

Brown-Bread On Menus Now

Back in the old days they always compensated for expensive holiday meals with a good old menu of baked beans and brown bread. Here's the latter half of the menu.

BOSTON BROWN BREAD
1 cup rye flour
1 cup yellow cornmeal
1 cup graham flour
2 cups sour milk
1/2 cup raisins
1/2 tablespoon soda
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup molasses
1/2 cup nuts
Mix and sift dry ingredients into a bowl, pour in molasses and milk. Mix well. Add raisins, nuts and pour in buttered mold until 3/4 full. Butter cover, then put in a larger pan with water and steam for 3 1/2 hours.

CRUMBS BROWN BREAD
Put two cups bread crumbs in a bowl and add 2 cups sour milk with 2 heaping teaspoons of soda dissolved in it. Then add 1/2 cup molasses, 1/2 cup sugar, pinch of salt, 1/2 teaspoon ginger and 1 un-beaten egg. Add 1 cup flour and 1 1/2 cups cornmeal. Add 2 tablespoons shortening and 1 cup raisins. Steam for 2 hours in pound coffee tins.

Canned Fruit Is Icebox Dessert

Canned apricots make a good dessert for winter meals.
APRICOT REFRIGERATOR PUDDING
1 can apricots, sieved
2 tablespoons orange marmalade
2 eggs yolks
4 tablespoons butter
1/2 cup powdered sugar
1/2 cup cream
Heat apricots in a double boiler, add to beaten yolks, cook until slightly thickened and chill. Cream butter and sugar and fruit mixture. Beat cream stiff and add to mixture. Line mold with waxed paper, cover bottom and sides with lady fingers or sponge cake. Fill with three layers of fruit mixture, with cake between layers and on top. Chill, garnish with orange sections and cream.
