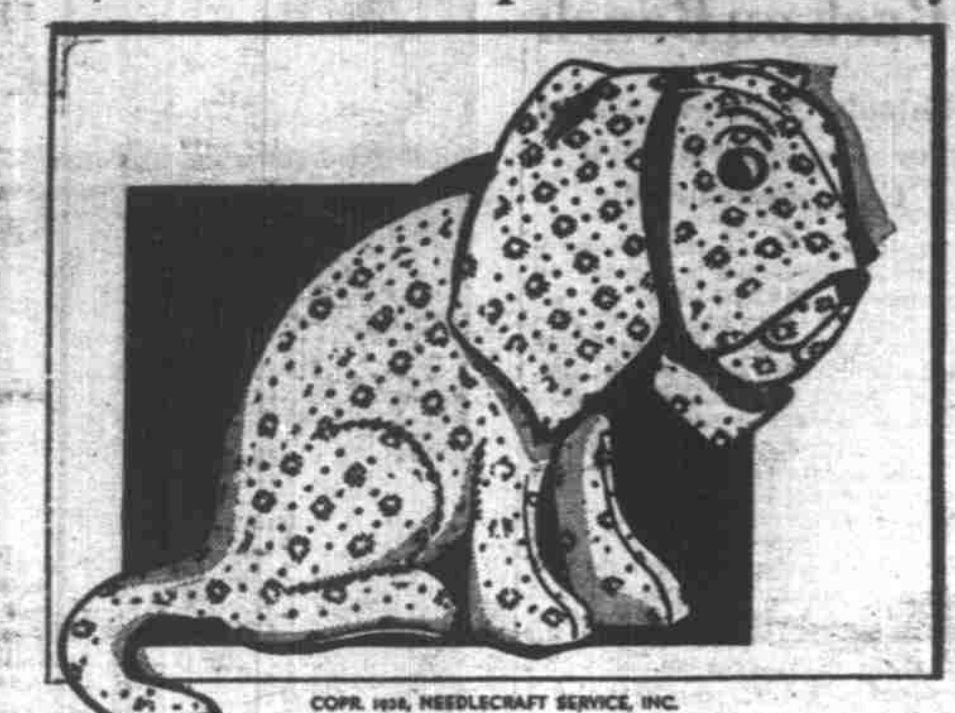

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Today's Menu

Beef birds will be the most for today, fudge walnut waffles will serve as dessert. Sliced tomatoes. Beef birds, sage dressing. Carrots and potatoes. Fudge walnut waffles with cream.

FUDGE WALNUT WAFFLES
1/2 cup butter
1 cup sugar
2 eggs
1/2 cup milk
1/2 teaspoon salt
2 teaspoons baking powder
1 1/2 cups flour
1/2 cup ground chocolate
1/2 teaspoon vanilla
1/2 cup coarsely chopped walnuts

Sift dry ingredients into bowl, leaving hollow in center. Pour milk in center, drop in unbeaten eggs, pour melted butter on top of milk and stir from center out until mixture is smooth. Add nuts and vanilla and spread on hot waffle iron, cooking a bit slower than plain waffles. Serve warm dusted with confectioner's sugar, spread with whipped cream or with sugar and cream icing. Delicious with vanilla ice cream.

Gumbo Makes Supper Dish

Crab gumbo makes an excellent late supper dish when guests are to be served. It's a good dinner dish too.

CRAB GUMBO
1/2 cup oil or butter
1/2 cup all-purpose flour
1/2 cup each sliced green onions and tops
1 can okra with juice
1 cup tomato puree
1 cup boiling water
1 teaspoon each salad and paprika

1 teaspoon minced parsley
1 hard cooked egg
1 cup crab meat
Fry celery and green onions in oil until clear, but not brown. Add okra, tomato, water, and seasonings and simmer 5 minutes. In covered kettle spread crab meat, parsley, green onion tops and rice hard cooked egg over top, cover kettle and simmer 5 minutes longer. Lift out carefully with cooking spoon, to keep crab in large pieces and serve on boiled rice.

Jelly Cookies For Lunches

Just say "jelly," and you have the whole school snacking its collective lips. Say "jelly cookies," and you'll have a pear riot.

SCHOOL LUNCHEON JELLY COOKIES
1/2 cup shortening
1/2 cup light brown sugar
1 egg
1/2 cup sifted flour
2 teaspoons baking powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
2 1/2 cups oatmeal
1 cup milk
1 teaspoon vanilla

Current jelly
Cream shortening; add sugars gradually, creaming until light and fluffy. Add the egg and beat well. Sift flour, baking powder and salt together, stir in oatmeal and add alternately to creamed mixture with the milk. Add vanilla and mix well. Drop by spoonfuls on a greased cookie sheet and spread out flat with a spatula. Bake a dent in the center of each cookie and fill with jelly. Bake in a moderately hot oven (375 degrees) 10-12 minutes. Makes 2 dozen.

Pudding Tips in One Paragraph

A spoonful of jelly puts pride in puddings. . . chopped Brazil nuts can top off any pudding. . . ice cream is good with steamed pudding. . . sliced dates go into hard sauce. . . banana slices look pretty on pudding.
