

Chicago Mart Gets Setback

Decline Expected as Result of Previous High; Wheat Closes Cent Lower

CHICAGO, Oct. 18.—(AP)—Afflicted with a "what's the use" attitude today, the wheat market followed the path of least resistance and declined modestly.

Taking of small profits more than offset the influence of a continued good shipping demand and prices drifted slowly downward on a weak and easy market. The reaction, though, was rather expected in view of the recent creeping advance which had raised prices to the season's high marks.

Wheat closed 1/4 cent below yesterday's final quotations, December 53 1/2¢, May 34 1/2¢.

A brisk shipping demand in the cash markets was reported with 180,000 bushels sold. This was much less than the 302,000 bushels sold yesterday, but enough to surpass most daily sales in recent months.

The general attitude of the trade today was one of expecting the market to consolidate its recent advance to the season's highest prices. Exports from Kansas City and Minneapolis indicated that relatively unimportant amounts of wheat stored under government loans had been attracted into the open by the recent price advance and some traders openly said there would be little free wheat sold until the price reached 90 cents a bushel.

Milk Sale Ruling Is Made by Board

PORTLAND, Oct. 18.—(AP)—Milk containing 4.5 per cent butterfat will sell for the price of a 4 per cent milk throughout the Josephine county marketing area beginning Nov. 1, J. H. Mages said today.

Mages, administrator of the state milk control board, said the industry could file objections until Nov. 24.

New prices will be nine cents a quart wholesale or 11 cents retail for milk up to 4.5 per cent butterfat; 10 cents a quart wholesale or 13 cents retail for milk from 4.5 to 5.5 per cent butterfat.

Peppermint Production up

ST. HELENS, Oct. 18.—(AP)—G. A. Nelson, county agricultural agent, said today Columbia county's peppermint production had grown to a \$100,000 annual industry.

The county now has more than 1000 acres planted to peppermint.

New York Market Has Fourth Rise

Automotive Production Is up for Week; Rails and Implements Advance

NEW YORK, Oct. 18.—(AP)—The stock market made its fourth straight rise today when buying in the final hour slightly more than offset an early profit taking stumble.

A fair-sized volume of offerings unsettled prices for steels and other recent industrial climbers at the start. Dealings then slowed and quickened again on the last-minute recovery shift. At the close extreme losses running to a point or so were substantially reduced or replaced with modest advances.

Rails edged forward along with farm implements, mail orders, amusements and scattered aircrafts.

The Associated Press average of 40 stocks was up .1 of a point at 44 1/2, sustaining the best upturn which got under way Oct. 15. Transfers totaled 599,289 shares against 648,900 the day before.

Helpful was another upswing in this week's estimated automotive production to a new peak for 1940 to date, predictions of continued high steel mill operating rate next week, reports of mounting rail traffic and revenues, talk of a substantial advance in this year's agricultural income and indications of defense expenditures in 1941 would exceed the present year by \$5,000,000,000.

Fortmiller Heads Linn Commission

ALBANY—Mrs. Edna Fortmiller will head the Linn county public welfare commission, taking the place of Major Charles J. Olvis who is at present with the Oregon national guard administrative staff at Camp Clatsop, and who previous to his departure served as chairman of the commission.

At the same time announcement was made by John Beard public welfare administrator that R. H. Tisdale had been appointed a board member in place of Major Olvis.

Several other changes have also been announced by the administrator, Dorothy L. Sanders, Frank Hrubets, Frank Judd, Bill Berndt and Isaac Schmidt.

Returns to Otis

LIBERTY—Eino Jory of Otis returned to his home Thursday after a visit of several days at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Roy Farland.

Under the impulse of government buying, the west has been practically cleared of its wool, at prices fully on parity with Boston.

The wool market which reached a hectic stage last weekend and early this week, in consequence of the further progress of the army bids on substantial yardages of goods, commences to show signs of lessening pressure to buy. The market nevertheless is firm and gives evidence of a firm undertone.

Chiefly in the limelight this week have been the Merrion & Wilkins auctions conducted in Boston, where some 4,300,000 pounds of left-over wools from the Ogdon-Denver sales have been offered and have found keen demand, with ordinary class IV wools bringing \$1.00 or more clean basis and really good class

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Prizes Announced For Flower Show

Harvest Festival Display Has Awards for Each Division at Fair

LEBANON—Displays in the flower show held today during the Harvest Festival will be divided into two parts, horticultural and arrangement. In the horticultural division prizes of 50 cents, 75 cents and \$1 will be given for asters, three blossoms, double, Sunshin and single; for chrysanthemums, three large, small with three stems and mixed and for dahlias, large and pom-poms.

Fifty cents will be awarded the most unusual flower or shrub, or three large sinningia of any color, or three large orange or yellow marigolds or three bicolor marigolds.

Three dollars will be given for the prizes for rose exhibit, 50 cents each for the best red, pink, yellow, white, varicolored roses or vase of mixed roses.

In the mixed arrangements, large baskets or bowls with not fewer than 10 nor more than 15 flowers will get prizes of 25 and 50 cents. Similar prizes will be given for white flowers in white containers for miniatures, not over four inches, and small arrangements (four to eight inches). Thankgiving table decorations using flowers, fruits or vegetables or artistic arrangements of seed pods, grasses, etc.

All third prizes for flowers in this exhibit will be ribbons.

Hop Sale Slight Of Seedless Type

PORTLAND, Oct. 18.—(AP)—The agricultural marketing service reported today that only 15 bales of Oregon 1940 seedless type hops were sold in the past week, netting growers 47 1/2 cents a pound.

No sales of 1940 regular type seedless hops were made although offers of 30 cents a pound were reported. Dealers were busy receiving contract deliveries.

The service estimated that 1940 Oregon crop at 85,000 to 88,000 bales.

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
