to place four elderly men employed as street sweepers on a half-time basis, at \$50 a month salary. The sweeping machine will be speedier and more effective than hand sweeping, City Engineer J. H. Davis declared.

Official city government recognition of the honor bestowed upon Senator Charles L. McNary in his nomination for vice-president was voted by the council at the suggestion of Alderman S. B. Laughlin. Mayor W. W. Chadwick was directed to extend the city's greetings and its key, a figurative one unless a city key is obtained in the meantime, next Tuesday, day of the formal notification of the nomination.

Revival of two old issues, the location of poultry slaughtering businesses and control of magazine and book peddlers, was overshadowed in other matters reaching the council.

Seeking to avoid recurrence of past disputes over poultry slaughtering, the Marion Creamery & Poultry company, now located at 515 South Commercial street, asked the council's ruling on whether or not there were legal objections to its moving its operations to a building proposed for construction on lots 6, 7 and 8, block 21, North Salem addition, constituting the west half of the block bounded by Front, Shipping, North Commercial and Hood streets. The question referred to the health and sanitation committee.

The magazine peddlers' question was raised by an ordinance introduced by Alderman French providing for a new schedule of fees and rules which would permit a concern having a Salem office or representative to take out an annual license covering all of its solicitors. The bill was referred to the license committee for study.

Other matters before the council: Streets placed on WPA grading program—Olive west of 17th, East avenue between 16th and Garret, and Pearl; grading petitions postponed—20th between Madison and Grant, Grant between 19th and 20th. Hearing set October 7 on vacation of unnamed

Reporter Tries Conscription Plan In Test Registration, Armory Here

 I was a conscription "guinea pig" last night when Oregon selective service plans received their annual test at the Salem armory with the aid of national guardsmen and staff officers headed by Lieutenant Colonel E. V. Wootton.

Seated across from a uniformed registrar, I answered rapid-fire questions aimed at classifying me in regard to my ability and fitness to serve Uncle Sam. "What is your name?" "Do you belong to a religious sect or organization giving you religious convictions against war?" "Are you a government or state, judicial, territorial, county or municipal employee?" "Are you a licensed ocean, river or Great Lakes pilot?"

Deferred Status Questioned
 Each question was aimed at discovering if I came under any questions aimed at classifying me in regard to my ability and fitness to serve Uncle Sam. "What is your name?" "Do you belong to a religious sect or organization giving you religious convictions against war?" "Are you a government or state, judicial, territorial, county or municipal employee?" "Are you a licensed ocean, river or Great Lakes pilot?"

Chief point emphasized by those in charge was that selective service registration would be entirely carried out by civilians should conscription become a necessity. Registrants, registrars and members of the selective board would all be civilians.

I was told that any person failing for selective service deferring would be excluded from the draft as long as he was included or occupied in the deferred class. If employment status placed the individual in a deferred class he would not be considered for conscription as long as his employment lasted. However, if for any reason he should be removed or resign his position, he would immediately be considered for service.

Income No Excuse
 A large section of the questionnaire was taken up with listings of dependents, places to list dependents if the questioned person should happen to have any. In addition, I was asked if I owned any real property, stocks and bonds and the like. I understood that if this question were answered in the affirmative, to say, the six figure bracket or even higher, it would make no difference in my draft status. I could be a millionaire or a pauper and my name would be called just the same and my uniform would probably fit just as loosely—perhaps worse.

This act which I previewed last night, minus Hollywood fanfare and klieg lights but amidst quiet speed born of efficiency, has been evolved during the past 20 years by a group of close to 100 civilians from all parts of the country. This group, known as the "joint committee on selective service," has devoted itself to developing an "M" day technique intended to maintain the treasured rights of a democracy but the speed and efficiency of totalitarianism.

Takes 45 Minutes
 Whether or not it would work in the event of necessity, I hope remains entirely to conjecture and never comes to the actual test. However, if my honest opinion is wanted, we'll just chalk up a large X on the yes side of the ballot. They rushed me through the "mili" exactly 45 minutes and when it was all over they knew more about me than I'd care to put in print. They assured me, though, that it was entirely confidential and merely for the purpose of classifying me and giving me a number. Well, confidentially, they now have my number.

Commercial Flier Asset to Defense

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 19.—(AP)—Commercial aviation in America gives the nation's military air force a reserve of "more than 700 pilots thoroughly trained in instrument flying," Col. J. L. Stromme told the chamber of commerce today.

He said the airlines supplemented military air strength and made possible a smaller armed flying force than would otherwise be necessary.

Strategy Traces Would-Be Suicide

Man in Gas-Filled Room Persuaded to Tell Phone Number

SEATTLE, Aug. 19.—(AP)—Detective Lieutenant Seth W. Taylor answered a telephone call today. The caller immediately went into a long account of the preparations he had made for committing suicide; how he was seated at a table in a room; what he was thinking.

"Where are you?" the officer asked. "Never mind that. You just listen. I've always been curious about suicide. Now I'm finding out about it."

Repetitive demands as to his whereabouts were of no avail. "I'm getting tired . . . so tired . . . I wonder how long it will be . . ."

Gets Phone Number
 Suddenly the detective shouted: "What's that? I can't hear you. Speak louder. There must be something wrong with the line. What's your phone number and I'll call you right back."

The would-be suicide mumbled a number and hung up. The rest was simple. Police

checked the number for the address. Forcing open an apartment door a few minutes later they found the man slumped over a table, the telephone in his hand. As they dragged him from the gas-filled room he mumbled: "He's going to phone me right back."

State Population Gain 14 Per Cent

WASHINGTON, Aug. 19.—(AP)—The census bureau gave Oregon a 14 per cent population increase over 1930 today, bringing the total to 1,087,717, a gain of 133,931.

Most counties shared in the increase, but a few, notably Sherman county, lost. The fall in Sherman county was 31.2 per cent. Malheur enjoyed an increase of 75.3 per cent.

Salem gained 17.7 per cent, leading the larger cities in percentage gain. Astoria lost 2.4 per cent. Portland gained 1.9 per cent to 207,572.

Light Traps Load Basis of Mutiny

Frank Troch Leads Attack on Regulations Which Hampers Scoring

VANDALIA, O., Aug. 19.—(AP)—Six national championships went into the record books today at the 41st grand American trapshoot, but the opening day's 100,000-shell barrage caused less reverberation than a threatened mutiny by some of the country's top-flight marksmen.

Petitions were circulated up and down the long trap line demanding the Amateur Trapshooting association directors outlaw the present "light" trapshell load and return to the former one and one-quarter ounces of pellets.

The petitions found ready signers, especially among the "hot shots" who felt that the lighter load was handicapping their shooting. The new load, effective this year by ATA decree, is one and one-eighth ounces, eliminating about 40 pellets from each shell.

Leading figure in the fight was Frank M. Troch, 20-time Oregon state champion from Portland.
