Cash Farm Income Doubles in State

CORVALLIS, Sept. 11-(AP)-Cash farm income from Oregon's specialty crops has practically doubled in the last four years, the Oregon State college extension service estimated today. The cash return in 1936 slight-

ly exceeded \$11,000,000, compared with \$21,932,300 in 1939. Specialty crops included various forage seeds, hops, sugar

beets, fiber flax, flax seed, peppermint, various berry and nut crops, horticultural products such as nursery stock, bulbs, flowers and holly, specialty animal products including turkeys, fur and game animals and bee products. The Willamette valley produced \$16,225,560 in such crops, approximately three-fourths of the state total.
