Bonneville Favored In West Salem Poll

WEST SALEM—If sample poll procedure can predict the outcome of an election then West Salem voters will ballot a go-ahead signal to the Bonneville power bond issue question September 16. A poll taken of 40 West Salem voters yesterday showed 37 in favor and three against Bonneville power.

The poll was conducted at random throughout the community with housewives giving the majority of answers. Most of the housewives thought, made the remark, "Well, my husband thinks..." before answering the questions.

One woman objector said she would not vote in the affirmative because she held stock in the company now supplying power to West Salem.

Of those in favor, 16 said they would prefer Bonneville power because it would be "cheaper," while the balance were divided between, "I don't like the service they give us," and "Well, it couldn't cost any more, why not try it?" One individual said he had a "violent" dislike for one of the power company officials.

Box score on the poll is as follows:

Will you vote in the affirmative or negative on the bond issue question September 16? Affirmative, 37; negative 3.

Is your reason a personal one? Affirmative 4; negative 36.

A supplementary question asked with the above questions was, "Do you think West Salem should incorporate as a fire district and buy its own fire fighting equipment now that Salem has voted against free outside calls?" Eight persons didn't "care one way or another," while the remaining 32 thought "it would be a good idea," and "How else can we get good fire protection?"

Torch Parade Plans Started

Will Be Event of Friday for Hop Fiesta at Independence

INDEPENDENCE—All entries to the torchlight parade for the Hop Fiesta will assemble on E street by 7:30 next Friday night, August 30; the parade being scheduled to start promptly at 8 o'clock.

The line of march will start at Main and E street and continue north on Main to B street, west on B street to Second, south on Second to Monmouth and west on Monmouth to Third and Fourth streets.

There will be six awards given for the different divisions and the judges of the parade will be Howard Morlan, Marvin Davidson, Barney Howard and Oscar Groves, all of Monmouth.

The torch lights will be given to walking entries in the parade at intervals in the parade after the marching has started, according to G. S. Westerman who is in charge of this feature.

Ralph Kleitzing, general chairman of the parade for the Independence Lions club, sponsoring the parade, will be assisted by Lee Eyerly, Eugene MacCarthy and members of the Marion county mounted posse, who will also participate in the parade.

All those entering floats in the parade are asked to supply as much illumination as possible for their floats. Extra lights will be installed along Main street.

William Noble, chief of police, announces that he will have additional officers to assist in regulating traffic. Highway traffic will be routed from Main street and Monmouth to B and Fourth streets during the parade.

All entries in the parade should sign entry blanks and leave them at the Hop Fiesta headquarters.

Funeral Is Today For Mrs. Martin

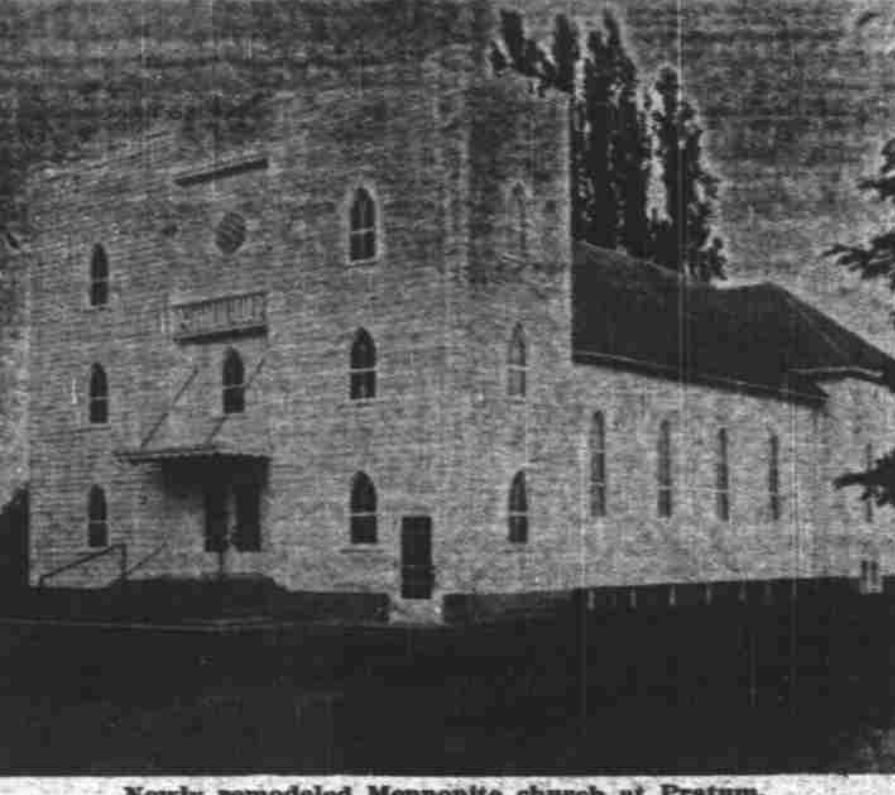
ALBANY — Mrs. Mary Munkers Martin, 65, a resident of Oregon for the past 50 years, died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Aeneas M. Barrick of route four, Albany, Thursday. Funeral services are to be held Saturday morning at 10 o'clock from the Fort Miller Funeral home. Burial will be in the Miller cemetery at Seilo.

Mary Woodmansee was born on July 14, 1875, at Bieber, Calif. In 1890 she came to Oregon and had since then made her home here, the greater part of the time in Linn county. December 31, 1894, she was married to I. A. Munkers, who was sheriff of Linn county for a number of terms, and also served in the state legislature from the same county. He died in 1930 and in 1931 his widow was married to P. H. Martin at Corvallis.

Mrs. Martin was a member of the Christian church and for many years was an active member of the Neighbors of Woodcraft.

Surviving are the widower and two daughters, Mrs. Aeneas Barrick of Albany and Mrs. Margaret Henderson of Chehalis, Wash., a brother, E. A. Woodmansee of Seilo, and three grandchildren, Mary Al Barrick of Albany, and Jerry Boone and Iralene Elder of Chehalis.

Church to Be Redecorated Sunday

Ceremony Will Mark 50th Year of Church

PRATUM — Members of the Emmanuel Mennonite church of Pratum will observe the 50th anniversary of the church and will dedicate the newly remodeled building Sunday at 1:30.

The church was first organized in 1890 at a site one and one-half miles east of Pratum on the Kissing place. Rev. John Rich served as first pastor for five years. Rev. Peter Gerig, the next pastor, preached there for 15 years. The next 15 years Rev. S. S. Baumgartner, now of Portland, served the church and the last 15 years Rev. John M. Franz, recently moved to Albany, was the pastor.

There were 35 charter members, 14 of whom are living and eight of whom are regularly attending there now.

The remodeled church as it now stands is a far cry from the small building which was first rented for meetings. In 1909 a building was erected at the present site at Pratum. Attendance steadily increased and in 1930 a full basement was added and electric lights and furnace installed. The church has now grown to be one of the largest rural churches in Oregon and again it has become necessary to provide more room, especially Sunday school class rooms.

The present remodeling job has provided 10 new class rooms and a larger auditorium and balcony, increasing the seating capacity to include 100 more seats.

The dedicatory program will include opening songs by congregation; scripture reading and prayer; Rev. Arnold Regier of Portland; highlights of past 50 years; Dan Steiner; German song by members of former choir; message by Rev. S. S. Baumgartner; presentation of charter members; song by congregation; selection by young men's quartet; talk by Rev. Homer Leisy of Dallas; song by choir; dedicatory sermon by Rev. John M. Franz of Albany; closing prayer and benediction.

Lebanon Park Work Talked

Council Authorizes Board to Improve Riverside Park Property

LEBANON—The city council at their last meeting authorized the park board to spend up to \$500 for improvement of the Riverside park and cleaning the Krumi property. It was suggested that a new bath house, a permanent structure of concrete, might be built with NYA labor.

It was also decided that an engineer should be hired to make a survey of the present sewer system in order that plans might be made for improving it.

Property owners on Ross street presented a petition asking that plans for the paving of that street be abandoned. The petition was read and placed on file subject to the opinion of the city attorney. No action was taken on the matter of widening the pavement on Park street between East Grant and East Ash streets. But the council ordered 44-foot paving on East Ash street between Main and Park. That will mean the paving of the parking strip from the alley to Park. The parking strip by the IOOF hall between Main and the alley has already been used for diagonal parking.

The building committee reported 16 permits issued in August for construction to cost \$6115. The remodeling of the old creamery into a six lane bowling alley and restaurant will cost \$500, it was stated in the application by Gerald Joseph for a building permit. New dwellings with garages will be built by John Duriam, Mrs. Mary Gould and two by Edward Bohle. These houses will cost \$800, \$1000, and \$1250 each.

Thomas Gaseley will build a 6,000 sq. ft. shop combined; C. P. Kleint, a bee supply house, Scott-Christman, a new shed. Permits for remodeling dwellings were asked by Clarence Shimanek, James Jennings, E. C. Dalley and Carrie Corryell. Mrs. Emma Belinger, Mrs. M. DeYoung, E. P. Durst and J. N. Donac applied for permits to alter woodsheds and garages.
