

Unemployment Rulings Made

UCC Says Beneficiaries Must Be Actively in Labor Market

Persons entitled to unemployment insurance must be actively in the labor market and, if self-employed, must establish their availability for a suitable job, referees for the unemployment compensation commission declared in recent decisions.

The decisions were based on recent rules and regulations adopted by the commission.

A Vale mechanic who started an auto repair shop was denied benefits because of turning down job offers even though his income at times was less than insurance payments.

A waitress who moved from Hood River after marriage was refused benefits because her contact of one jewelry shop in The Dalles did not establish availability in her line of work.

"Closers and contractors" for a Portland asbestos firm were found ineligible because of "freedom from control" and being "independently established." Contractors received 10 per cent commission and closers \$50 per net profits under a "service contract."

A Eugene woman who worked in the same laundry for 20 years refused to go back to the employer who reprimanded her for unsatisfactory work. She was disqualified for four weeks.

A number of other similar decisions were cited by the commission referees.

Chest Drive Plans Talked

Committee Heads Decide Against Publication of Contributors

Plans for the annual Community Chest drive, which will begin October 1, went forward during a regularly scheduled meeting of the chest campaign committee heads this week.

The group solved a problem previously discussed in which the matter of publishing names of contributors to the chest was at stake by deciding against any such publication. The decision was made following report of a committee detailed to investigate the subject.

Frank B. Bennett, chairman of the publicity committee, reported on plans for educating the public in community chest work through schools, churches and other organizations. He indicated further that all fraternal and civic organizations have been asked to sponsor community chest programs, and all large employers have been asked to furnish dates on which speakers can address employees on the activities of the chest.

Drive chairmen were requested to submit lists of team captains before the next meeting of the organization on September 6.

Anti-Picket Law Will Be Reheard

Rearguments Scheduled for all Supreme Court Judges

Rearguments in the suit attacking the constitutionality of the Oregon anti-picketing law will be heard by the state supreme court early in October, Chief Justice John L. Rand said yesterday.

At the time of the original arguments two members of the court, Justices Henry L. Bean and Joe Bailey, were absent.

Constitutionality of the act was attacked by the CIO and AFL on the ground that it curbed free speech and was in violation of both the state and federal constitutions.

The law was approved by the voters of Oregon at the general election in 1935 and later was upheld by three circuit judges sitting in Multnomah county.

Defendants in the suit included Attorney General I. H. VanWinkle, District Attorney Bain of Multnomah county and other officials.

Ram Knocks Down And Hurts Woman

ROSEBURG, Aug. 23.—(P)—Mrs. Allen Jackson, about 60, was in serious condition tonight after she was knocked down and trampled by a ram at her Quine's creek farm home.

Mrs. Jackson's face and head were deeply cut and bruised and physicians feared she might have suffered internal injuries.

Happy Birthday to Cue Ball Is Event At Cannery; Employees Fete Student

"Happy birthday, Cue Ball" was the ringing cry of some 200 employees of the Hunt Brothers Packing company at 12:45 yesterday morning.

Irwin L. Gifford, fondly called by his fellow employees, "Cue Ball," is 30 years old. A native of Switzerland, Gifford moved to the United States 10 years ago, and since then he had variously attended college at the Universities of Michigan, Arizona, Southern California, and at Oregon State college.

Coming to Salem to work in a cannery this summer to enable his return to college, this immigrant, now a naturalized American citizen, secured employment with Hunt Brothers.

Working as a can checker, he soon became acquainted with all of the employees on the night crew, and he immediately was the center of attention. Bald, he was thus tagged "Baldy" and "Cue Ball."

And so it was that for the only time in the cannery's history, employees "threw" a big birthday party. The event took place the last 15 minutes of the lunch hour.

As usual, when 12 o'clock has struck, the help went out for dinner—that is, all except a few tray boys and cook room men, who were soon a center of activity. These workers soon moved a table into the center, hoisted a large sign, five by nine feet into the rafters, brought in the numerous presents, and prepared the \$30 candles for the large cake.

At 12:45, Gifford was persuaded to go inside; he noticed that everyone was "going back to work."

All the while Gifford had not noticed the large sign overhead, but a pointing finger soon brought a new note of surprise to his face. On it in foot-high letters he saw, "Happy Birthday, Cue Ball, Thirty Years Today."

Then "Cue Ball" happily saw that every employee received a taste of his birthday cake.

Work Progressing On Bank Addition

Old Building Being Wholly Razed; Barricade Is Visual Evidence

This week visual evidence of the extensive expansion plans for the Ladd and Bush-Salem branch of the United States National bank appeared in the way of a sidewalk barricade adjoining the bank's premises on the new property recently purchased from the Patton interests. Behind the barricade intense activity will prevail in an endeavor to expedite new construction as quickly as possible, state the officials of the bank.

The present building on the newly purchased property will be entirely wrecked and then will come the hauling away and disposal of the old materials while materials for the new building are being assembled. Excavation of full basement area also must proceed.

According to the bank's officials, the general contractor responsible for the entire job is the firm of Drake, Wyman and Voss, Inc., of Portland, and it is promised that the utmost pressure will be exerted to complete the new expansion of quarters and facilities as quickly as is possible.

The improvement is one of the most important pieces of construction in Salem during the year and it is understood to represent a considerable investment for the bank to provide increased accessibility for its customers.

It is pointed out both by the bank's executives and the general contractor that sub-contracts in every case possible, as well as local labor and materials, will be from Salem.

Board to Inspect Lake County Area

Members of the state land board will fly to Lake county Saturday where they will inspect part of 25,000 acres of land acquired by the state many years ago under the federal swamp land act. The land lies in Warner valley.

The purpose of the inspection trip is to work out some plan whereby this land can be placed under cultivation and irrigation and produce increased revenue for the common school fund. The land is now used for grazing purposes.

Members of the land board are the governor, secretary of state and state treasurer. They will be accompanied by Lewis Griffith, secretary of the board.

Teeth Recovered But Oyster Is Using Them now

The judgment has been hanging over the city for some years.

An ordinance providing for the dedication of the new street in front of the high school was also passed.

Adjustments Are Urged in Schools

Putnam Says 979 One-Room Institutions in State Are too Many

McMINNVILLE, Aug. 23.—(P)—School system administrative and financial adjustments to remove "great variation in the ability to educate children in many counties," were urged yesterday by Rex Putnam.

The state superintendent of public instruction said schools have not been able to complete the legislative requirement for a uniform and general system because application is up to individual school boards.

Putnam told a service club that differences in educational advantages resulted from the varying wealth of school districts. One county, he pointed out, has only \$550 per capita behind each student, while another has \$30,527.

Of Oregon's 1776 elementary schools, 979 are one-room institutions.

"We have some splendid work being done in one-room schools but, unfortunately, we also have some very poor work," Putnam said. "From the standpoint of efficiency, economy and service to our boys and girls, 979 one-room schools seem too many in Oregon."

"Some one-room schools could be consolidated with elimination of teachers, cutting down of overhead and increase of good educational service. We will change from year to year to better conditions but we have great variation in ability to educate children between the different counties."

Money for Bike, Then Bike Itself Stolen, Portland

PORTLAND, Aug. 23.—(P)—Young Wallis Traylor was afoot again today, and very sad about it.

Three years ago he ended a long period of saving by scraping together enough cash for a bicycle. He left his bank on a streetcar and never saw it again.

Another year or so passed and Wallis again hoarded pennies enough to buy a wheel.

Yesterday an unidentified boy gave him a quarter for a ride around the block.

The boy and bicycle did not return.

Will Vote on New Airport and Pool

EUGENE, Aug. 23.—(P)—Eugene will vote in November on a new super-airport site and a municipal swimming pool to go with a projected sewage disposal plant.

A levy of three mills for two years to buy a mile-square airport site for \$75,000 was referred to a ballot by city councilmen last night. Another proposal to build a \$26,000 swimming pool with another two mill levy also will be voted on.

Water users, paying a few cents each month, were notified they had paid \$28,000 toward construction of a sewage disposal plant. Councilmen ordered tests of the Willamette river preparatory to starting construction.

Pickpockets Do Well at McNary Notifying Rites
