Marion County Farmers Object

Court Rejection of Trapper for Predatory Control Is Cause of Meet, Nov. 27

SILVERTON HILLS - "What senefits one, affects all residents of Marion county," is the farmer's reply to the Marion county item which provides for a government trapper for predatory

Parmers throughout the county are expressing disappointment over the county court's action. and are urging all farmers and others interested to appear at the county court house at 10 o'clock on the morning of November 27

The farmers explain that at a ecent meeting attended by memiers of the county budget comnitee, the county court and a croup of farmers interested in redatory animal control no obection to the continuation of the nject was raised. However, they outinue, subsequently the court rejected the item as "benfiting

only eastern Marion county."
This the farmers deny: "Perhaps certain roads leading into Salam do not directly benefit Marion county farmers as a whole, but it is county improvement for us all. We help pay for the roads anyway. But if we are given no protection for our sheep, goats and turkeys maybe we can't do this."

Victor Howard was employed August 15, 1937, as trapper under the government biological anreey. His salary comes out of the \$1500 which has been set aside for biological work in the county. Of this sum her \$500 is supplied by the county. The remainder comes in two equal sums from federal and state

Howard's official report shows that during his time of service he has caught 91 coyotes, 32 bobcats and four bears.




