

Transients to Pay in Advance for Scio Water Is Order of Council

Cyrus Chosen Council Head

Membership Continued in League of Oregon Cities at Meet

SCIO—M. B. Cyrus, reelected city councilman in November, was named president of that board at the initial meeting held under charter provisions on the first Monday in January. Cyrus was chosen after W. A. Ewing, former mayor and recently elected councilman, declined to serve in that capacity. Cyrus will preside over council meetings in absence of Mayor J. A. Withers, according to provision of the charter.

Other councilmen filling oath of office were Mylo Bartu, R. M. Cain, Guy Funk, Max E. Wesely, E. D. Myers is the hold-over treasurer of the body, having served in that capacity for a number of years. Joe Lytle, succeeding himself, and Carl M. Cyrus, filed oaths as recorder and city marshal, respectively.

New members voted to renew the insurance policy on the city hall, and the body, with Ewing dissenting, approved continued city membership and legislative representation in the League of Oregon Cities.

Carl M. Cyrus was unanimously elected, upon his application, as superintendent and collector of city water system at a salary of \$30 per month. Cyrus was instructed to collect from transients renting in the city \$2.50 in advance for ordinary house use and \$5 in advance for sprinkling. Cyrus succeeds J. F. Oupor in the official work, the latter having handled the work on a 5 per cent commission basis for some years past.

Petition of J. F. Wesely and others for extension of city water mains to the south limits of the city, and service from the city wells, with the petitions to pay expenses of extending mains from the city limits to their property a quarter mile south, was referred to the ordinance committee for further study. Outgoing council had prepared the ordinance and tentatively approved the move. The city, by addition of another drilled well, now has adequate supply of water both for house use and sprinkling. Spring and reservoir cooperatively built by the southern residents have failed during recent dry summers.

Mayor Withers made committee assignments as follows: fire, light and water, Cyrus, Cain, Ewing; streets and public property, Bartu, Wesely, Cyrus; finance, Ewing, Cain, Funk, health, Wesely, Bartu, Ewing; ordinance, Funk, Bartu, Cyrus.

The board regularly meets on the first Thursday of each month.

Safe Driving Told Council

Adults Worst Offenders Is Report of Kerrick; New Signs Are Placed

SILVERTON—Bad manners are just as noticeable in driving an automobile or in walking as they are at a dinner table or at a bridge table and they are much more dangerous, according to John C. Kerrick of Salem, who was speaker at the Thursday night meeting of Silverton's safety council presided over by Zetta Schlador, retired mayor of Silverton. Adults have the worst manners, Kerrick added.

He urged members of the safety council to keep before the public at all times the idea of safety. He displayed a group of 40 reports of fatal accidents occurring in November.

"Sixty days ago," he said, "these people had no idea that they were through. We don't know who of us it will be next. Most of these were not the so-called reckless drivers. They were just good ordinary citizens like the rest of us. Some little traffic rule or rule of courtesy was disobeyed or forgotten and their life-story was ended."

Led by President Schlador, various points of safety improvement about Silverton were discussed. Stop signs, it was said, had been placed at the Barlow road where Harold Irish, prominent Silverton man, met his death some months ago, and either were all ready placed or would be placed soon at the Hazel Green road where the five fatalities occurred just before Christmas. Stop signs for the Bethany road at the Henjum service station were discussed and a hope expressed that they would be placed there before a fatality occurred.

Careless driving around Silverton was also noted. Some, it was said, blamed this onto the policemen. President Schlador said that this was entirely wrong. S. P. Rose, president of the Silverton chamber of commerce, suggested that pictures recently shown at the chamber by the Safety council, be shown at the school. Mrs. Schlador favored the idea and appointed herself as a committee to make the arrangements.

Additional lighting at the Southern Pacific depot was discussed and left in the hands of Lester Standard for investigation. George Imboden was instructed to investigate further enforcement of the bicycle ordinance at Silverton, and Dr. A. L. V. Smith was instructed to investigate the cost of a huge safety sign to be placed at a conspicuous place in Silverton.

Scio Mutual Has \$218.20 Balance

Officers Reelected; Taxes Remaining Outstanding; Operator Re-Named

SCIO—Records of the secretary, Mrs. Frank Bartu, show a balance of \$218.20 in the coffers of the Scio Mutual Telephone association, incorporated, at the beginning of 1941. Records show but \$69.33 at opening of 1940.

Taxes owed by the company for 1934, 1935 and 1936, according to the secretary's books, total \$234, being the principal debt outstanding of the non-profit organization.

The corporation is subject to federal excess profits tax on balance on hand at the close of each year, regardless of debts outstanding. Increase of phones in operation now brings a total of 224, exclusive of line 19, which operates from both the Scio and Statton exchanges.

Reelected officers of the corporation, all of whom serve without pay, except the president, whose local dues are waived, and the line man, who receives payment on individual job basis, are as follows:

R. R. Borovicka, president; Joe Menhart, Jr., vice-president and line man, and John Shelton, Bill Miller and Byron Bates, directors. The board has re-named "Mrs. Jennie Weddle, at a salary of \$100 per month, as chief switchboard operator, she to provide her own assistants.
