

### Presbyterian Offers Artist

Celesta Player Is Featured; "Shell Shocked Angels," Is Pastor's Sermon

The Christmas concert at the First Presbyterian church Sunday night at 7:30 will feature a galaxy of guest artists including Alicia McElroy, celesta player of the Portland Symphony orchestra, Josephine Albert Spaulding, mezzo-soprano, Virginia La Rue, coloratura soprano, and Mary Talmadge, headrick, violinist. Solos and concerted numbers by these artists will form part one of the concert, with part two consisting of the presentation of Dudley Buck's cantata "The Coming of the King."

The celesta is an instrument played by pressing down a key mechanism, the same as a piano. It has a range of four octaves although music for it sounds an octave higher than written. Its tinkling, bell-like tone makes it especially appropriate for Christmas music. Miss McElroy, in addition to a miscellaneous group, will play a composition by Donna Eason, Salem musician. It is her song, "Fireflies."

Mrs. Spaulding, with Mary Talmadge, headrick, playing the violin obligato, will sing Adams' "O Holy Night" and will be heard in Regner's "The Virgin's Slumber Song" and "This Day Is Born A Saviour" by Stewart. Frank E. Churchill will be at the organ.

Soloists with the senior choir in the cantata will be Josephine Albert Spaulding, Lawrence C. Maves, Vivian Benner, Ralph Scott, Garland Hollowell, Agnes Drummond, Mary Hughes, Anabel Moon and Willard Hornschuch. Doors will open at 7 o'clock Sunday night, and a transcribed musical program will be played until 7:30.

Sunday morning Rev. W. Irvin Williams' Christmas sermon will be "Shell Shocked Angels?" Josephine Bross, soprano, will sing "Goodwill to Men" by O'Hara.

# Naval Reserve Men of West Best



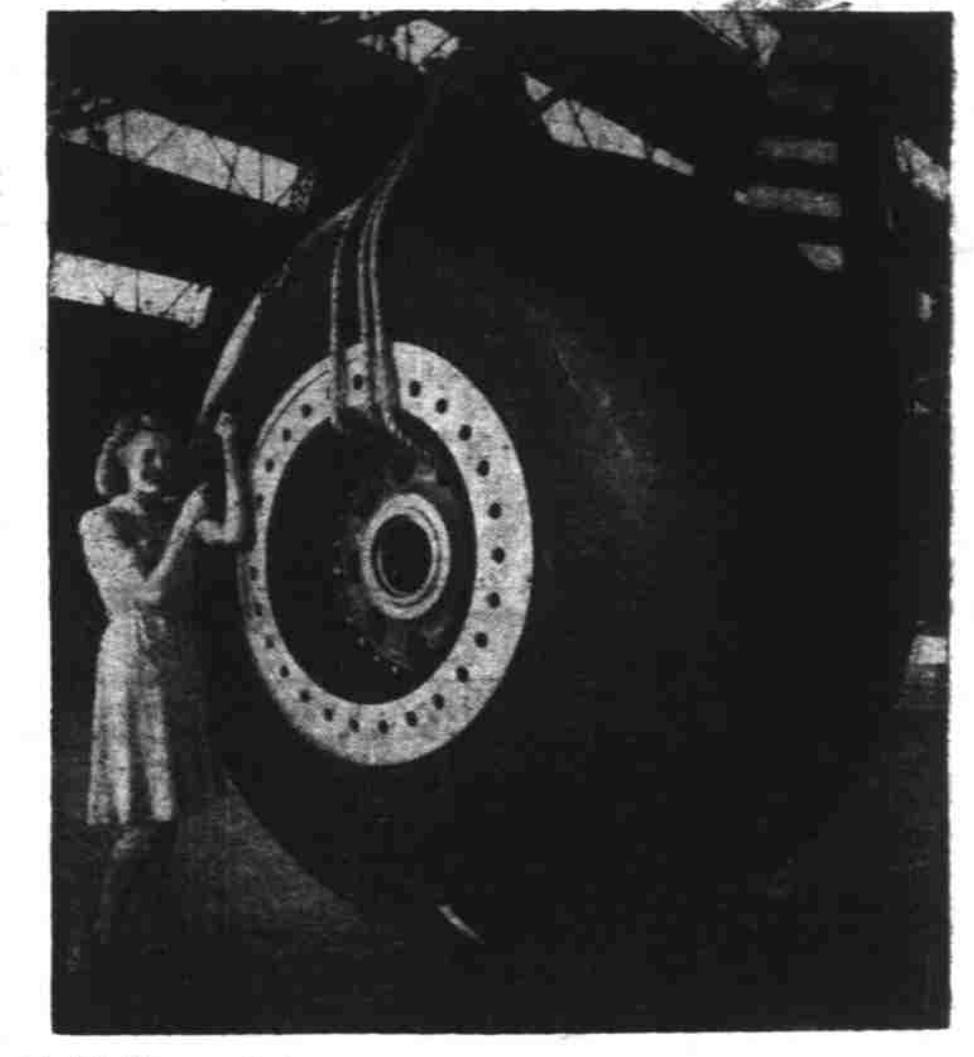

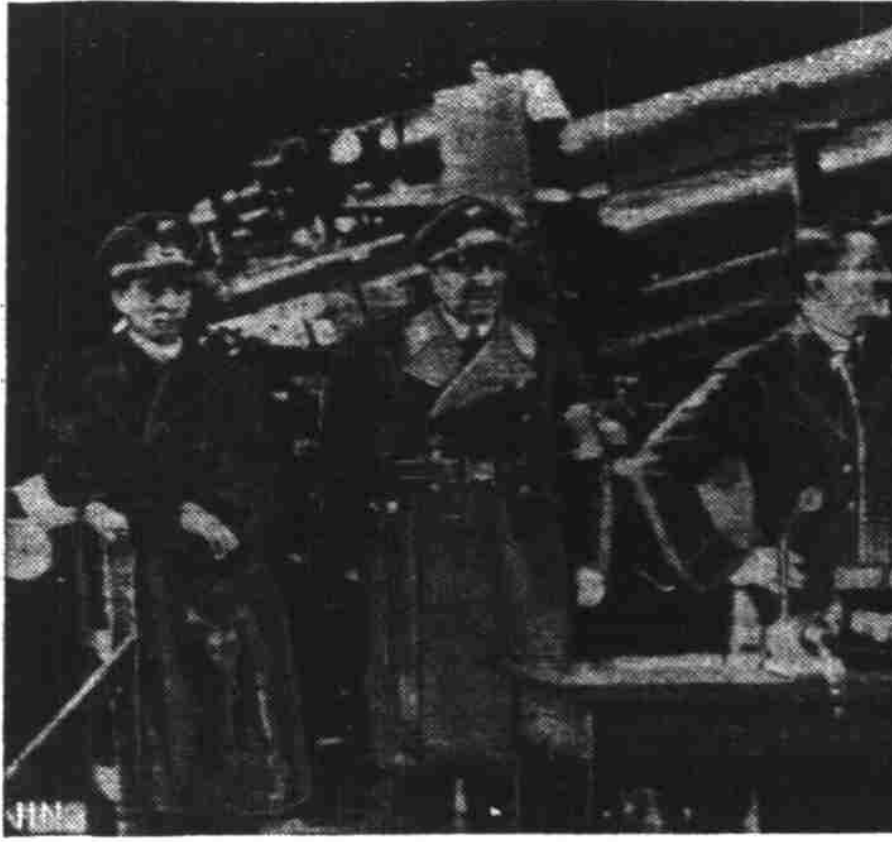
The pageant is directed by Mrs. Roy Goetz. Special music will be furnished by the choir.
