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sued their way behind a smoke-screen.

One of the raiders was reported shot down—the 1909th naval warplane claimed by the British since Hitler began his full-scale aerial siege of Britain on June 18.

The spectacular but ineffective episode disclosed for the first time that Germany now has fortified the French coast with a brilliant network of guns to combat the 1941 British counter-offensive promised by Prime Minister Winston Churchill.

For the third straight day, Nazi air raids were restricted to small, widely-scattered attacks, but the Nazis said their new mine-fields on the British west coast were choking off food shipments to the British.

Rome Says British Submarine Is Sunk

The British air ministry disclosed that despite unfavorable weather, RAF bombers pounded oil refineries, airbases and key rail centers in Germany and Nazi-occupied France Wednesday night.

In the heightening British-Italian struggle in the Mediterranean, Mussolini's high command reported that joint attacks by the Italian navy and air force had sunk a British submarine, torpedoed a destroyer and "repeatedly hit" two cruisers with bombs in the eastern Mediterranean.

Egypt prepared to join Britain at a moment's notice. In Cairo, the war ministry said an Egyptian mobile division has taken up positions to resist any invasion by Italian troops from Libya.

There were new British air attacks on Italian Africa from Libya to Ethiopia.

The government of defeated France bitterly assailed Winston Churchill for his refusal to permit American and other food to pass the British blockade to Hitler-conquered Europe. Foreign Minister Paul Baudouin declared France would not "bow" to this, but he did not say what France would do.

In the Americas, Argentina's government crisis, stemming from a scandal about airplane loans and purchases, resulted in the resignation of all President Roberto M. Ortiz.

Leaders of Vets Criticize Delays

Sergeant York in Favor
of Draft but Says His
Boys Will Enlist

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 22.—(P)—With Sergeant Alvin C. York, World War hero, nodding agreement, National Commander Otis N. Brown, of the Veterans of Foreign Wars, declared today "There is too much talk, too much delay," in America's preparedness.

"Congress can very easily be found guilty of shameful and costly delays unless all elements get together, thresh out their differences and put our defense program over," said Brown, who came from Greensboro, NC, for the VFW national convention opening today.

York, who was credited with taking 132 German prisoners single-handedly said:

"I believe in preparedness to the hilt, and I'm in favor of conscription, too.

"I have two boys, 17 and 20, and I would certainly advise them not to wait for conscription when their country is in danger. The thing for them and every other honest American boy, is to enlist and not wait to be conscripted.

"I believe as many warships, airplanes and munitions as America can spare should be sent to aid England in her fight against totalitarianism."

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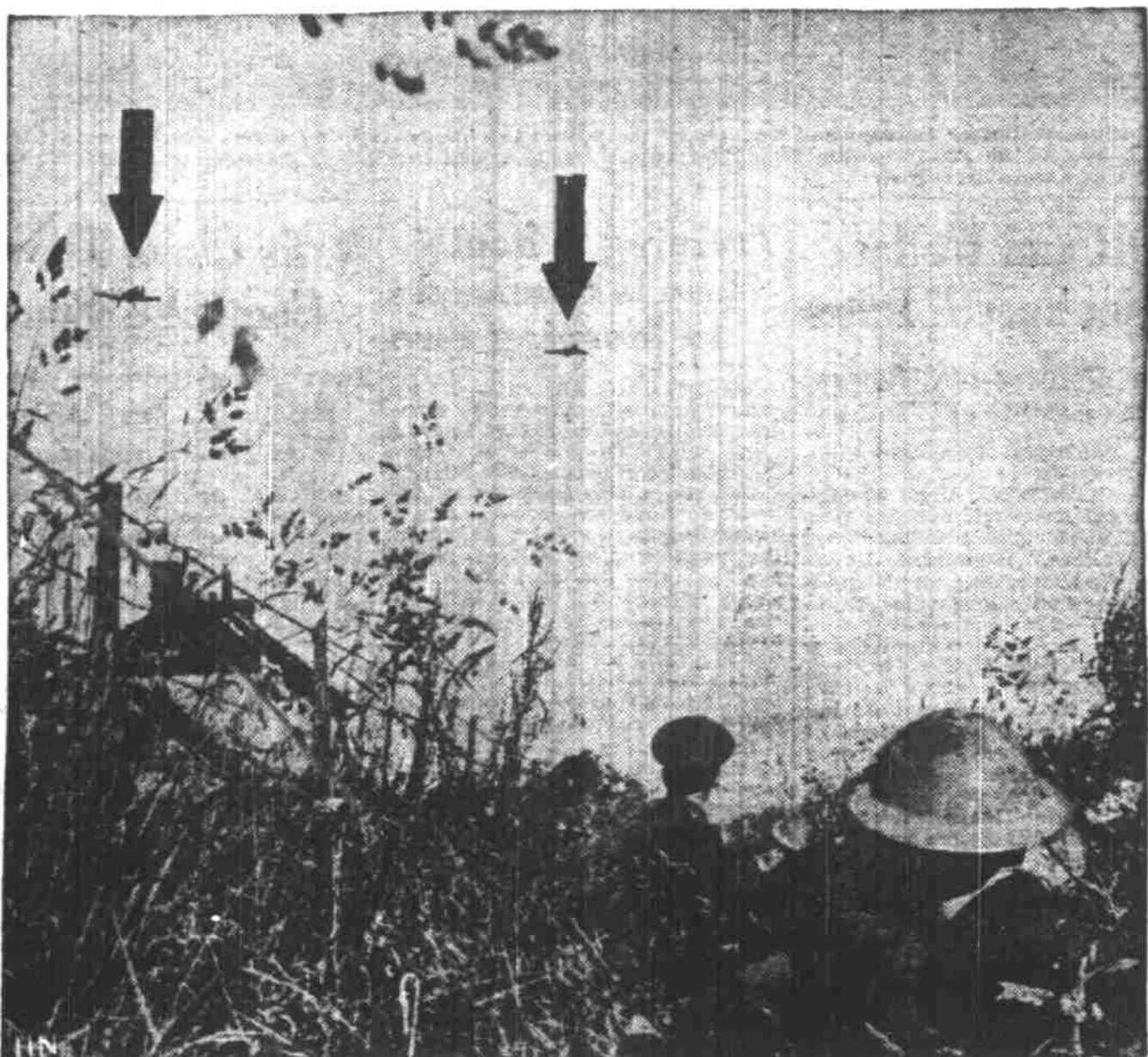
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Democratic Running Mates Discuss Speeches

Notice of Alaska Patient Lacking

No notification that Keith A. Chisholm, 38, Fairbanks, Alaska, bank robber, is on his way to the state hospital here has been received by either Dr. John C. Evans, superintendent, or to the state board of control.

Fairbanks dispatches said Chisholm, first Fairbanks bank robber in 50 years, held up the First National bank there and escaped with only an unsigned check.

Dr. Evans recalled that the state made arrangements a number of years ago for caring for criminally insane persons from Alaska, but that none have been committed for several years.

Willkie to Tour Eighteen States

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Oregon, Washington, Idaho, Montana, North Dakota, South Dakota, Wisconsin and Michigan.

Told at a press conference that Democratic Chairman Edward J. Flynn had asserted that Willkie had no hope of breaking the democratic south, the republican nominee replied:

"That is interesting and amusing. Why should he mention it if there is not any hope? It seems to me that Mr. Flynn is worried about Texas."

Willkie said he had not mapped any tours beyond the one for September, but it generally was assumed that he would campaign actively in the east thereafter and would wind up his drive in New York City.

Samuel F. Pryor, Jr., eastern republican campaign manager, said that Willkie "wants to meet as many people as possible" and that "we are taking into consideration the wishes of every state."

Willkie launched today with Gov. Arthur H. James of Pennsylvania, whom he asked to recommend a time and place for a projected major speech in Pennsylvania.

James, an unsuccessful contender for the republican nomination, had this to say of his chat with Willkie:

"I was happy to report that in Pennsylvania sentiment for him was growing steadily . . . and that his campaign will be followed by the greatest crop of votes that has ever been received in the history of the Keystone state."

Odorous ...in the News

WINDSOR, NC, Aug. 22.—(P)—The Cashie river, which flows through this town, has reversed its course and today is flowing upstream at the rate of three miles an hour.

The explanation lies in the tremendous volume of flood waters being discharged into Albemarle sound through the Roanoke river, 15 miles below Windsor. The two rivers flow into the sound at the same point, and for two or three miles upstream they are connected by swampland.

The Cashie today had risen four feet here, flooding nearly a dozen homes.

FALEIGH, NC, Aug. 22.—(P)—Four months ago Mrs. M. C. McGinnis accidentally dropped her two diamond rings and a diamond pin, valued at \$7,580, down a drain.

The job of recovering the diamonds was left up to George Hamilton, \$25-a-week sewer employee, who volunteered to undertake the task.

Hamilton gave up hope six weeks ago. Then, he said, he had a dream.

"I dreamed," he said, "the rings were in a manhole about a half block from the house."

Today he found one of the rings in that manhole, the other in the next manhole. He collected a reward of \$800.

Auditorium Row Goes Into Court

SEATTLE, Aug. 22.—(P)—A controversy over the city's refusal to lease the civic auditorium for a communist rally, to be addressed by National Leader Earl Browder, went into superior court today.

City representatives contended they were justified in their refusal because the party is linked to the communist international and advocates violent seizure of the government.

Henry P. Huff of Olympia, the party's northwest chairman, denied the party advocated violence but conceded it was linked to the international. He professed ignorance of the party's financing or any records of the meeting at which he was named chairman.

City building Supt. Joseph Little testified: "I feared there would be a riot if we leased the building to the communists."

Judge Chester Batchelor's ruling is expected tomorrow.

(Japan's intentions toward the French possession of Indo-China are a matter of world interest; Turkey is important to Japan because of Russia's nebulous relations with the guardian of the Dardanelles; Brazil is an important sphere of economic expansion for the Japanese; they are still at war with China.)

Ministers affected include those to Canada and Mexico.

Meanwhile authorities stated that, despite several versions of Jackson's nationality, he had United States citizenship papers when he visited Mexico in 1938 and 1939, although he subsequently entered as a Canadian.

(In Chicago, Albert Goldman, Trotsky's American attorney, said Jackson, also known as Jacques Vandendresch, had admitted "he was ordered by the OGPU to kill Trotsky or forfeit the life of his mother in Russia.")
