High School Students in 41st May Continue Studies while in Army Through Correspondence Schools

High school students who are enlisted in the 41st division are to continue their school studies while in service, it was said here today by Major General George A. White, division commander, following a conference with Rex Putnam, state superintendent of public instruction and Putnam's assistant, Lester A. Wilcox.

A system of correspondence schools, proposed by Putnam, was agreed upon. Under this plan, Putnam will ask superintendents of all high schools in Oregon to prepare lessons for individual students. These lessons will then be sent to the division training camp at Camp Murray, Fort Lewis. At that place, they will be

received by regimental educational teams, detailed by General White for supervision of high school instruction.

Those working at the Camp Murray end of the program will include regimental chaplains and officers having past experience as high school instructors. Lessons prepared by students will be returned by military officers to the high school for grading. Putnam indicated that a system of credits could be worked out whereby high school students would be able to keep up with their school work.

Under the plan of cooperation worked out today, Superintendent Putnam will enlist all high school principals in the plan and General White will organize the instruction schools at the division camp.

Ed a c a t i o n a l authorities in Washington, Montana, Idaho and Wyoming were asked today by General White to cooperate in the Putnam plan of correspondence schools.

While no detailed figures were available, it was estimated that there are at least 2000 high school students in the entire division whose total strength is 13,000 officers and men.

Future Farmers Score With Exhibits; Average of Team Is High

SILVERTON — Future Farmers and their exhibits returned to Silverton late Sunday night after a big week at the state fair. The local group exhibited 12 head of dairy animals, 23 head of swine, 1 pen of 12 White Leghorn hens in egg laying contest, and 18 farm shop exhibits.

Calvin Mikkelsen won first on his Jersey cow in the aged cow division. She was also judged champion aged cow of all breeds.

His entry in the young cow class placed second.

Dan Van Brocklin's senior yearling Jersey placed 3d. Lee Reeder took 5th place with his junior yearling. Lester Bengli won 3d in dairy showmanship. His senior yearling Jersey bull placed 6th in the open class division.

In the swine division Dale Herigstad won 1st on his Chester White sow; Carl Reed 1st on his Berkshire sow; Calvin Mikkelsen 2d on a Hampshire sow and 4th on a Hampshire gilt; Clare Brown 6th on a Hampshire sow; Ronald Wood 5th and 6th on Berkshire gilts.

Lester Bengli, Amos Funnus and Bill Strom all showed a pen of three market hogs. Funnus' entry placed 5th. After they were shown these three entries were purchased by buyers.

In the poultry division Reuben Ditchen's pen of White Leghorn hens placed 5th in the egg laying contest.

Shop division winners were: Don Jacquet, 1st on trailer; Howard Mader, 3d on sacker; Paul Jones, 3d on stock trailer; John Lichter, 5th on automatic hog waterer; Don Steffin, 3d on spray boom; Ruebich Ditchen, 3d on cultivator repair job; Amos Funnus, 3d on saw filing rack; Dale Herigstad 2d on horse halter and 6th on milk stool.

The judging contests were very popular with the local boys and in the 24 teams competing Silverton placed 3d with 2469. Nestucca made first with 2514; Gresham 2d with 2497; Corvallis 4th with 2441; Cottage Grove 5th with 2417.

Silverton's team was composed of Lee Reeder, Lester Bengli and John Lichter. Lee Reeder was third high individual in the contest with a score of 372½ out of a possible 1600. Silverton was 2d high team in judging Jersey cows and 2d in judging Holsteins. John Lichter placed 4th in individual judging of Jerseys. Lee Reeder was high individual in Holstein with a score of 194 out of a possible 200.
