

Stock Market Is Irregular

Steels Among Backsliders; Aircrafts and Western Union Get Advance

NEW YORK, Nov. 12.—(AP)—Irregularly lower price trends prevailed in today's stock market with steels among the principal backsliders.

Scattered aircrafts, rails and assorted specialties leaned forward after an initial dip. This selective buying steadied the list in the afternoon and early losses running to 2 or more points were reduced or transformed into advances of as much for selected issues at the close.

The Associated Press average of 48 stocks finished off 1/2 of a point at 46.4. Dealings, fast in the morning, slowed after midday but transfers amounted to 1,446,971 shares against 1,750,930 last Friday.

Dividends and earnings statements stimulated a number of the day's climbers. Business news, on the whole, was to the liking of Wall Street but some traders came back from the Armistice day recess with the idea of taking profits on last week's run-up.

Western Union was given an upward push of 2 points at the last when directors voted a dividend of \$1 on the common. The last previous payment was 75 cents in July, 1937.

Airplane stocks were aided by action of the United Aircraft company in declaring a dividend of \$2 compared with \$1.50 disbursed last June.

Steels were under pressure throughout as observers began to wonder if net for the steel-makers was approaching a limit in view of possible forthcoming tax increases.

Among losers were US Steel, Bethlehem, Youngstown Sheet, Chrysler, Consolidated Edison, Anaconda, American Can, Westinghouse, Du Pont, Dow Chemical, Loft and Texas corp.

Advances were retained by General Motors, Sears Roebuck, Boeing, United Aircraft, Glenn Martin, Celanese, Martin Parry, Santa Fe, NY Central, Pennsylvania and Chesapeake and Ohio.

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Salem Corn Show Is Held at Bank

Exhibits Appear in First National; Winners to Go to Corvallis Fair

Marion county club director Wayne D. Harding said yesterday that 45 entries were anticipated for the annual Marion county corn show sponsored by the Future Farmers of America in conjunction with the First National bank of Portland, Salem branch.

All the exhibitors in the corn show just concluded at Silverton are expected in addition to several new entries. The show will be judged today between the hours of 9 and 11 a.m. Ribbons will be awarded winners and will remain on exhibits until the closing date, Saturday noon, Dr. R. E. Forre, assistant agronomist at Oregon State college will be the judge. In addition to ribbons, cash awards will be made.

As many of the Salem exhibitors will be entering the State Corn show at Corvallis it will be well to remember that November 19 is the deadline for entry at that fair, said Harding.

Although the 1940 season was exceptionally dry, corn production in the Willamette valley and throughout the state on a whole compares favorably with that of 1939. This due to a large extent by the enthusiastic favor with which Oregon growers have received hybrid corn which has shown ability to withstand droughts and continue a producer.
