Salem Lads in Boeing Plant

Placement Followed Course in Vocational School at Salem High

Two Salem lads, Oran Robertson and Howard Ames, have found satisfactory placement in the Boeing plants at Seattle, according to word received by C. A. Guder, local supervisor of the Salem vocational schools. The placement followed the completion of the intensive training course in aviation sheet metal with related courses in drawing and blueprint reading, as well as 20 hours in first aid training.

The aviation sheet metal course is one of some half dozen courses which have been carried on during the past six weeks at the Salem school as part of the program of vocational education of defense workers, sponsored by the state board for vocational education.

With the regular vocational courses suspended for the summer, the facilities of the local school were immediately utilized when the national training program started the middle of June. And then to meet the unusual demands for an extension of the program, new instructors have been added to the staff of the Salem school, State Director O. D. Adams reports. For the courses in drawing and blueprint reading, Bernard Morse and George E. Brant are the new instructors, and for the large enrollment in sheet metal classes, John Anderson and Joe Bray have been added to the staff of instructors.

When the regular vocational school courses reopen September 14, it is expected that the intensive training courses for defense workers will be shifted from the present day schedule to night classes at the Salem school, as President Roosevelt's request the other day for an additional \$25,000,000 from congress to expand the vocational training program of courses essential to defense industries points to a greater energizing of the various local defense preparations.

Selective Draft Plans Are Told

Dr. Pound Is Speaker at Rotary; Niel Allen Surprise Visitor

Presentation of selective service details to Oregon will be made for the first time by Governor Charles A. Sprague at the American Legion state convention in Seaside next week. Major B. F. Pound, ONSG, said yesterday, in speaking at the local Rotary club luncheon.

Major Pound, chairman of the Marion county republican central committee, discussed some of the major provisions of the draft, indicating that if the national guard is called out for a year's training later in the month, as expected, he would be forced to resign as he and all others called into military service would not be permitted to vote.

Selective service should be passed by congress within the next few days, Major Pound predicted. Surprise visitor and speaker of the day was Niel R. Allen, state commander of the American Legion from Grants Pass and past president of his local Rotary club. Allen conferred with Governor Sprague yesterday relative to Oregon participation and plans for conscription.

4 Are Arrested For Fire Chasing

Four automobile drivers following too closely behind fire fighting apparatus were arrested by state troopers during July. Charles P. Fray, superintendent of the state police department, reported to Governor Charles A. Sprague yesterday. They were fined \$5 each.

Fifty-five persons were arrested for state troopers while under the influence of intoxicating liquor.

There were 1244 arrests in the traffic division of the state police department with fines of \$9724.50. Arrests in the general law enforcement division numbered 259.

Other arrests involved 96 persons charged with violation of the state game code and 11 for alleged violation of the commercial fisheries code.

Fourteen persons arrested by state police were held for other law enforcement agencies.
