force possesses anywhere in the world.

"Secondly, we must see to it that these young men, when their period of military service is over, shall have the opportunity that is their right—the opportunity to get a good job, to earn a living, to marry, and get ahead.

Defense and Jobs

These two objectives are the overwhelming issues of this campaign—defense and jobs.

Declaring that "the present administration has—and is—failing down in the fulfillment of these obligations," Willkie added, "it has had a free hand and it has failed."

The candidate said that the administration "is seeking 'to divert attention' from its failure by 'talking about crisis and by manufacturing emergencies."

"It does so in the hope of getting a continuation of power," he declared.

Reiterating his earlier contention that there was inadequate army housing for those who will be drafted, Willkie said:

"I need not dwell upon the necessity of adequate housing for our men in the winter time. You all know it, and you all know the possibilities of sickness and influenza that are involved."

In a general discussion of defense problems he described the administration as "incompetent to get things done," and added:

"A wise administration in the first place would have listened with respect to the men in the departments and whose profession was that of arms. It would have delegated authority to others and held them responsible for the result. But even today the national defense advisory commission has neither authority nor a chairman."

"The new deal has never understood how to produce, or the uses of production of goods."

"It has preached scarcity and defeat from the beginning," Willkie said.

the first to offer its services when the federal government needs them.

The local selective service boards will enter upon their active duties tomorrow.

Outstanding functions of these boards, Wooten said, are to determine the availability of registrants for service and their classification. The classifications and deferments will be based on questionnaires filled out by those selected for service in the national lottery at Washington.

In filling out the questionnaires the men drawn for service will give their educational qualifications, occupation or activity, court record, if any, whether a conscientious objector, military service experience, dependents, physical and mental condition and other information. Court records are confidential.

Deferments will be based on physical and mental defects, essential occupations and dependents.

Registration at OSC Larger Than Corvallis

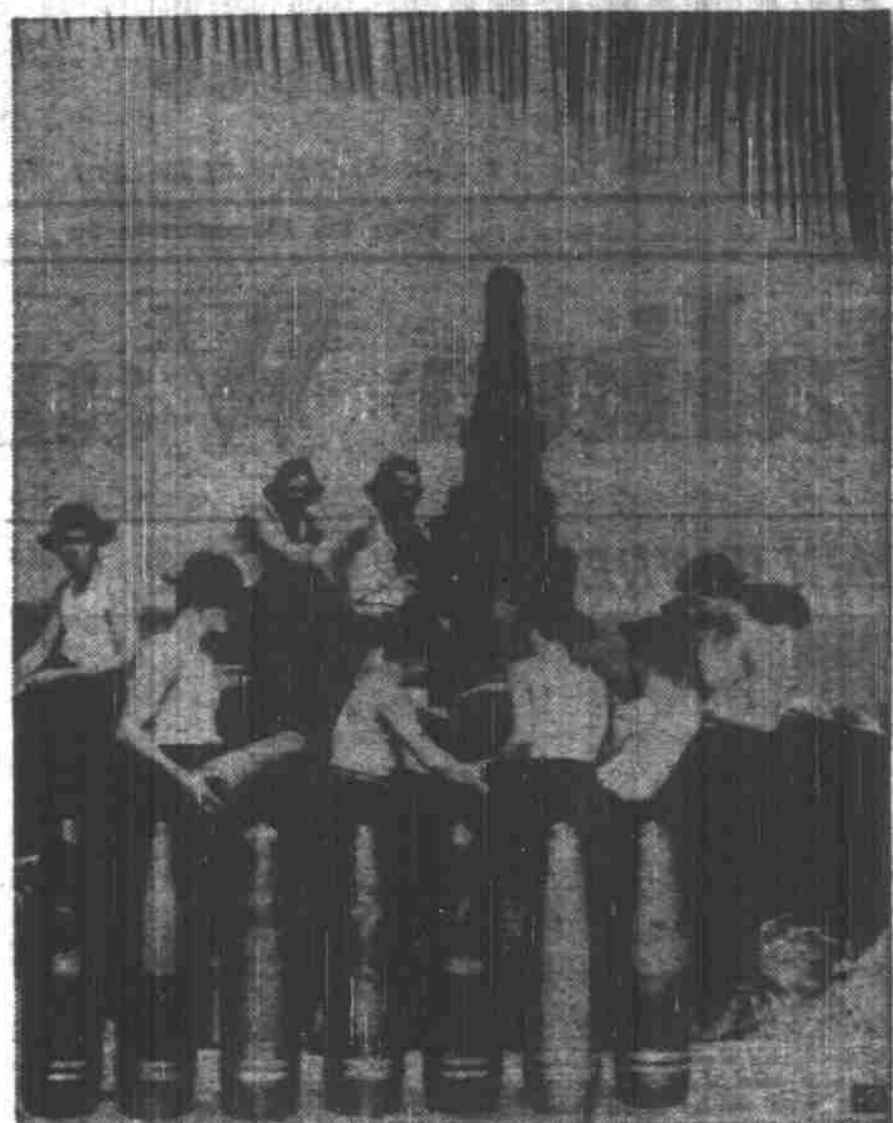

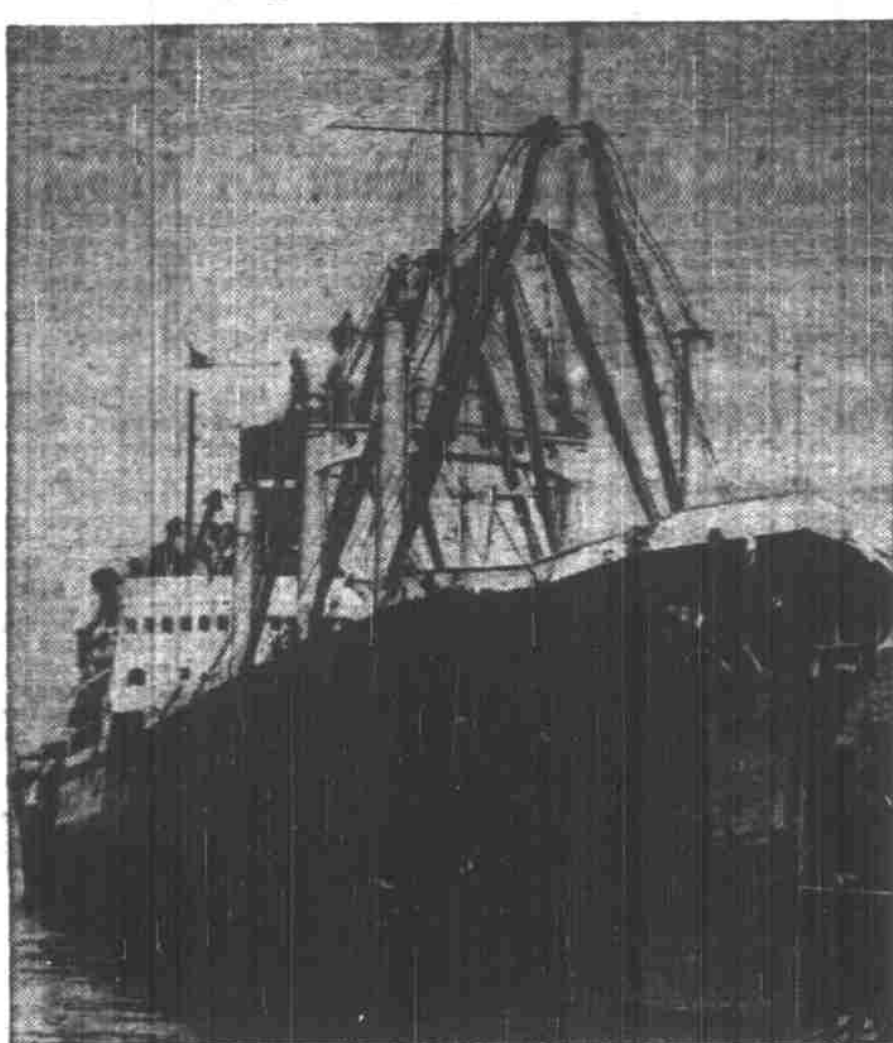

states and the District of Columbia. From time to time statements were issued on various phases of registration, including an announcement that all aliens, except those connected with foreign diplomatic and consular staffs, must register if they are within the specified draft ages.

The day also saw the senate confirm unanimously the appointment of Clarence A. Dystra, president of the University of Wisconsin, as the national director of selective service. The action had been delayed by the objection yesterday of Senator Holt (D-W.Va.), an opponent of conscription and of the administration's foreign policy.

As each man presents himself, he will be asked (1) his name, (2) his address, (3) telephone number, (4) age, (5) place of birth, (6) country of citizenship, (7) the name of a person who will always know his address, (8) his relationship to the latter, (9) the address of the latter, (10) his employer's name, and (11) his place of employment or business.

A four by six inch filing card, upon which his answers have been entered, will be handed him for his signature, and that is all that each will be called upon to do tomorrow.

Biggest Bomb Is Hurled by Nazis

bombs, oil bombs, delayed action and instant explosives—was loosed upon the city.

The Germans came in last night half an hour later than their accustomed time, and they went to work at once in the fastest action yet seen here.

The earth shuddered again and again with great explosions and it seemed that the Nazis were using bigger bombs than customarily.

Rescue workers set to digging in the wrecked streets for possible survivors. In one instance an automobile was blown clear over a series of houses, its pieces crashing down in surrounding backyards.

In the early morning, after a brief lull, a mass night flight roared over London and the noise of the engines, exploding bombs and shells screaming up into the sky was the greatest ever heard here. The air and ground shook with mighty explosions—and still the attack increased.

One salvo of bombs fell in a straight line down one side of a street, crashing through two public houses. Flames leaped up in some sections.

By this time, reports of casualties already were coming in. The people settled for a night in shelters, taxis fled the streets. The Germans used 350 or more planes in heavy waves, raiders—and small numbers at that—were able to break through to London itself only twice. The southern and eastern sections of the city, where an undetermined number of persons died under bombs, were hardest hit, but the damage was officially declared not to have been heavy.

Nearly all the rest of Britain—Wales, the Midlands, the northwest and southeast coasts—were under simultaneous attack.

Radio Is Sought For 1st Aid Car

Members of the Salem police reserve voted last night to get behind a move to equip the Salem first aid car with two way radio in order to increase its service.

"We feel that a great deal of delay can be saved when the car is a long way from a telephone and it is found necessary to summon additional aid, call a doctor to the scene, acknowledge emergency calls or communicate for other purposes," a spokesman for the reserves said.

All police cars are now equipped with two way radio.

Industry Heads Discuss Coordination With Bean

PORTLAND, Oct. 15.—(P)—Plans for coordination of facilities either for national defense purposes or in time of other emergency were discussed by Ormond R. Bean, state public utilities commissioner, and 80 transportation, communication and power executives here today.

Several committees were appointed to catalogue facilities.

Contract Is Sought

PORTLAND, Oct. 15.—(P)—A Willamette Iron & Steel Corporation spokesman said today the Portland company will submit bids tomorrow on construction of one or more \$5,000,000 new seaplane tenders. Ten are to be built.

BC Mayor Fuming At Lead Trading For Japan's War

NEW WESTMINSTER, BC, Oct. 15.—(CP)—Mayor Fred J. Hume said tonight he intended to "do what I can" to stop the shipment of British Columbia war lead from this port to Japan.

"Surely there is some other part of the British empire to which the lead could be loaded instead of Japan," the mayor said when he learned that 4000 tons of bar lead from the Consolidated Mining and Smelting company's plant at Trail, BC, was being loaded aboard a Japanese freighter here.

The metal is being shipped under a permit issued by the federal government a month ago and officials of the Pacific Coast terminals where it is being loaded, said shipments will continue until the government orders otherwise.

The belief prevailed in foreign circles there, however, that a new axis offensive would be launched within a fortnight. Whether German and Italian troops would move against Greece in connection with resumption of the Italian drive against the British in northern Egypt remained a subject of conjecture.

Circles close to the axis expressed the belief Germany had resolved to make assurances of non-interference in the event of a Nazi thrust toward the Dardanelles, Turkish-guarded link between the Aegean and Black seas. In return, Moscow would expect a free hand against Iran and Afghanistan, important sources of British oil.

On the other hand, Turkey's challenging declaration that "two million bayonets" will oppose any axis attack strengthened the opinion in some Balkan quarters that the Turks were speaking wistfully of the past.

In Rumanian-occupied Bessarabia, to the east of what is left of Rumania, the soviet army has mobilized an estimated 150,000 to 180,000 troops. (Reports circulated by Reuters, British news agency, said the Rumanian forces already had overstepped the frontier with Rumania and were moving to get ahead of Germany for control of the entire Danubian delta.

The wide possibilities of an axis move from Albania to the east through Thrace, an area of Greece and Turkey skirting the Aegean sea, was freely admitted by foreign military experts here. The first consequence of such a move, they pointed out, was the intensification of pressure against Greece, and indirectly against Yugoslavia, to its north.

London Cable Cut During Bomb Raid

NEW YORK, Oct. 15.—(P)—Western Union cable service from London was suddenly cut off tonight during a severe German bombing raid.

The cables between London and New York ceased operating, as did also the Associated Press leased cable which feeds through the London Western Union building.

The London bureau of The Associated Press, maintaining contact with New York through alternate cable facilities, was prevented by British censorship from replying to inquiries about the cable interruptions, being able to report only that it would resume sending on the leased cable when facilities again became "adequate."

The eastern Union here reported it only knew that service to and from London had been "interrupted."

A Rome radio broadcast heard in London this morning said that the German air force was turning its attention to government buildings and offices of newspapers and news agencies.

The Columbia broadcasting system picked up tonight a German wireless broadcast that the Times building in London had been damaged by bombs, destroying the editorial and administrative offices, and that the Daily Express building was hit "again."

Picking Machines May Reduce Jobs

ALBANY, Oct. 15.—(P)—Introduction of turkey-picking machines will reduce employment of turkey pickers by about half, Dave Rylands, manager of the Northwest Poultry Products plant, predicted today.

He said extension of wage-hour benefits to turkey pickers was responsible for the change and announced his firm has already ordered two machines.

the biggest fires anyone could expect to see. Explosions were occurring in all parts of the target area."

He said the damage would affect the output of the refinery for "many months to come."

The air ministry said the oil plant at Bohlen, south of Leipzig, was bombed for nearly an hour by two squadrons—one of them New Zealanders—and that four large fires visible from 20 miles were started by the first attack.

Lighted by leaping fires, the big refinery offered a perfect target for the next wave. One crew, near the end of the raid, saw six more explosions, it reported.

Ten minutes after this attack was over the leader of the raiding force began bombing the synthetic benzene and aviation gas oil plant at Magdeburg, 75 miles to the northwest.

Heavy explosive and incendiary bombs were reported bursting in the factory, one salvo alone causing 18 separate explosions.

Nominee Declares Pitching Terrible

ROCHESTER, N.Y., Oct. 15.—(P)—Wendell L. Willkie got an apple today from a little boy who wormed his way through motorcycle police to hand it to him.

The candidate's bodyguards kept a sharp eye on the six or seven-year-old boy, who ran behind Willkie's open car for half a block. He finally jumped between two policemen and delivered the apple.

Earlier, Willkie had told reporters laughingly that he ought to send a medal to a youth who dropped a tomato from a railroad trestle into his car yesterday. The tomato fell on Willkie's lap and the candidate said that "was the only hit there has been."

In a talk today he commented that "America as a baseball nation is on the decline because the number of hits compared with the number of pitchers has been small."

Mrs. Austin of Stage Hotel Dies

CANYON CITY, Oct. 15.—(P)—Mrs. Malinda Austin, 74, whose wayside inn was a mecca of hospitality in eastern Oregon's stage coach era, was buried here today. Until the iron horse and the through highway took away her last customer, Mrs. Austin ran the Austin home at the old mill town of the same name. Located on the Baker-Canyon City stage route, the hotel was known far beyond the John Day valley for its fine meals and spotless accommodations.

She had been ill and confined to hospitals in Baker and La Grande for a number of years.
