

The turkey is as good as the stuffing, say many good cooks, and it's fun to have variety in stuffing. But when variety is given to the stuffing, there's often a family cry for good old fashioned sage dressing.

But you can satisfy your interold-fashioned flavor. Stuff the main cavity of the fowl with sage dressing, whatever recipe you prefer, then fill the smaller neck cavity with a fancy mixture.
