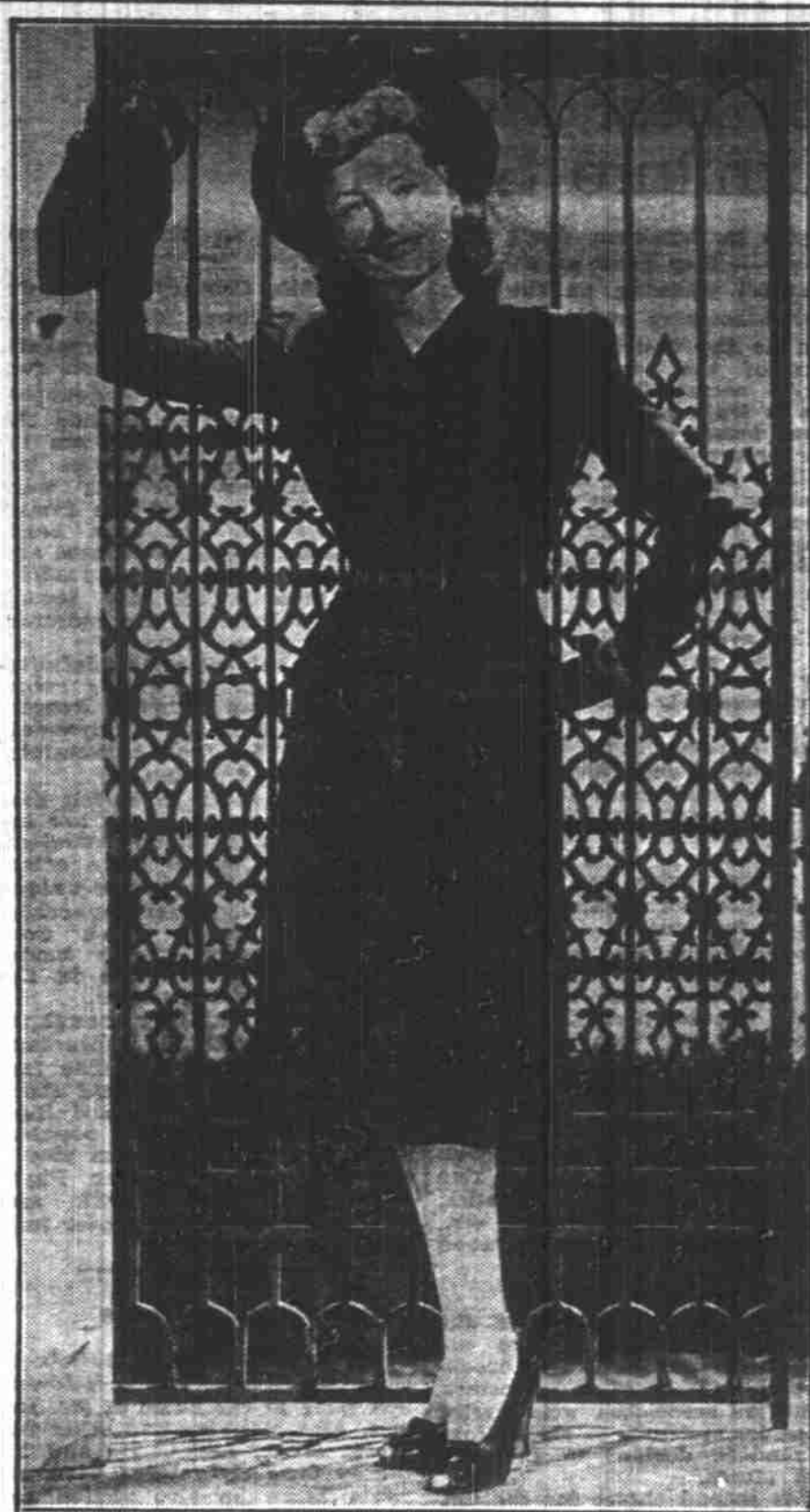
The bride's mother wore an afternoon gown of delphinium blue with matching hat and corsage of roses.
