

Double Parking Problem Talked

Albany Traffic Officers Consider Regulation of Parking

ALBANY—Once again the question of double parking on Albany streets, especially in the business section, is being taken up by city police officers. Ever so often the question arises and for awhile the police apparently have the upper hand on the motorists. However as soon as parking is apparently on a lawful basis and the police relax their vigilance, the motorists again start to double park. At present this has become so bad that often times a line of four or five cars are stopped by drivers leaving their cars double parked on either side of the street.

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Opening Dates Set by Schools

Four Linn County Schools to Start September 3; Some Undermined

ALBANY—Of the 141 school districts in Linn county, four of the schools will open on Tuesday, September 3, while nine others are scheduled to open a week later, September 9. Twenty-six others have set the opening date for September 16, two for September 22 and one for September 25. There still remain 94 districts to announce the time for opening their schools, and so far only one of the four union high schools of the county has set a date to open. County School Superintendent J. M. Bennett is awaiting the registering of certificates from teachers in these districts before announcing the opening. The Sweet Home union high school will commence the fall term on September 9.

Starting Tuesday, September 3, will be the Gates-Stridger, Crescent Hill, and Detroit school. The following Monday Providence, Center, Union Point, Fox Valley, Berlin, Shelburne, Brush Creek, Foster and Mill City schools will start.

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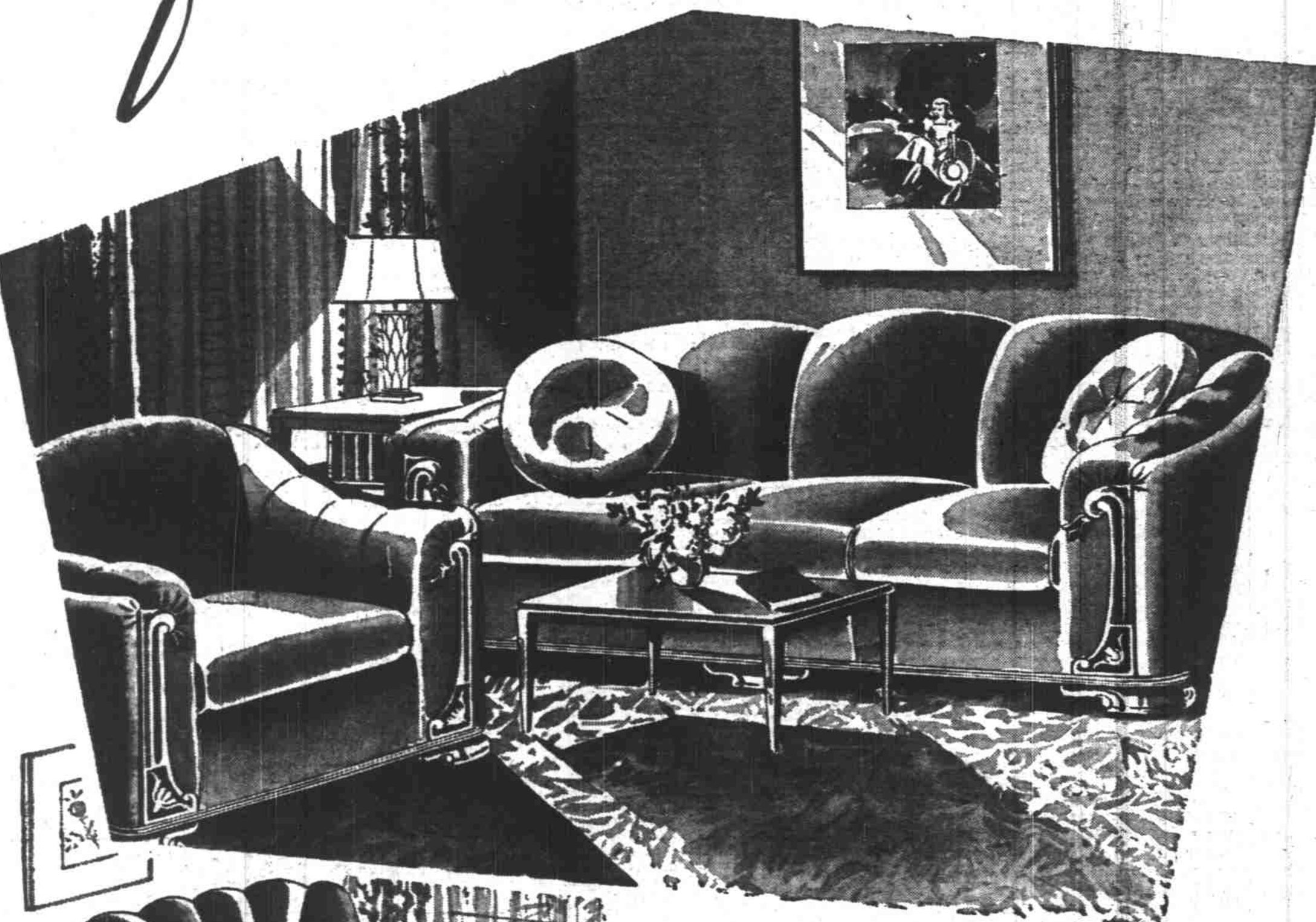
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
