Other members are Evelyn Benz, Dorothy James, Mary Jane Lusch, Beulah Fuller and Lois Ostrom.

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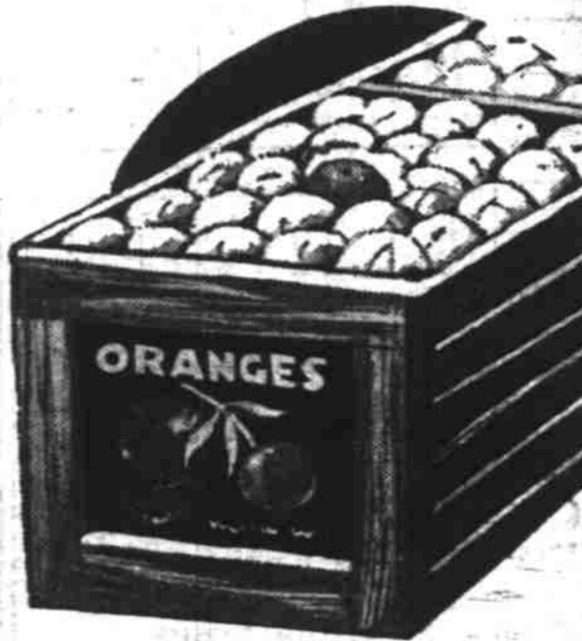
