The bureau will promote appearances of young musicians and various clubs will be served with program material.

Then as to professional music activities: the annual concert series, this year under the direction of Mary Elizabeth Sisson, is to be unusually attractive to both students and adults. There will be a dancer, a woodwind ensemble, a choir and a soprano soloist, all for a small additional cost.

The Crescendo club is affiliated with the National Federation of Music and 16 members will attend the social evening for the junior members in Portland on October 18.

Miss Lena Belle Tartar will be hostess to members of the club tonight in her home.

At a meeting held Wednesday, Elbert McKinlay played a cello solo, with Margaret Wonderlick at the piano, and Ruth Van Buskirk played a piano solo. Those who are interested in culinary subjects will be immediately attracted to the still life of a tableful of fancy breads, (same seeds and all) in the main gallery with 19 other paintings by contemporary American artists. This oil is by Macena Barton.

"School Festival" in which Paul Clements depicts the faces of youngsters, seems to be favorite of the paintings. "Portrait of a Girl" by Laura Slobo has local interest, because the artist was an instructor of sculpture at the Salem Center several years ago.

"Two Cowboys" by Polly Dunham is another painting which pleases those who like more modern work and those who prefer good old pictorial paintings.

Others in the exhibit which are attracting varied amount of interest are "Temptation," negroes on their way to church, followed by a red-suited "Uncle Sam" and "Fall" an oil painting by Santos Zingale, showing a team of horses in the field.

There are several exhibits of local work on display. Two galleries are devoted to the paintings of Barbara Scott, former Art Center student who went to the Portland Art Museum on a scholarship and is now studying at University of Oregon.

The rear galleries show an exhibition of work done by present students of Virginia Darce, Mrs. Mae Gingrich has several paintings of interest on display in this gallery, and Mrs. Ann Zinsley's sculpture is of general interest.

Other pieces of sculpture went on display and sale this week. They are by Arthur Bates and George Blais, instructors, and commission on the sales are going toward adding to the books and equipment in the Center's library.

A large evening class of students in pottery are having their first experience with firing the pieces made. First pottery went into the kiln on Friday.
