### Hiller Estate Acts Recalled

**Clostermann Appointment, Payment of Fees Are Ordered Canceled**

An order canceling three previous orders in the estate of Joseph Hiller was signed yesterday by Judge J. C. Stegmann sitting as judge of the probate court for Marion county. The new order set aside provisions reducing the bond of Frank G. Smith, until then administrator; appointing Robert Clostermann, German consul in Portland, as administrator de bonis non; and ordering payment of attorney's and administrator's fees amounting to \$3000. The effect of the court's action setting aside previous orders was to return the estate to the place where it was prior to discharge of Smith as administrator, and the appointment of Clostermann as administrator de bonis non. Sole remaining heir of the estate is reported to be Franz Hiller, a citizen of the German Reich.

### Need of Bridge Held Immediate

**Engineers Inspect Gates Structure, Find Dry Rot and Listing**

Replacement of the present bridge across the North Santiam river at Gates with a new structure will be necessary without delay if travel is to be continued across the stream at that point, Marion County Engineer N. C. Hebbes and E. G. Ricketts, bridge testing engineer of the state highway department, agreed yesterday. They reached this conclusion following an inspection of the structure, a 110 x 45 ft. wooden trestle, which now stands at Gates. Action closing it was taken recently by the Lin and Marion county courts jointly. Hebbes and Ricketts found extensive dry rot in the wooden framework of the structure and also discovered that a list, already noticed, had caused the span to move over 12 inches since work was last done on it several months ago. Except for false work bents constructed at the time that work was done, the bridge would have fallen earlier, they concluded. Their findings have been submitted to the Marion county court, and will be communicated with the Lin county body. Joint action on a new bridge will shortly result, it is believed. Particular interest has been taken in the matter by county authorities because of unusual inconveniences caused by the bridge closure, especially to the Gates school district, where the school bus is compelled to travel 30 miles out of its way daily in order to carry pupils to and from school between the Marion and Lin county sides of the stream.

**Willkie Group Records \$11,835, and Demo Board \$9373**

General election campaign expenditures of the "Willkie-McNary non-partisan voluntary committee," Howard M. Wall, chairman, aggregated \$11,835.13 according to an expense statement filed in the state department here yesterday.

### Early Completion Of Survey Urged

Early completion of Oregon's skilled labor inventory as a vital step in the national defense program will be urged by Governor Charles A. Sprague in a radio address over KOIN at 6:15 o'clock Friday night.

The governor will ask employers and employees to cooperate in making prompt reports to the board for the mobilization of labor.

Returns received from approximately a third of Oregon's 10,000 principal concerns have disclosed thousands of workers employed in lines other than those involved in the national defense program. Tabulation of the inventory will get under way soon, officials said.

### Hike Coming up For Chemeketas

Chemeketas will hike to Eagle creek Sunday and may join the Pathfinders from Portland. The local hikers will leave the Senator hotel at 7 a. m., drive to Eagle creek camp on the Columbia river highway and hike through the timber near Bonneville. The Chemeketas' hike is scheduled for six to eight miles, but those wishing to go farther may join the Portlanders in a 13 mile walk, which begins at 9 a. m. The drive will be around 190 miles, states Beattie Smith, leader of the Salem hike.

### Conducts Services Demand for Labor On Farms Is High

**Klamath and Ontario Aid in New Placement Record, October**

Heavy demands for extra farm labor in the Ontario and Klamath Falls areas enabled the state employment service to set another record for placements in October with 26,309 new jobs reported by the 22 offices, Director L. C. Stoll announced yesterday. This compared with 10,156 for October, 1939, and 23,618 for September. Harvesting of sugar beets and lettuce crops in the new irrigated district resulted in Ontario leading in placements with 9273, of which 8955 were supplemental. Klamath Falls with its heavy potato harvest was a close second with 7933 placements, of which 7516 were on farms. Four other offices placed more than a thousand persons each during the month. Portland reported 1298, Hood River 1211, Eugene 1055 and Bend 1034. The monthly report showed 32,377 men and women still on the active file of unemployed. Of these, 24,955 were men, 2417 veterans and 7322 women.

**Dr. Arthur I. Brown Holds Highest Medical Award; Lectures Next Week**

Three services Sunday will mark the opening of a Bible conference to be held in the Calvary Baptist church with Dr. Arthur I. Brown, MD, as the speaker. Dr. Brown, who has earned the highest surgical degree in the world being a Fellow of the Royal College of Surgeons of Edinburgh, has been in great demand as a lecturer and Bible teacher for the past 15 years.

He will spend six days in the city speaking in the Calvary Baptist church. Sunday morning at the 11 o'clock service he will speak on the subject, "Seeing the Face of the King." At the 3 o'clock mass meeting he will speak on "The Amazing Jew and Armageddon." Sunday night he will discuss "The Present World Crisis—Will Germany Become a World Empire?"
