

Indians Set Celebration

North Lincoln Beaches to Welcome Redmen for Next Weekend

DEPOE BAY, Oct. 5.—History of the early Oregon coast is to repeat itself here next weekend, when several tribes will be represented in an Indian summer gathering according to the custom of their forefathers, same time and place. In the fall of the year when the weather is fine they assembled along this rugged coast to fish and held their powwows and councils. To assist the tribesmen in restoring this ancient custom, the North Lincoln chamber of commerce has raised a fund to assist in putting on the program and to give prizes for athletic and other contests arranged by Indian leaders. The dates are October 11, 12 and 13.

Headman Edgar Simmons of Grand Ronde and Coquille Thompson of Siletz are organizing their groups and extending invitations to confederations over the state. It is expected that several hundred Indians will participate in the fete and the revival of ancient dances, games and feasting.

Chief Rube Saunders of Chemawa will supervise an Indian salmon barbecue on Saturday and Sunday. Passes will be given to Indians for Oceanlake and Taft theatres. The Otter Crest Outlook House will extend courtesies, including use of the big telescope. Deep sea boat trips will be free to all Indians by courtesy of the fishermen of Depoe bay. The Union high school at Taft will devote the Friday assembly to a welcome of Indian youths from Chemawa and the same scout troop will be quartered at the guest house of the Chapel by the Sea at Nelscott.

In general welcome will be extended by the people of North Lincoln county to descendants of the first families of Oregon.

Reform Group's Founder Passes

BLUE POINT, N.Y., Oct. 5.—(AP)—Ballington Booth, 82, president of the Volunteers of America and brother of General Evangeline Booth, retired head of the Salvation Army, died at his home today after a long illness.

Booth founded the Volunteers, a Protestant reform and benevolent organization, in 1896. Formerly he had been commander of the Salvation Army in the United States and Australia.

Besides his widow, Maude, two children, Charles and Theodora, survive.

Griffie Disputes Federal Charges

Says Western Pine Group Gave Information in Legal Manner

PORTLAND, Oct. 5.—(AP)—Competition from other varieties of lumber makes it impossible for the Western Pine association to be a monopoly, W. E. Griffie, assistant secretary-manager, said in a statement today.

The Western Pine association was one of seven indicted in Los Angeles district federal court yesterday on charges of monopolistic practices.

Members of the association are not and "have not been profiteers," Griffie asserted.

"The average price of their products in 1929 was higher than it is today, notwithstanding the fact that in the meantime the minimum wage has increased 20 per cent and all other expenses of operation, especially taxes and public charges, have mounted rapidly," he said.

Griffie declared that "the average, well-managed mill" has made a profit in only two of the last ten years and that in "at least half the remaining years, the losses were extremely heavy."

"NRA regulations left manufacturers with a greater regard for the necessity of adequate information on the demand for their products, and an appreciation of the ruinous effect on both labor and industry of excessive accumulations on inventories," he added.

"The association has attempted to furnish adequate information to the industry in a perfectly legal manner and is convinced that none of its activities has been against the interest of lumber buyers or the public generally."

Independent Union Strikes, Portland

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 5.—(AP)—Four steam schooners were tied up in the Columbia river today as the Marine Firemen, Oilers, Wipers and Waterenders' association, an independent union, placed a picket line at the four ships.

Spokesmen for the Sailors Union of the Pacific and the Marine Cooks and Stewards said they were observing the picket line and calling their members off the vessels.

Ships affected are the Charles L. Wheeler, Cascade and Stanwood at Portland and the George L. Olson at Knappa.

A breakdown in contract negotiations at San Francisco led to the strike.

More Instruments Need of Students

93 Belong to Senior High Band, Which Has 4 Bell-Lyres

Lack of instruments and funds to buy them is preventing many interested students in Salem schools from participating in band and orchestra work, said Vernon Wiscarson, instrumental director, yesterday.

Wiscarson stated that 93 students have joined the senior high school band, which has only 50 uniforms. A large number of instruments have been bought this year by the school district. Variety in the group will be provided by four glockenspiels, or bell-lyres, probably the largest number in any similar organization. The senior orchestra has 47 members.

Officers of the band are Verne Scott, president and manager; Jim Tryon, vice-president and assistant manager; Alan Robertson, secretary-treasurer, and Ruth Van Buskirk, reporter. Heading the orchestra are Tillman Kreft, president-manager; Don Stoudenmeyer, vice-president and assistant manager; Wilmer Richey, secretary-treasurer, and Ruth Van Buskirk, reporter.

The senior band now plans two trips for football games, to Albany and Corvallis.

The Parrish junior high school band has 75 members and the orchestra 50, a total twice as large as last year. Leslie enrollment has fallen off.

Classes are being formed in the grade schools and junior highs for beginners, under the direction of Wiscarson. Instruction will be without charge.

Sprague Proclaims Prevent Fire Week

Attention Is Called to Forests, Homes; Starts Today

Governor Charles A. Sprague yesterday issued a statement designating "Fire Prevention week" for October 6 to 12, the anniversary of the great Chicago fire.

"Oregon timber, a natural resource peculiarly exposed to the hazard of fire, should be constantly prominent in the consciousness of all of our people," Governor Sprague's statement read.

"In addition to our forests we have multitudinous forms of wealth in homes and home furnishings, in personal effects, in industrial and commercial plants, and in stocks of goods, all of which form a part of our natural resources which must be carefully conserved and safeguarded."

Governor Sprague said conservation of the forests and other resources was in line with the national defense program.
