Meat Loaf Has Rice Filler

A meat loaf that includes rice makes a good family dinner dish.

MEAT LOAF WITH RICE
2 cups cooked rice
1 pound ground pork
¼ cup chopped onion
¼ teaspoon pepper
2 pounds ground beef
¼ cup ground raw carrot
1 tablespoon salt
1 egg milk (or evaporated milk)
Combine all ingredients thoroughly. Shape in a well oiled baking pan. Bake. Yield: 12 servings. Temperature: 350 degrees. Time: 1 hour.

Cut tops off tomatoes, set in pan of water in the oven and bake until soft but not broken up. Scoop out center and fill with scrambled eggs. May add the to-

mato pulp to the eggs as they are being cooked. Garnish with parsley and serve very hot.
FROSTED GRAPEFRUIT
1 teaspoon plain gelatin
¼ cups grapefruit sections and juice
¼ cup water
½ cup sugar
Peppermint flavoring
Green vegetable coloring
Soften gelatin in ¼ cup of grapefruit juice. Combine water and sugar; stir over low heat until sugar is dissolved. Add softened gelatin; stir until dissolved. Combine with remaining grapefruit juice and sections. Add a few drops of peppermint flavoring and green vegetable coloring to make a delicate green. Pour into tray of automatic refrigerator, set the cold control at coldest point. Freeze until firm but not hard. To serve, pile into grapefruit shells or tall stemmed glasses. Makes 4 servings.

You can remove green grass stains from flannels by applying a mixture of equal portions of fruit juice and glycerine. Wash in the usual manner after an hour or two.

Creamy Pudding Has Fruit

Fruit and milk are excellent teammates in any children's dessert. The following recipe, made with quick-cooking tapioca and a choice blend of whole-fruit nectar (found in cans at your grocer's) is not only beautiful for youngsters, but tastes mighty good to the grownups.
PEACH-NECTARINE CREAMY PUDDING
1½ cups peach-nectarine nectar
3 tablespoons quick-cooking tapioca
¼ teaspoon salt
2 tablespoons butter
16 marshmallows
¼ cup table cream or top milk.
Combine nectar, tapioca, salt and butter in a sauce pan. Cook over direct heat until tapioca is clear (5 to 6 minutes), stirring continuously. Remove from heat, add marshmallows and stir until marshmallows are melted. Add cream and stir to blend. Chill. For variation, use apricot, pear or peach nectar of the whole-fruit variety. Serves 4 to 5.
