aided sufficient cause for war," Turkish quarters said.
Anxiety about Turkey's status has been observed in London quarters since that country failed to go to the aid of her Greek neighbor and because of reported axis pressure on Russia to keep Turkey out of the camp of her avowed ally, Britain.

Turkey steadfastly has sought to avoid Russian displeasure in her stand against the axis, but reports from Sofia and other Balkan quarters intimated Germany and Italy were attempting to "talk turkey" with Russia on division of spheres of influence in the Balkans and the near east.

Turks Know They'll Be Topic at Parley

Turkey had no doubt that her position would form a major topic in the German-Russian-Italian talks, since she guards the strategic Dardanelles and bars the way to an axis drive to knock out the British Mediterranean forces.

Rumania opened the first fissure in Balkan union by permitting German troops unofficially to enter the country. The Turkish press believed Bulgaria would open the "second breach," and Yugoslavia perhaps the third.

Yugoslavia sent more troops to her Albanian-Greek frontier in a desperate effort to remain neutral and keep the Greek-Italian fight from spilling into her territory.

The British admiralty announced its naval forces had sunk the 1379-ton French submarine Poncelet off French Equatorial Africa in the Atlantic but denied Vichy reports that British units shelled the coast of French Gabon to aid the landing of troops there under Gen. Charles de Gaulle's "Free" French government.

The admiralty said the Poncelet was forced to come to the surface, deliver its crew and scuttle the submarine after the Poncelet attacked a British warship.

Centaur Division Declared Trapped

The Greeks on their part were reported to have trapped the famous Centaur division of about 15,000 men in the Pindus mountains, and to have taken many prisoners already as other Greek troops pushed back the invaders.

In London, Prime Minister Winston Churchill publicly praised president Roosevelt's reelection and the assurances of further aid, but noted that the road to victory was still a long one to be won only through hard fighting and further losses.

A correspondent of Domei Japanese news agency, wirelessly his New York office from a Japanese ship in mid-Atlantic that the liner had picked up an SOS from the 35,032-ton Canadian Pacific liner Empress of Japan and a V-12 German plane had bombed the ship and disabled her engines. There was no official confirmation from Ottawa or London.

The government at Vichy, France, reported that Gen. Charles de Gaulle's "Free French" troops had landed at Libreville, Gabon, French Equatorial Africa, apparently in the hope of cutting a route for the British to the Egyptian Sudan. The government said the men had landed under British protection and that heavy fighting was going on.

German raiders swept down on London last night in a drizzling rain after two daylight attacks. On Friday night, it was disclosed in London, British planes had bombed Munich and dropped bombs on the Munich beer hall where Adolf Hitler had just spoken to his Nazi followers.

The RAF also was said to have bombed on Friday night Turin and Milan, Italy, and the German submarine base at Lorient on the French coast, as well as numerous other continental objectives.

bombers attacked railway stations and goods (freight) yards in the city of Munich.

Despite this official reserve, the press and public exulted that the royal air force had kept Hitler's speech off a scheduled broadcast; had carried its bombs 600 miles to the city that is the very home and birthplace of Nazism.

"It can quite easily be imagined that those assembled in the beer hall to listen to Hitler were undoubtedly disturbed," the Press association observed.

The air minister itself made the point that the RAF arrived over Munich before 9 p.m. and dropped bombs for more than an hour; other sources said they swept in 14 minutes before the scheduled beginning of Hitler's speech and stayed at work for more than an hour and a half.

ette highway under 14 inches. Southern Oregon reported all highways open with the exception of the Diamond lake cutoff which was blocked Friday.

Washington state got out its winter blankets today as the weather man forecast more snow and freezing weather for some sections.

A minimum of 33 degrees was predicted for some portions of western Washington with either rain or snow and below freezing temperatures expected in other sections.

The entire Inland Empire, from the Canadian border to Walla Walla, was chilled by the approach of winter.

Harshest hit was north Idaho's mining "pocket," the valley of the Shoshone river just west of the Montana border. Snow piled three feet deep on Lookout pass, where the highway crosses the state line, and roads off the main route were impassable.

British Transport Reported Bombed

NEW YORK, Nov. 9.—(AP)—Bombing by German planes of the 26,032-ton liner Empress of Japan, a British transport about 300 miles west of Ireland was reported today by a correspondent of Domei Japanese news agency. The correspondent told of the attack in a wireless message to the New York office from the Japanese liner Fushimi Maru. (No information was available in London or Ottawa.) The Fushimi Maru had picked up an SOS from the Empress of Japan which said a direct hit had disabled her engines, the Domei correspondent said.

Thanksgiving Is Set November 21

WASHINGTON, Nov. 9.—(AP)—President Roosevelt today proclaimed Thursday, November 21, as Thanksgiving day and declared that in times of calamity and sorrow elsewhere in the world, may give thanks for our preservation.
It was the second time the chief executive had set Thanksgiving a week earlier than the customary last Thursday in November, which this year falls on November 22. In 1929 he said it was done to benefit merchants by providing a longer interval between the Thanksgiving and Christmas holidays.

last night. There were reports and details alike that Steelhammer, who apparently has been playing for a deadlock, had gone over to the Farrell faction. He could not be reached for a statement on his own behalf so, far as the record is concerned, he was still the odd man.

Regardless of the outcome of the leadership skirmishes, results of the election determined that the state will have an experienced legislature in 1941 and that the republican administration, with majorities in both houses, will have legislative body receptive to its program.

Of the 39 members of the senate, in which the republicans increased their holdings by three seats over last session, 26 have had previous legislative experience. In the house of representatives roll call of 89 there will be 21 who are newcomers to the state legislature.

Some valuable members of both houses lost out when the returns were counted, but the losses in the most part have been balanced by gains among those who will be missed will be Representatives Fred W. Herman of the Columbia-Clatsop district and Hector Macpherson of Linn county.

Democrats Hold Edge in Multnomah

Senator Chaney was defeated for the senate, but his place will be taken by an able young attorney of Coos county, William Walsh, a republican, formerly of Salem. Senator Zurcher's victory over J. N. Jones of Vale in a close race in which he once appeared the loser also cheered republican leaders. Zurcher is a valuable man in the senate.

In the house the powerful Multnomah delegation, which often drops party lines in battles for its own interests, will be six republicans to seven democrats while the representative of the Clackamas-Multnomah district, William H. Hedlund, is also a democrat.

Labor will be well represented in the house. Beside the energetic Vernon D. Bull, railroad labor official, and Phil Brady, Portland labor council president (APL), the unions will have the voices of Hugh A. Adams, a longshoreman, Dick Neuberger, the Portland author, and Manley J. Wilson, sawmill worker elected from Clatsop and Columbia counties.

It is remarkable that with election of Adams and Wilson both the CIO and APL will have representation in the house. Both are members of the CIO International Woodworkers association.

With a battle over revision of the present unemployment compensation law in the office for the legislature, labor's increased representation will play an important part in the coming session.

Labor Secretary Plan Is Disliked

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 9.—(AP)—Representatives of AFL and CIO labor unions of the Pacific northwest joined today in warning Secretary of Labor Perkins that his proposed meeting of Puget sound area strikers and sawmill operators "is not conducive of peace in the lumber industry." In a telegram to the labor secretary, a copy of which was sent to President Roosevelt, the unions emphasized that "spot" settlements affecting only the strikers and particular plants involved are apt to cause trouble in the lumber belt. Any negotiations should be industry-wide and should be conducted in the northwest, they said.

"It means national socialism is coming out of it," the paper quotes Kennedy as replying, and adding:

"It's the loss of our foreign trade that's going to threaten to change our form of government. We haven't felt the pinch of it yet. It's ahead of us."

Great Loss of Life There Feared; Tumbler Felt Over Great Area

"I heard horrible screams and yells above the noise of falling plaster and debris. Then, suddenly, the whole building collapsed upon itself with a roar."

(The shocks also were felt throughout Bulgaria. Chimneys collapsed in one village in that country, seriously injuring one person.)

The big apartment building was only 10 minutes trolley ride from Palace square.

Almost every Bucharest street was filled with shattered window glass and debris. Part of the roof of army headquarters in the Rumanian capital saved in during the shock.

SOFIA, Bulgaria, Nov. 10.—(Sunday)—(AP)—Bulgarians were awakened early today by several consecutive earth shocks felt throughout Bulgaria.
The tremors occurred about 3:43 a. m. (5:43 p. m. PST Saturday).

Chimneys collapsed in one village, seriously injuring one person, but full reports of damage were not immediately available, not was the epicenter known.

The first report indicated a severe earthquake had occurred about 125 miles from Sofia in a northeasterly direction—toward central Rumania.

and behind a horde of blockers, sped down the sidelines with the help of a bone-crushing block by George Peters, and halted only when bounced out of bounds on the Cougar two-yard line.

On the second play from three big Jim Kinsburgh, the Beavers' defensive powerhouse, drove through center for the touchdown and Younce again converted from placement.

That was with 1:55 to go in the game, and 58 seconds later the Beavers were right back into the same pay dirt. On the second play after receiving the kickoff, Alkins, a substitute halfback, uncorked a pass that Dethman intercepted on the Oregon State 45-yard line. The speedy Orange back set sail for the goal line and was dragged down only after he'd gone 39 yards to the Cougar 16.

Jim Busch, ex-Silverton high boomer, bucked for three yards and then Dethman whipped a pass over the goal line to Earl Norm Peters for the third touchdown. The junior halfback, who hails from Hood River, then punched the ball from placement for the 31st point.

Peters Connected And Made Trouble

The Orange couldn't keep the Cougar aerial circus completely in check, but it kept it from scoring. Sewell and assistants pitched 17 completions for 221 yards and six first downs, all the first downs the Cougars got. They made not one from rushing, despite the fact the Beavers operated from a five-man line most of the way.

While the seven Beaver completions netted but 92 yards, their aerial attack was strong enough to serve as the threat that set up the end sweeps which proved so devastating to the Cougars. Almost without exception, the Beaver ball carrier faked a pass on each of the circles around a WCO wing.

Washington State's lone bid for a score came midway of the third period. Don Durand's punt was partially blocked and got as far as the Cougar 47 only. From there Sewell pitched 30 yards to big chested Dale Gentry on the Oregon State 24. On third down from there Ford Sexton fumbled a lateral from Sewell but recovered for a first down on the Beaver eight-yard line. In three tries at the line the Cougars got only five to the four, and Sewell's fourth down pitch into the end zone, intended for Gentry, was knocked down by Durand.

Bleacher Falls, Injuring 34 at Texas-SMU Game

DALLAS, Nov. 9.—(AP)—Collapse of a temporary bleacher tumbled 1200 football fans into a heap today, causing injuries—some serious—to at least 34. The mishap occurred during the second period of the Texas A & M-Southern Methodist game, the southwest's gridiron headliner of the day.

Some of the victims suffered back injuries, others broken legs. Many were bruised. The stand folded in the center and gradually settled. Some of the spectators were trapped when their legs were caught beneath the crumbling seats.
