

Subjects Chosen for State Oratorical Fray at Farm Convention

Junior Farmer Contest Slated

Oratory to Deal With Scope of Farmers Union in Agriculture Field

LIBERTY—The subject for the state junior farmer union oratory contest was announced recently by the state junior department. It is "What the Farmers' Union Can Do to Benefit Agriculture Through Organization, Education, Cooperation or Legislation." Any of the four phases of the subject may be chosen by contestants.

Participants shall be juniors in good standing, 15 to 20 years of age. No reference material is listed for the contestants this year, each must secure his own and such references listed at end of manuscript.

Each contestant must deliver his production as an oration and will be allowed a minimum of five minutes and a maximum of ten minutes for delivery. Participants in the state finals must furnish a typewritten copy of oration.

Locals will hold trial contests to pick one contestant to participate in the county elimination. The winner of each county contest will participate in the state event during the state convention February 18 to 20.

Local and county officials, where preliminaries are held, are to provide judges who will score

as follows: Effectiveness, content or convincing text and adherence to topic, 30 points; manner of delivery, posture, poise, correct English, vocal quality and enunciation, 30; organization value, determined upon consistency and adaptability with the Farmers union program, 25; originality, 10; delivery time, 5.

Cash prizes are offered by locals to juniors who place in the local contest and the county organization also gives cash awards to place winners and to county participants. In addition to the state awards of \$10 and \$5 for first and second place the state organization will give \$5 to each county first place winner.
