Apples, Potatoes Go Together

Sweet potatoes, extra good in markets now, combined with apples to make a vegetable to go with chicken or turkey. Here's the way to prepare the dish:

GLAZED SWEET POTATOES AND APPLES

3 large sweet potatoes
1/4 cup brown sugar
4 tablespoons water
4 tablespoons butter
1 apple, cored
1/2 cup white sugar
2 tablespoons water

Dissolve sugar and water. Slice cored apples 1/4-inch thick. (More attractive if skins are left on.) Boil potatoes in jackets, remove skins, cut in round slices 1/4-inch thick. Dissolve brown sugar and butter in water, add potatoes and apple rings. Cook slowly in syrup 15 minutes. The oven may be used at 500 degrees. Bake potatoes until they have a rich glaze.

LEMON DRESSING
1/4 cup sugar
4 tablespoons lemon juice
1 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon each mustard and paprika
1 cup oil
Mix dry ingredients, then add 1 tablespoon oil and lemon juice, beat, and add remaining slowly. The mixture thickens somewhat.

Markets Are Cooking Aids

Markets show generous variety for the menu maker, who plans three meals a day and welcomes new fruits and vegetables.

Squash family shows a large number of kinds, with acorn, crook neck, scalloped and banana making up the summer varieties, and marthead and Danish for winter baking.

Peas, green and shell beans and corn will lend interest to family menus.

Spinach, lettuce, broccoli, cauliflower and Brussels sprouts, cauliflower and mustard greens are listed as the leafy green family.

For root vegetables, the shopper will find beets, new turnips and parsnips, carrots, radishes (both the small red and the large white kinds), green and dry onions.

Even potatoes offer variety, with a new purple novelty appearing to be used in salads.

There are plenty of peppers, green and red, and the small hot for pickling on the markets today.

Eggplant is abundant now, and good to serve with lamb.

Tomatoes are good for canning or to eat fresh in salads. They will go with cucumbers.

Then there are fruits: pomegranates, citrus fruits of many kinds, avocados, grapes, melons, strawberries, peaches, blueberries and bananas make up the impressive list to be found at the local markets.

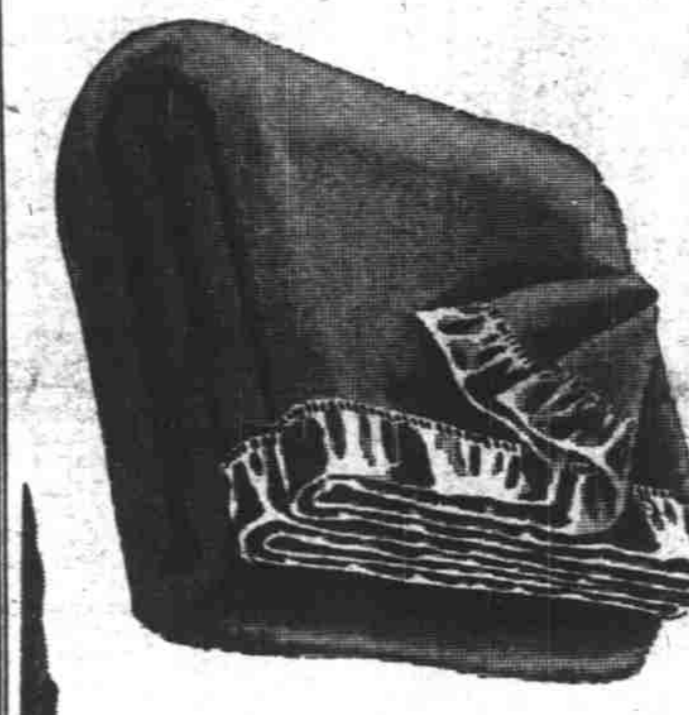

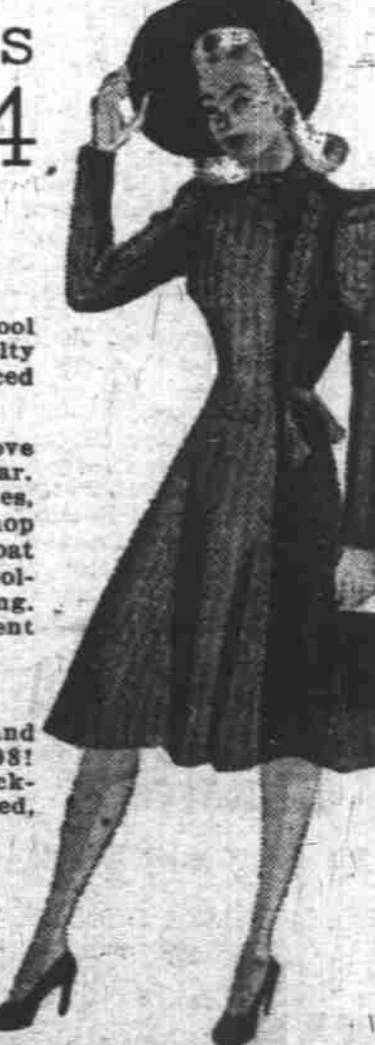
