The aged farmer, who went into his field to plow at about 10:15, was found lying face downward behind his halted team, the traces still in his hand, by school children coming from the nearby schoolhouse during the noon hour.

Deputy sheriffs and County Coroner L. E. Barrick, who were summoned, could find no evidence other than that he had died from natural causes.

Earliest Returns Show Many Skills

More than 350,000 workers throughout the state are being given an opportunity this week to enlist in 370 essential defense occupations.

Approximately 15,000 employers are cooperating by keeping individual worksheets for use in case of a defense production emergency in this area.

Early returns from the census, forms for which were mailed out last week, indicate that many thousand skilled men will be found. Tabulations will be started soon, Leon S. Davis, Hillsboro, in active charge of the survey announced. Davis is operating under Director L. C. Stoll.

Moon to Pass Between Closely-Spaced Saturn, Jupiter This Afternoon

An astronomical rarity, passage of the moon between two closely-spaced planets, will occur at 5:15 o'clock this afternoon, according to local observers. The apparent distance between the two bright planets will be little more than the diameter of the moon.

Observers remarked late yesterday afternoon at the sight as the moon passed near the two planets. Tonight's phenomenon will be observable in the eastern sky.
