Conscription Answers Told

General Groups of Those Exempted and Service Period Noted

WASHINGTON, Aug. 29.—(AP)—Here are questions which some may be asking about the effect of the conscription bill—and the answers.

Who is liable to the draft under the bill passed by the senate? All men between 21 and 30 inclusive.

What are they required to do? On a day to be specified by the president, they must register at a place in their communities still to be designated.

Will all who register be called? No.

Who will be called? That will be determined by a drawing of numbers.

Must all whose numbers are drawn go to military camp? All except men with dependents and with physical and mental deficiencies.

Are conscientious objectors liable to the draft? Not if they can prove the good faith of their objections, but they are still subject to a year of non-combatant work or work of national importance under civilian direction.

Are divinity students and clergymen exempt? Yes.

Who will supervise these things? Local draft boards, under a national director to be appointed by the president.

How long must the drafted men serve? Twelve consecutive months.

Are they then free from liability for military service? No.

For ten years they are to be members of the army reserve, subject to call in crisis or war-time.

Is there any way in which that period can be shortened? Yes.

By serving two years in the regular army, after the one year of compulsory training.

Is there any protection for the jobs of the men drafted? The bill requires their employer to reemploy them when their period of training is over, unless his circumstances have so changed in the meanwhile as to make it impossible.

May a man who is called send a substitute? No.

How long is conscription to be in force? Until May 1, 1945.

He's Heartbroken At Missing Rites

PORTLAND, Aug. 29.—(AP)—Joseph L. Singer, "minority" doorkeeper in the United States senate, arrived Wednesday, "heartbroken" because he missed Senator Charles L. McNary's acceptance of the republican vice-presidential nomination.

"I was 22 hours late and it just broke my heart," Singer said. The doorkeeper, for years sergeant-at-arms of the Oregon house of representatives, said the delay occurred because a plane he occupied was delayed by bad weather.

Brightening, Singer added that republican chances in the November election "look like a million dollars. What might happen before election I don't know, but if the election were held today Willie and McNary would sweep the country."

Singer visited in Salem on Thursday.

Ten Persons Hurt In Rail Accident

MILBANK, SD, Aug. 29.—(AP)—Ten persons were injured, three seriously Wednesday as a passenger train from Aberdeen to Minneapolis went off a detour track around the scene of a freight train wreck on the Milwaukee railroad near Marvin, SD. Two transients—Dane Miller, 20, of Mishawaka, Ind., and Roscoe Lecount, 22, Letonier, Ind.—were so badly crushed in the wreckage that each underwent a leg amputation at the Milbank hospital.

Fred Pedlar, 66, Montevideo, Minn., the engineer, suffered a crushed right arm which was amputated at Webster, SD, tonight.

Held in Portland Under Theft Act

PORTLAND, Aug. 29.—(AP)—US Marshal's Deputy W. H. Hadlock said David Pines, charged with removing \$79,000 in counterfeit securities from Minneapolis, Minn., to Council Bluffs, Ia., waived removal hearing today.

Hadlock said Pines, charged under the national stolen property act at Council Bluffs, was held under \$10,000 bond after his arrest by federal bureau of investigation agents.

HILLSBORO, Ore., Aug. 29.—(AP)—When Holger Kverndal, 39, Astoria, grew drowsy on a Portland street last night he climbed into the rear seat of a parked

car for a nap. He woke up today in the garage of the home of Mrs. Jack Moore, Beaverton, roused the neighborhood trying to get out and was arrested on a charge of creating a disturbance. Mrs. Moore told Justice A. W. Havens she had driven home without realizing the car had another occupant. Justice Havens fined Kverndal \$5.

Blockade Is not Enough, Asserts Norse Navy Man

PORTLAND, Aug. 29.—(AP)—Vice-Admiral Christian Sparre of the Norwegian navy said today he could not "see the end of this war."

"I am sure of one thing," the 51-year-old retired admiral told an interviewer. "Germany can not be defeated by the blockade alone."
"Italy perhaps can not stand a tight blockade, but I think Great Britain will need aid to make a complete blockade of the axis powers. This may come through trouble in the Balkans."
Sparre, a historian and novelist, was on a vacation trip to

South America at the time of the Norwegian invasion and said he was unable to return home.
