Bartges Faces More Charges

Warrants From Washington Received; Will Plead on Kidnaping

Warren E. Bartges, already charged in Marion county with passing a bad check, kidnaping and jail break, is also wanted in Spokane and South Bend, Washington, and in Dallas, Texas, Sheriff A. C. Burk revealed yesterday.

The sheriff revealed that warrants have been sent from the two Washington cities. The one from Spokane charges larceny of a bicycle belonging to Harvey L. Cole, V. W. Granzer, Coswell B. Bartwick and Douglas Thies, and setting bail at \$1500. The other, from South Bend, charges forgery of a check for \$30.24. In both places, the warrants show, the man used the name of George Clark, though in South Bend the last name was spelled Clarke.

Sheriff R. A. Schmidt of Dallas telegraphed Sheriff Burk to hold Bartges on a charge of grand larceny involving a 1940 sedan. No warrant has yet been received on this charge. Bartges was arraigned yesterday before Justice of the Peace Joseph B. Felton on the charge of kidnaping Mrs. A. R. Hunter in the course of his break from the Marion county jail a year ago. He was granted 24 hours in which to decide on plea, and was ordered returned for further arraignment at 10 a.m. today.

THE DALLES, Jan. 12.—(AP)—A proposal to buy land for an airport at Dallesport, Wash., across the Columbia from here, appeared today.
