Choir Formed at Mt. Angel Academy Will Sing at Molalla November 3rd

MT. ANGEL — Sixty-eight pupils of Mt. Angel academy comprise the choir which will sing at the dedication ceremonies of the new Molalla Catholic church November 3. The students will sing the pontifical low mass and the benediction in Gregorian chant at the invitation of Most Reverend Archbishop Howard of Portland. The sacrament of confirmation will also be administered to a large class at the time of the dedication.

Gregorian chant is being introduced to a cademy students this year for the first time. Chant books have been given the singing by the Benedictine Sisters' convent, where chant is now established form of mass singing.

Frequent practice sessions are held for the young singers because of the difficulty of mastering chant. Instead of modern type notes, chant is written in numbers, which were the predecessors of notes. They are small square marks printed on the old style four-line staff. Also characteristic of chant music is the lack of measures, which makes the counting and rhythm varied and complex.

Together with the Vocal club, the new choir provides for the musical education of academy girls. Another purpose is to prepare students for singing in parish church choirs.

W. H. Rodgers Hurt

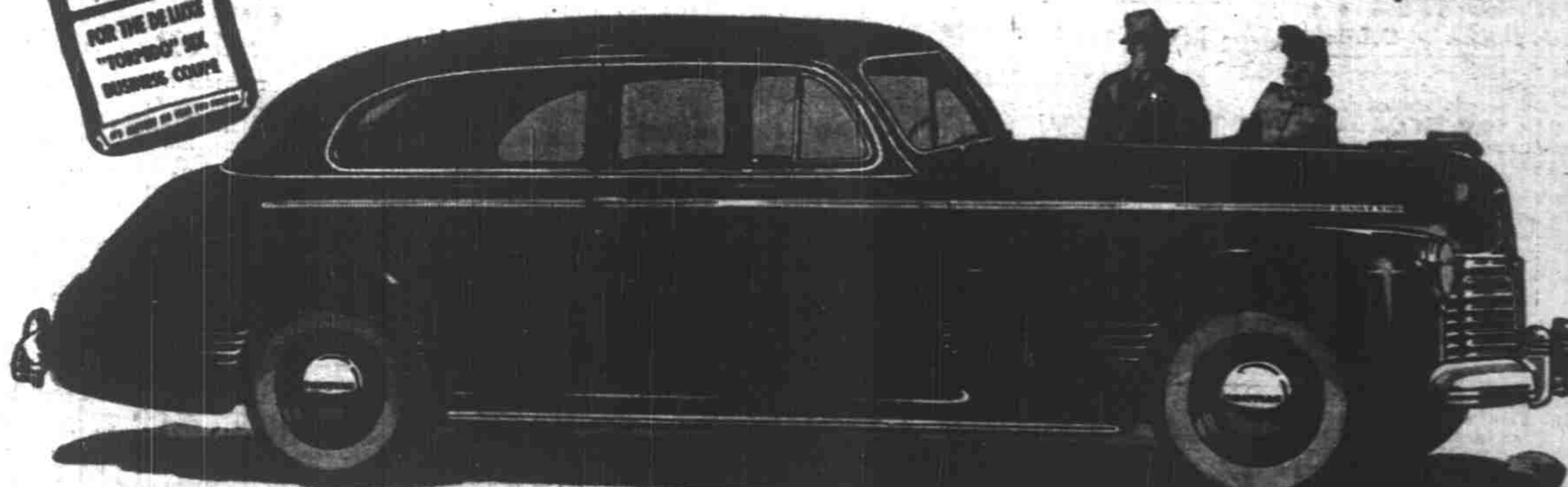
