

Scio School Has Teacher Meeting

Registration Date Will Be September 16; Building Gets Improvement

SCIO — An organization meeting for Scio teachers will be held at the school house at 11:30 a. m. September 14, following which Principal J. A. Bliss and Mrs. Bliss will be hosts to the staff at luncheon.

Four teachers in each of the high school and grades will be on hand for registration and assignments September 16.

High school instructors and subjects are: J. A. Bliss, principal, social economics, world history, US history and government, bookkeeping and high school basketball; Alice Arnold, Forest Grove, typing, shorthand, sewing and girls' physical education; Vernon Hansen, Portland, biology, mathematics, personal and business relations, general science, football and freshman basketball; Irene Neugart, English, Latin and music; Cecil Miller has been elected principal and instructor in the 7th and 8th grades, replacing Geoffrey Marsh, who resigned after reelection.

Other grade teachers will be Mrs. Ray Jaynes and Mildred Henderson, intermediate, and Mrs. Vernon Hansen, primary.

Bliss states 700 volumes in the high school library have been completely catalogued. One third of these, however, are obsolete text books, and it is planned to add two new books each month.

Installation of showers and electrical facilities under the gymnasium stage is expected to begin in the immediate future, with improvements making the gym adequate for all school functions. The high school student body last year purchased a curtain for the stage, and additional spectators' seats were constructed by townspeople. Labor for the new project will be supplied by WPA.
