### Call Curtailed by Board at Stayton; Volunteers Apply for Service

STAYTON—The local board No. 3 quota is seven men, which will be chosen from volunteers. This is the January quota and the men will be inducted sometime during the week of January 20.

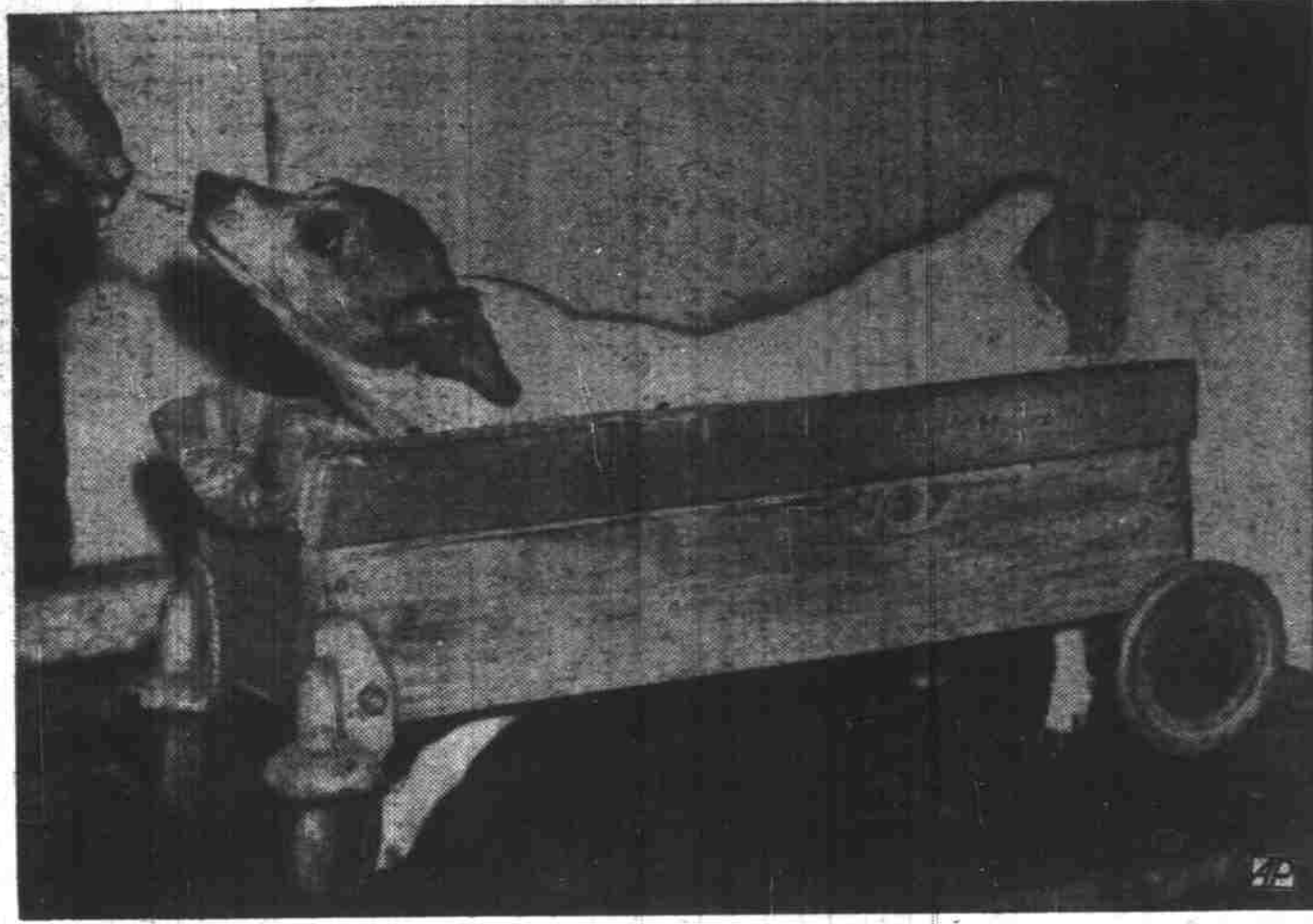

These men will be given transportation from Stayton to the Portland induction station from where they probably will be sent either to Fort Lewis or Camp Clatsop.

There are four more volunteers left for the February call to the local board before any of the registrants will be drafted.

### Former County Commissioner Dies at Portland; Had Suffered Stroke
