North Liberty Bridge **Opened**; 12 Feet Wider

With an added 12 feet of roadway, the North Liberty street bridge was opened yesterday for the first time since August 22. The construction, to cost approxi-mately \$5500, includes non-skid asphalt surfacing from 60 feet north to 40 feet south of the bridge. Widening of the tread from 24 to 36 feet and realignment of the curve have eliminated a hazardous bottleneck.
