Silverton FFA Places Third

Competes With 25 Teams at Multnomah Fair; Livestock Judged

SILVERTON — Silverton Future Farmers of America, under the direction of the local instructor, Leonard Hudson, went to the Multnomah county fair this week and placed third. The local boys competed with 25 other teams from the Willamette valley and southern Washington.

Six classes of livestock were judged: Jersey cows, Holsteins, Jersey girls and a class of market lambs. Two hundred was a perfect score for each class. In the six classes a boy would have a possible score of 1200 points, or a three-man team a possible score of 3600.

Silverton's team was composed of Lester Beugl of the Silverton Hills; John Lichty, Pratum; Amos Funnus, Valley View. Lester Beugl was 10th high in the contest with a score of 80 1/2 with 78 boys entered. He was also high in judging Jersey heifers and second high in judging Jersey cows. Silverton placed first in judging Jersey heifers.

Besides the instructor, other boys going were Dale Herigstad, Leo Rosendor, George Haberly, Dan Van Brocklin, Carl Reed, all Silverton FFA boys.

The teams' standings were 1, West Linn, 2549; 2, Molalla, 2447; 3, Silverton, 2400; 4, Scappoose, 2391; 5, McKinville, 2357; 6, Amity, 2340; 7, Corvallis, 2304; 8, Gresham, 2288; 9, Vancouver, 2273; 10, Independence, 2271.

W. C. Leth, Polk county agricultural agent, was official judge, and Kirby Brunfield, Gresham instructor, directed the contest. In the afternoon the boys were admitted free to the grand stand to see the show which included truck driving, dog acts, trained horses, trapese antics and other interesting features, the boys reported upon their return.

The boys will judge livestock at the Yamhill county fair, the Clackamas fair and the state fair, and later at the Pacific International.

The Silverton Future Farmers will have a meeting tonight to make final plans for showing livestock, crops, and shape exhibits at the Marion county fair on August 30 at Salem and at the state fair September 2 to 8.
