

### Marion County Farmers Object

#### Court Rejection of Trapper for Predatory Control Is Cause of Meet, Nov. 27

SILVERTON HILLS—“What benefits one, affects all residents of Marion county,” is the farmer's reply to the Marion county court's recent rejection of the trapper which provides for a government trapper for predatory animals.

Farmers throughout the county are expressing disappointment over the county court's action, and are urging all farmers and others interested to appear at the county court house at 10 o'clock on the morning of November 27. The farmers explain that at a recent meeting attended by members of the county budget committee, the county court and a group of farmers interested in predatory animal control, an objection to the continuation of the project was raised. However, they continue, subsequently the court rejected the item as “benefiting only eastern Marion county.”

This the farmers deny: “Perhaps certain roads leading into Salem do not directly benefit Marion county farmers as a whole, but it is county improvement for us all. We help pay for the roads anyway. But if we are given no protection for our sheep, goats and turkeys maybe we can't do this.”

Victor Howard was employed August 15, 1937, as trapper under the government biological survey. His salary comes out of the \$1500 which has been set aside for biological work in the county. Of this sum he has \$500 in salary by the county. The remainder comes in two equal sums from federal and state purses.

Howard's official report shows that during his time of service he has caught 91 coyotes, 32 bobcats and four bears.

### Armory Disposal Gets Attention
