Series to Begin At First Baptist

Pastor to Answer Problem Raised by Scriptures; Revelation Studied

Sunday night at the First Baptist church, the pastor, Dr. Irving A. Fox will begin the new series of messages on the "Seven Churches in Asia As Found in the Second and Third Chapters of the Book of Revelation," which are vital prophetic messages concerning the outline of Christianity through the ages. The pastor will answer the question: Have the prophecies of the churches run true to the prophetic utterances of the Lord?

The first message concerns the past apostolic period, the departure from first love in which there is no longer devotion to the person of Christ. He has become an idea, a cult, the expression of a person rather than a living, intimate person.

How does it affect the Lord and what has He in His heart against the church, is a question to be answered.

Rev. Denny Dies; Was Pastor Here

Rev. Melchior Denny, 87, died at a local hospital Friday morning. Rev. Denny, who was former pastor of the Evangelical Reformed church, had been in failing health since the time of his retirement from the pastorate of the local church in 1928. His wife preceded him in death in 1937.

Rev. Denny was born in Switzerland October 20, 1853, the family coming to this country in 1860, settling in Indiana. He completed his theological training in Mission House college in Plymouth, Wis.

His first pastorate was in Kentucky, where he served 17 years, later serving in Kansas for 15 years. In 1916 he came to Oregon and was pastor of the Evangelical Reformed church of Salem until his retirement, when he went to live with his daughter, Mrs. Lydia Schlegel, in California.

In July, 1940 he returned to Salem where he lived at 130 Bush street.

Survivors are three daughters, Mrs. Nettie Kruse, Salem; Mrs. Mary Bros, Elmo, Kan.; and Mrs. Lydia Schlegel, Caruthers, Calif., and two sons, Emanuel and John of Salem.

Services will be held Monday from the Evangelical Reformed church, Capitol and Marion streets, the hour to be announced later by Clough-Barrick company.

Indian Evangelist To Preach Sunday

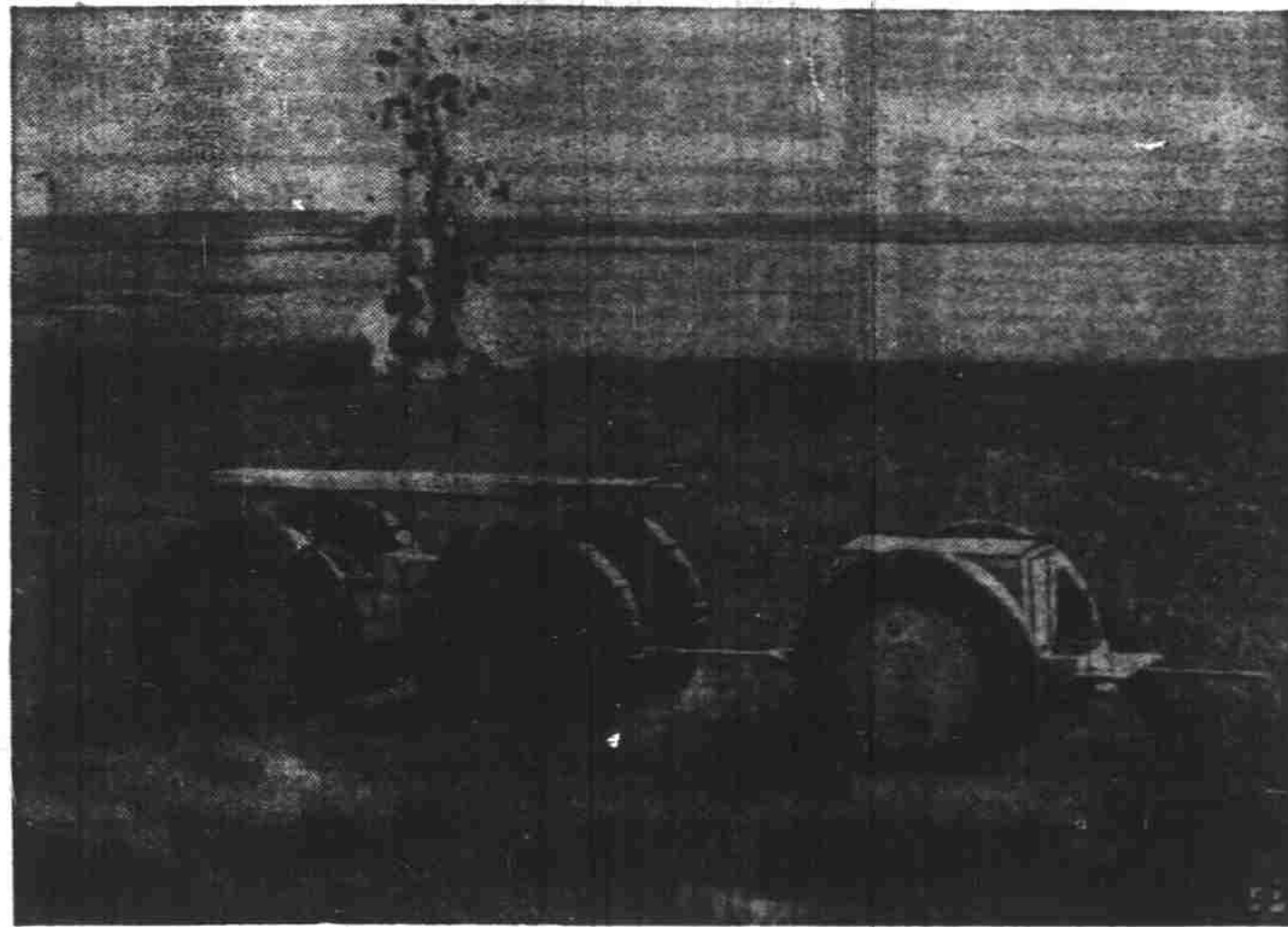

Black Gold Quest Carried on in Odd Vehicle



AT HOME IN WATER, ON LAND.—Mostly tires is the marsh buggy (above), a tractor-like vehicle used for travel about Louisiana swamps when surveys for oil are being made. The buggies travel on land, through marshes and water, going up to 25 m.p.h. The tires, 10 feet high, provide buoyancy in water, traction being supplied by rubber bands strapped on crosswise.



MONSTER OF THE MARSHES.—With this marsh buggy and trailer, scientists have been exploring Louisiana marshes in search of "black gold." The trailer carries geological instruments used to record the man-produced explosions such as that in the rear. Blasts of dynamite shake the earth, and from these recordings engineers determine where to drill for oil.

American Defense Topic; Barb Flung in Direction of Objectors

DALLAS—The annual dinner meeting sponsored by the Dallas Woman's club in cooperation with the Dallas chamber of commerce, Lions club and Junior Woman's club was held Wednesday night in the chamber of commerce rooms with Alfred F. Kelley of Oswego, department commander of the American Legion of Oregon, as the principal speaker. About 120 were present for the meeting.

Kelley talked on world conditions stating that the United States could not assume a position of isolation. Kelley stated the war was not Hitler's war but the war of the German people. He stated the only way we could hope to save our democracy was by becoming so powerful and so strong that no combination of powers would dare attack us.

He said that conscientious objectors were reading their Bible upside down.

Kelley advocated the organization of a state home guard prepared to handle emergencies should any crisis arise in local communities.

The meeting opened by Mrs. C. E. Phelps, first vice-president of the Woman's club, introducing leaders of the various civic organizations.

Mrs. Elmer Schulten, president of the Woman's club, introduced Hollis Smith of Dallas, district governor of the Lions club, and presided at the meeting.

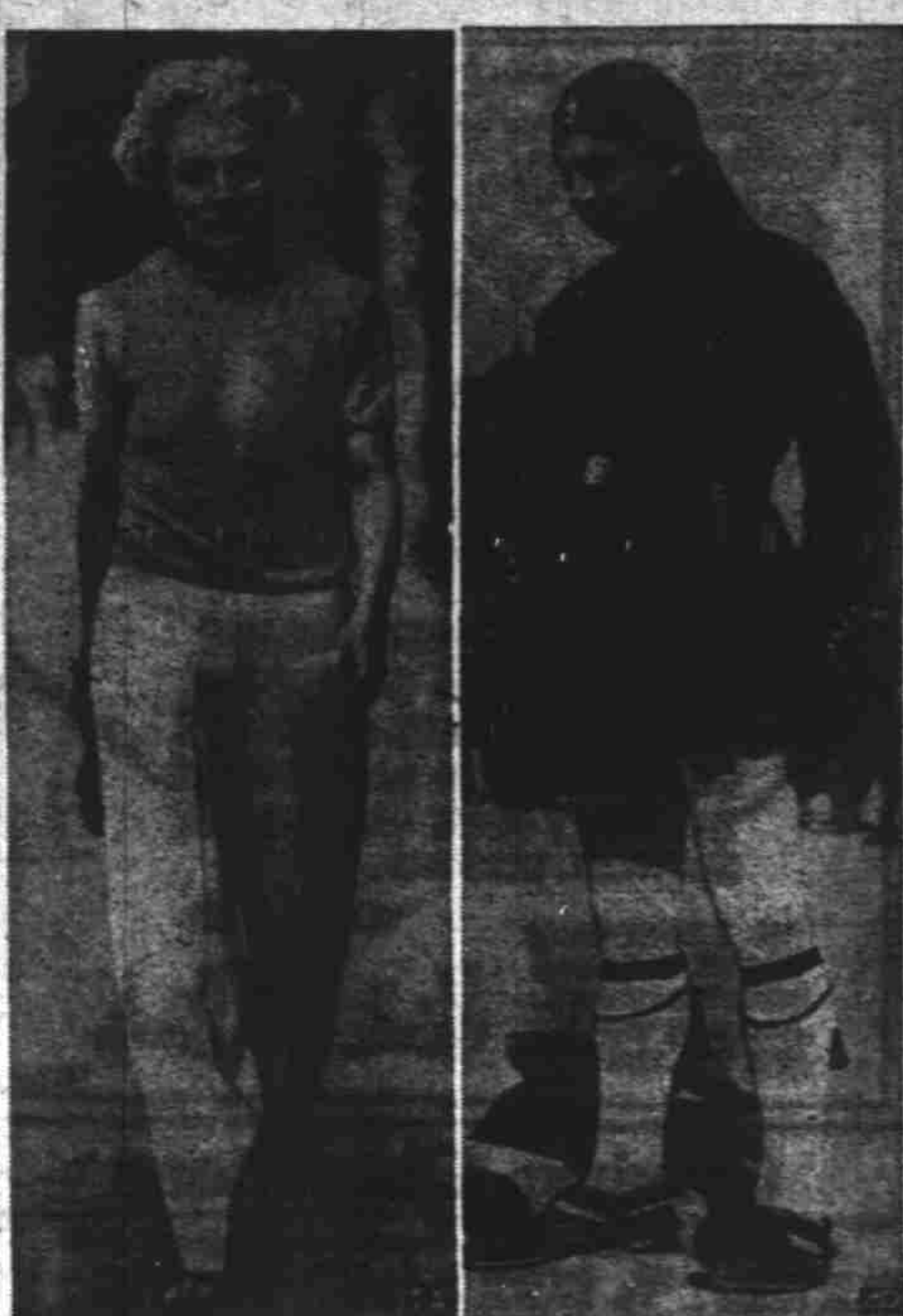
