

Justice Courts Change Accounts

New report forms, designed to aliminate mistakes in accounting in Mar'on county's seven justice courts, were received yesterday from the County Treasurer Lawrence A. Rich.

Prepared by Rich in response to a need pointed out recently by state auditors, the new form sheets are expected to offer an exact check on all financial transactions which take place in justice courts in connection with criminal cases.

Rich pointed out yesterday that the county has recently been as-sessed \$522.65 by the state for fines which were improperly reported or disposed of by justice dent announcers, Chosen for the court authorities.

Under previous management, no means has been afforded the county treasurer to check reports of justice courts for accuracy in stating fines and disposition of fines.
