North Liberty Bridge Opened; 12 Feet Wider

With an added 12 feet of roadway, the North Liberty street bridge was opened yesterday for the first time since August 22. The construction, to cost approximately \$500, includes non-skid asphalt surfacing from 60 feet north to 40 feet south of the bridge. Widening of the tread from 24 to 36 feet and realignment of the curve have eliminated a hazardous bottleneck.

The state board for vocational education yesterday received an allocation of \$50,999 from the federal government, to be used in training workers for national defense. The program is now being carried on at seven Oregon centers. The courses include aircraft sheet metal, aircraft mechanics, machine tool operation, welding, automobile mechanics and other vocations. Enrollment on October 1 had reached 1197.

Draft Boards to Have Appeal Men

The governor's office yesterday sent to Washington, DC, a list of names recommended for appointment as government appeal agents, in connection with the local selective service boards now operating in Oregon. One agent will serve for each of the 57 selective service boards in the state. Multnomah county has 17 of these boards. Functions of the appeal agents are to protect the interests of registrants and their dependents by assisting them in furnishing information to the local boards and by advising them concerning appeals. The agents have authority to appeal any classification which they think should be appealed. Appeals will be made to the congressional boards of appeal. There is one of these appeal boards in each of Oregon's three congressional districts.
