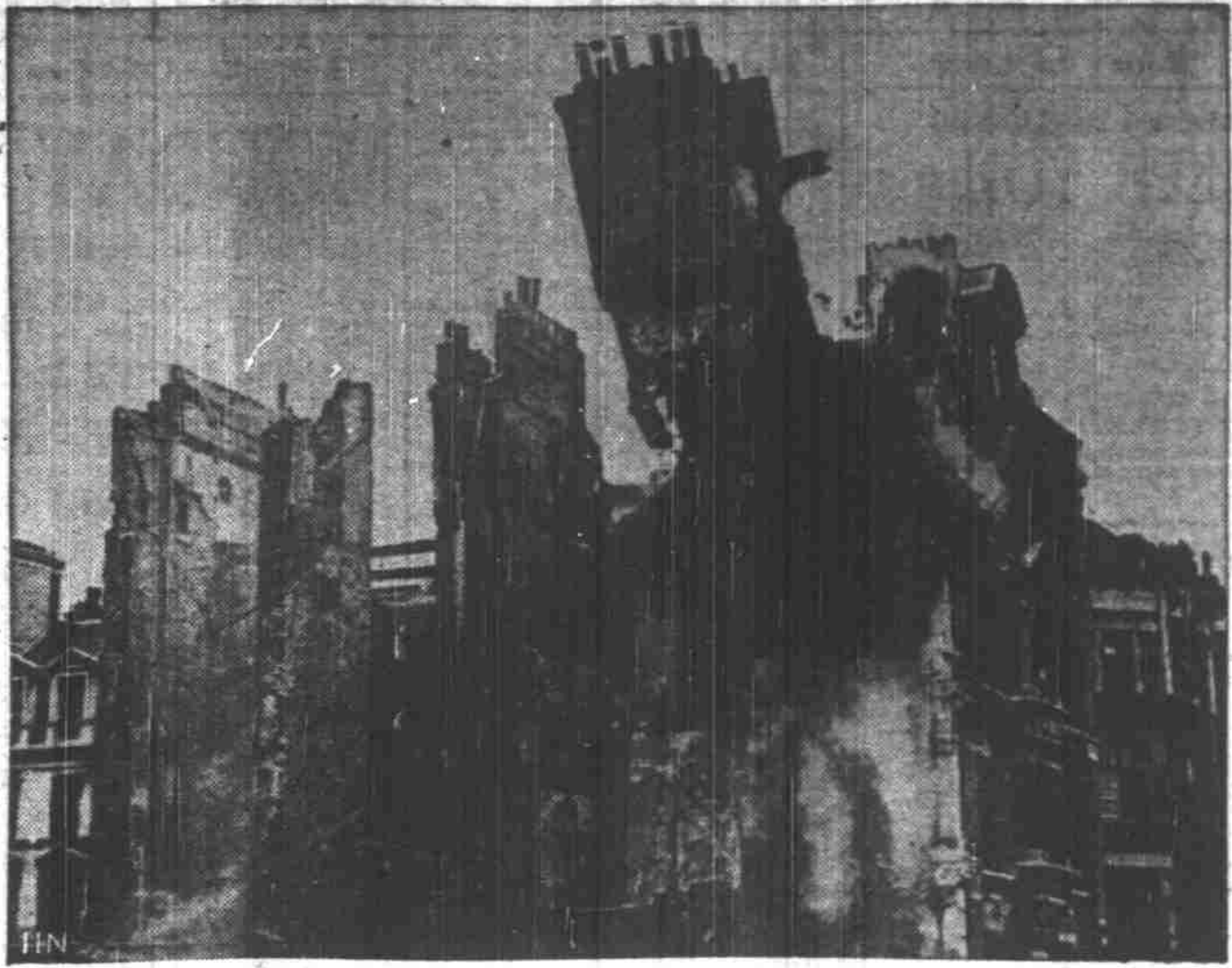

## Ex-German Ship Reports Attack

NEW YORK, Oct. 12.—(P)—MacKay radio picked up a message Friday from the British motorship Empire Audacity—a former German passenger liner captured March 7 in the West Indies—reporting it was "being attacked" at 2:40 p.m., PST.

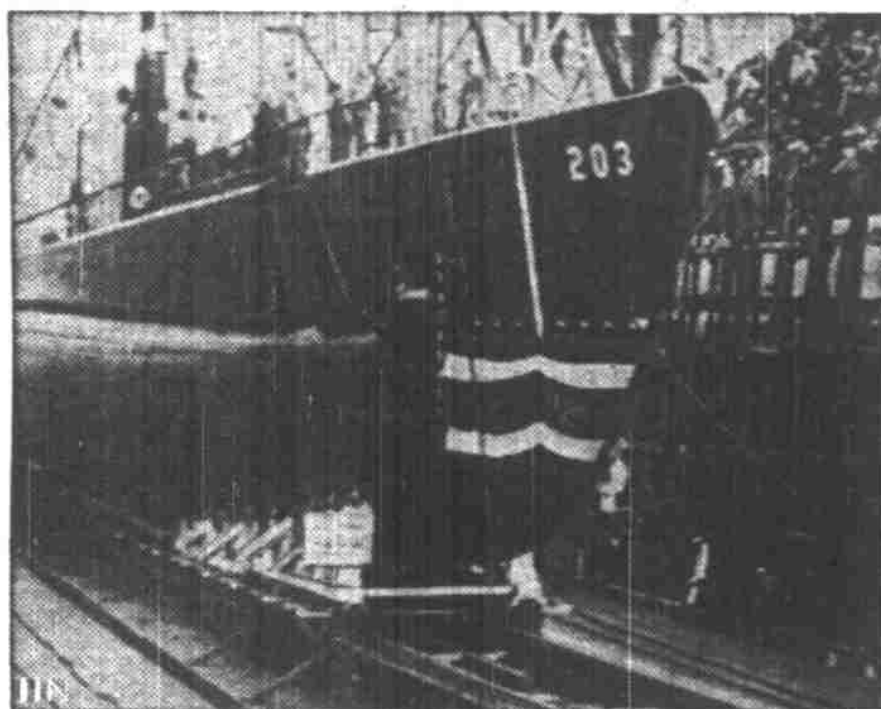
The ship reported its position as 400 miles west of the northern tip of Scotland, where there have been many sinkings recently.

The Empire Audacity, a ship of 5725 tons, was the former North German Lloyd liner Manover, in the Bremen-South American trade. She had been in service only a few months when she was captured in Mona channel, between the Dominican republic and Puerto Rico, by the Canadian flotilla leader Assiniboine and a royal navy cruiser.

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## WPA Projects in Oregon Approved

Includes Work at Chemawa and Fort Stevens; Dates to Be Set

WASHINGTON, Oct. 12.—(P)—Presidential approval of the following allotments for Oregon projects was announced by the works progress administration today.

Corvallis — \$29,869, to construct fire breaks, roads and peaks on Mary's Peak.

Chemawa—\$11,379, to improve Indian school and hospital.

Bureau of entomology and plant quarantine—\$70,240, for white pine blister eradication in Josephine, Klamath, Jackson and Douglas counties.

Fort Stevens—\$18,304, to improve military reservation buildings and grounds.

Roseburg—\$3993, to improve grounds and cemetery at veterans' facilities.

Grants Pass irrigation district—\$4197 to improve schools.

Lane county school district No. 4—\$50,198 to improve schools.

Springfield school district—\$8640 to construct industrial school buildings.

Nehalem—\$3664 for water supply.

Yamhill — \$4885 for water mains.

The WPA advised the Oregon congressional delegation that starting dates will be determined by the state administrator.

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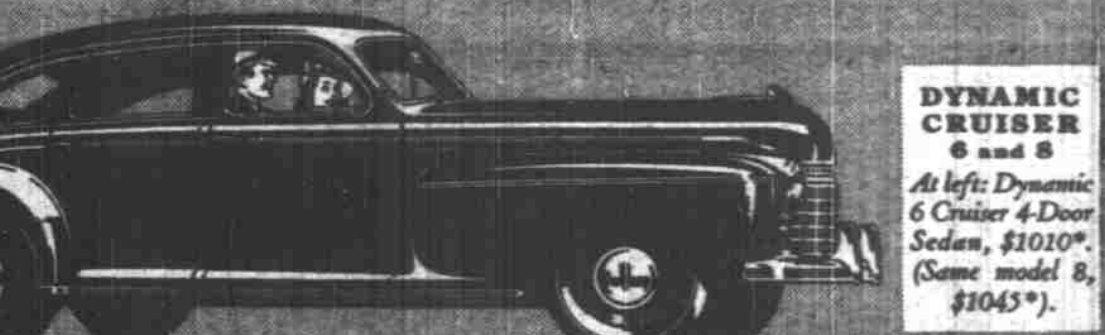

At right: Custom 6 Cruiser 4-Door Sedan, \$1099\*. (Same model 8, \$1135\*.)



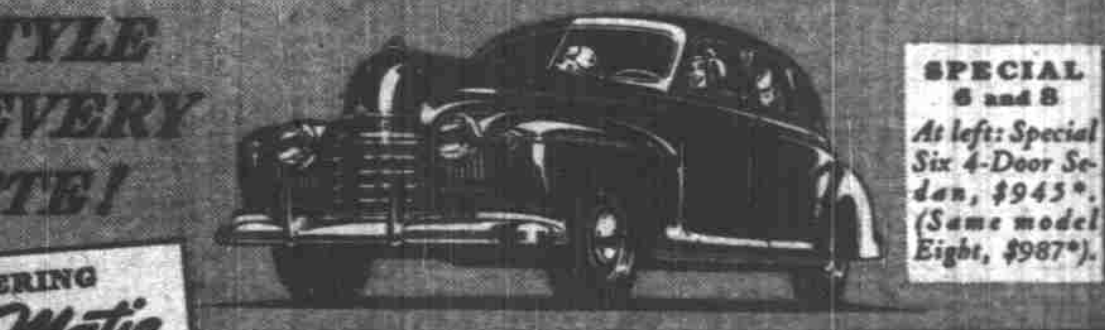
DYNAMIC CRUISER 6 and 8
