

Council Meets At Silverton

Woman Mayor Leads Last Meeting for 1940; Bonds Sold

SILVERTON—The last regular city council meeting to be held at Silverton this year and to be presided over by Silverton's woman mayor, Zetta Schlador, was held Monday night with two main issues settled. The refunding bond issue of \$4500 was sold to Atkinson, Jones and Co., of Portland at \$100.33 for each \$100 to bear interest at 2 1/4 per cent. The appointment of R. A. Fish and L. F. Tucker to the city library board to serve with Mrs. H. B. Latham and Mrs. G. B. Benton, present members.

The additions to the board were suggested by Harriet Long, state librarian for Silverton. The meeting in November, Miss Long suggested that members of the city council be placed on the city public library board.

Among minor matters taken up were recommendations made for the issuance of six liquor licenses to include those of Rolfe Benton, A. H. McClure, George Manalis, Pete Sorenson, Toney's and Leonard Gunge.

An application from A. H. Wheeler, present night patrolman, for reappointment of his license was placed on file until after the first of the year.

C. A. Boatwright, from the WPA office, sent a letter asking that the city inform his office of legal property rights and the legal agency responsible for maintenance of the East Oak street for which the city has asked an improvement project. The matter was placed in the hands of the city attorney, Rex Albright.

A petition asking for the improvement of Orchard and Wells streets was read and placed on file until after the first of the year.

Mayor Schlador reported that she had been asked to bring the matter of a light for the end of Church street before the city council. It was pointed out that there was a light on Bartlett street and that this was the end of the city limits.

Library Reports Circulation Gain

SILVERTON—November proved a busy month for the Silverton public library with circulation increasing over the end of October. Also this November showed an increase in circulation of 244 over November of a year ago. Should circulation hold up in December, the 1940 will top that of a year ago, according to members of the library staff.
