

### Scio Council To Act Jan. 2

#### McDonald Pleads Innocent to Charge of Damage

SCIO — Final action on a proposed city ordinance extending city water mains to the south city limits will be taken January 2, 1941, at the last regular meeting of the present council.

Councilman J. A. Withers, member of the fire, light and water committee, and mayor-elect, presented tentative draft of the ordinance at the December meeting of the council in response to an October petition of Joe Wesley and others residing outside the city limits. Petitioners agree to extend the mains at their own expense to their residences, and to pay assessments to the city for use of water.

Max Wesley and Guy Funk were granted renewals of beer licenses, payment in each case being \$5.

A report was made by Mayor P. W. Schrank that Harold "Spud" McDonald alleged that he was not guilty of damaging a city fire hydrant at Mill street and Pentland avenue, and therefore did not owe the city for damages claimed. The city paid \$5 to have the hydrant repaired.

Grabbing of brush and repair of several city streets was discussed and the former authorized. Labor and salary contract bills were allowed.

### Technique for Cooking Figs

It seems that there are better ways to cook dried figs these days. And incidentally, they make a favorite breakfast fruit when served with cream. Here's the dried fig institute's very best approved directions.

Cook dried figs without soaking, for better flavor and firmer texture. Merely rinse and drain the figs, cover generously with water and boil briskly 20 to 30 minutes, depending on softness. If sweetening is desired, allow one tablespoon sugar for each cup of figs and cook for last 15 minutes' cooking. Add more water as and if needed. For variety, stick cinnamon, whole cloves, orange or lemon slices may be added while cooking.

Dried figs do not require cooking for eating out of hand; however, if softened fruit is preferred, cover the figs with boiling water a few minutes, or steam over hot water. This simple processing also prepares dried figs for use in salads, candies, breads, cookies, cakes and frostings. Slice with scissors for a clean-cut appearance.

### Oven Stew for Family Meal

Stew becomes a family oven meal when it's prepared from this recipe:

- #### OVEN STEW
- 2 slices salt pork
  - 1 1/2 pound dried beef chuck
  - 1 large onion
  - 2 tablespoons flour
  - 1 1/2 cups water
  - 1 can condensed tomato soup
  - 1 teaspoon salt
  - 1/2 teaspoon paprika
  - 6 small onions
  - 6 medium carrots
  - 6 medium potatoes
- Cube pork and brown with beef chuck in frying pan. Remove to baking dish. Brown chopped onion fat remaining in frying pan. Add flour, mix well and add water, tomato soup, salt, pepper and paprika. Cook three minutes, stirring constantly. Pour over meat. Add whole onions, carrots and potatoes. Cover and bake in a moderate oven (375 degrees) for 1 1/2 hours, or cook slowly on top of range for the same length of time.

### Prune Bread for Party Fare

Prune nut bread that takes whole wheat flour has been found to be excellent party food when merely spread with butter and served open-faced sandwich style.

- #### PRUNE NUT BREAD
- 1 cup white flour
  - 1/4 cup sugar
  - 2 1/2 teaspoons double acting baking powder
  - 1 1/2 cups whole wheat flour
  - 1 cup milk
  - 1 cup chopped, dried prunes
  - 1/2 cup walnuts
  - 1 tablespoon melted shortening
  - 1 teaspoon salt.
- Mix and sift together the white flour, sugar, salt and baking powder. Stir in whole wheat flour, add milk, beat well. Add fruits, nuts and shortening. Put into a greased pan, allow to stand 20 minutes to 25 minutes in a warm place, then bake at 350 or 375 for an hour.
