

Chicago Grain Closes Strong

Near Peak for Session Reached; Wheat Higher Than on Saturday

CHICAGO, Sept. 3.—(AP)—Chicago grain futures closed strong today at or near the best prices for the session after moving erratically earlier over a range of about one cent.

Wheat finished 1/4-1/2 cent higher than Saturday's final quotations upon a late display of strength at Minneapolis distributed to mill buyers. Closing prices were September 74 1/2, December 76 1/4, May 77 3/8.

The market opened strong in sympathy with securities and upon buying by mills and local interests, but profit taking sales after the first hour forced a reaction which dropped quotations to below the previous closing levels.

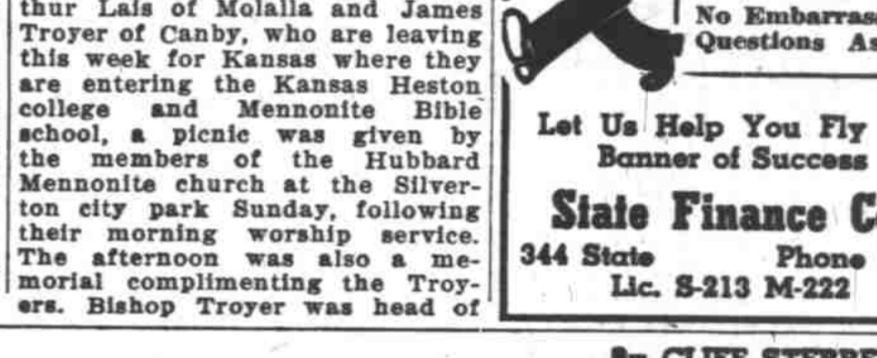
Lebanon Builds New Dwellings

Plywood Plant to Increase Need for Houses; Several Under Construction

LEBANON—While the Evans Products company, which is building the new plywood mill here, maintains the policy of hiring local workers, they are bringing in the managers and technicians from their other plants. That means an increased demand for houses. There has been a rapid increase in construction all spring and summer, and though there are about 25 new dwellings under way now, still more will be needed as soon as actual operations at the new plywood mill begin. To relieve this housing shortage, George Harden will erect 40 houses between now and the first of the year. The capital is to be furnished by the First Federal Savings and Loan association of Albany. According to R. C. Miller, secretary of the association, Harden will be guaranteed the sale of each dwelling as it is completed. If the houses are not immediately sold to individual buyers, the Evans company will assume the obligation of renting and selling them.
