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WPA Pulls Down Wages, Declared

Sprague Says Agency to Be Used Only for Suited Projects
"The federal government, through the WPA, has become an agency forcing down wages," Governor Charles A. Sprague charged at a meeting of the state board of control here yesterday.
The statement was made during discussion of terms of a proposed contract with the city of Salem for construction of a sewage disposal plant. The WPA would construct the sewers from the state institutions to the city sewers.
Governor Sprague said he did not like the WPA because the government becomes an agency to force down wages.
"However, the WPA is here and we have to use it to provide employment," Governor Sprague said. "We'll let the WPA work on those projects for which it is best suited."

Under the proposal the state would pay \$50,000 or 18 1/2 percent of the cost of the plant. The board of control will ask the legislature to appropriate the money after which the city will call a special election to provide its share of the cost.
The state's share of maintenance will aggregate \$1750 a year.

Commission Okehs Budget on Welfare

60 New Applications Accepted in Month; Over 400 on File
The Marion county welfare commission yesterday approved a November budget totaling \$56,430.50 at its regular meeting held in the welfare offices on North Liberty street.
The board also considered particular cases brought to its attention by M. E. Holcomb, welfare administrator, and authorized renewal of lease for the county medical offices.
The November budget provides \$11,100 for general assistance, \$33,432.50 for old age pensions, \$7353 for aid to dependent children; \$875 for blind assistance; \$150 for soldiers' and sailors' care, \$500 for the county farm, and \$3020 for administration.
Approximately 60 new applications for old age pensions were accepted during September. Administrator Holcomb told the commission, and additional ones will be accepted as rapidly as cases can be investigated and approved. Over 400 pension applications are now on file with the commission.
