The beginning and the end of the meal are important items in the menu today. Perhaps you've put off arranging for them, with only a vague idea as to what will be served on the table.

If you want appetizers look to these last minute possibilities. Bacon rolled around olives, then broiled. Olives with pimiento removed and some anchovy paste squeezed in. Stuffed eggs put together and sliced carefully into small wedges.

Or if some sort of cocktail will be on the table when guests are seated, consider: Canned artichoke hearts and asparagus tips with half mayonnaise and half chile sauce. Gingerale chilled until mushy, then poured over finely cut fruit mixture. One cup boiling water added to a glass of crabapple jelly, grated rind of 1 orange added, 2 cups orange juice and 1/4 cup lemon juice. The mixture is stirred and served slush. Minced clams in tomato juice, shrimp and grapefruit. Asparagus fingers arranged at the edge of the glass and centered by tuna with green onion dressing.
